## Reminder of upcoming deadline

County governments, non-profit groups and certified beekeepers are reminded of the 5 p.m. Dec. 15 deadline for requests for proposals for farmland preservation projects and a new beehive grant. The grants are through the N.C. Agricultural Development and Farmland Preservation Trust Fund.

This year's request for proposals includes statewide general appropriations for traditional farm preservation projects and the new N.C. Beehive Grant Fund for the purchase and construction of beehives.

Grants can be awarded to secure agricultural conservation easements on lands used for agricultural production; to support public and private enterprise programs that promote profitable and sustainable agricultural, horticultural and forestland activities; for the development of agricultural plans; and for the purchase and construction of new beehives.

## Ips Engraver beetles offer clues about pine tree health

A landowner looks across their property and notices the pines that just last week seemed to be green and full of life are now brown and lifeless. All signs point to an infestation of pine bark beetles. Fears mount that these trees have fallen victim to the dreaded southern pine beetle (SPB). A closer look finds that

SPB are not present, but another bark beetle, Ips engraver beetle, or Ips for short, has invaded the tree. The focus now turns to Ips as the accused killer of the once stately pine trees.

It is important to get a sound diagnosis since management or control of bark beetles depends on the species present (there are

three main species that affect pines in North Carolina: SPB, Ips, and black turpentine beetles). Typically, Ips affects individual or small groups of trees but can be implicated in larger infestations when pines in a forest or landscape die, seemingly overnight. To diagnose, rangers, foresters and arborists will peel bark

off impacted trees looking for tell-tale signs of bark beetles. A sign of Ips is galleries (or tunnels) under the bark that are clean and finely etched or engraved into distinct "X", "Y", "K" or "I" shapes. These should not be confused with SPB galleries that are sloppy "S" shapes

of the Census is to do a complete count of U.S. farms and ranches and the people who operate them.

It is important that this information is collected as it provides uniform, comprehensive and impartial agricultural data for every county in the United States. In essence, it is your voice, particularly when it comes to future agricultural planning and decision making.

Farms are businesses, and as business owners and operators you need thorough and trusted information to make the best decisions possible. The information collected through the Census of Agriculture works the same way. Policymakers at the local, state and federal levels, researchers, agribusinesses, trade associations and even farmers can make more informed decisions when they have a better picture of what the

industry as a whole and as parts look like.

I can tell you I am always eager to have the latest statistical information in my job as agriculture commissioner. I use statistics often in my comments to groups, reporters and with my counterparts in other states. Accurate and current numbers also help me gauge the health of our agricultural economy, and point to areas where we may need to adjust our ag policies and funding efforts.

Longtime readers of this column know that I talk a lot about the importance of farmland preservation. That is an issue that became all too obvious about 10 years ago when North Carolina led the country in the loss of farms. On my farm, I am always having to put pencil to paper to determine what to grow, how to make smart investments to grow

my business, what my inputs will be and what will be my likely return on certain crops. I tend to trust my numbers when it comes to my farming operation.

I apply those same practices here at the N.C. Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services. When I saw the farm loss numbers, it was obvious to me that as a state, we needed to focus our attention collectively on ways to disrupt the decline in farm numbers. From that, we worked with the legislature to gain funding for the Agricultural Development and Farmland Preservation Trust Fund. I am thankful we are continuing to work to conserve farmland in the state.

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## NCDA&CS agronomist Love honored

N.C. Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services regional agronomist Georgia Love was recently honored by the Robeson County Farm Bureau Women's Committee for her contributions to the local agriculture industry.

This was the first year for the Women of Agricultural Excellence Award.

Love serves Region 5, which includes Bladen, Brunswick, Columbus, Cumberland, Hoke, Robeson and Scotland counties. As a row crop specialist, she helps farmers in these counties troubleshoot nutrient and nematode issues, which affects crop growth and yield. She is the second female row crop specialist in North Carolina history.

"Georgia is focused on helping growers use tested agronomic tools that can help

them boost production and reduce their inputs," said Michelle McGinnis, section chief for Agronomic Field Services.

Love earned two degrees from N.C. State University and began her career with Robeson County Cooperative Extension.

Robeson County ranks fifth in the state in farm cash receipts at over \$396 million.

According to the latest statistics, the county is the top producer in the state of corn for grain, second for wheat and third for soybeans. f

Love is one of 13 regional agronomists serving farmers across the state. They help growers establish appropriate agronomic sampling programs and implement management recommendations in a cost-effective and environmentally sound manner.

## Enjoy these 2017 N.C. State Fair winning recipes

Jackie Boegel of Raleigh earned first place and \$200 with her Baked Apple French Toast in the N.C. Apple Growers Association's apple recipe contest at the N.C. State Fair.

Samantha Leonard of Archdale took home first-place honors and \$125 for her Papi's Pecan Pie Pancakes in the N.C. Pecan Association's contest.

Entries into the apple contest had to have two cups of N.C.-grown apples and could be a dish to serve for breakfast, lunch, snack or dinner. Recipes were judged on taste, appearance and creative use of apples in the recipe.

Recipes in the pecan contest had to contain one cup of North Carolina pecans. Judging was based on taste appeal, creative use of pecans, appearance and ease of preparation.

### Baked Apple French Toast

4 cups day-old whole grain bread, cubed  
5 large eggs  
1 ½ cups milk  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 ½ teaspoon cinnamon, divided  
1/8 teaspoon ginger  
1/8 teaspoon nutmeg  
¼ teaspoon cloves  
5 tablespoons coconut-palm sugar  
2-3 apples, cored, peeled and sliced into wedges  
2 tablespoons butter  
¼ cup brown sugar

Preheat oven to 375 degrees and grease a 9x9 baking pan. Add bread cubes to the baking pan. In a medium bowl whisk eggs, milk, vanilla, ½ teaspoon cinnamon, ginger, nutmeg, cloves and coconut-palm sugar. Pour over the bread, pushing the bread down to soak up the liquid.

In a large skillet over medium-low heat, add the apples and butter. Sprinkle with 1 teaspoon cinnamon, stir and cover to steam for about 3 minutes. Sprinkle with brown sugar. Continue cooking with cover off until tender and slightly caramelized (you don't want them to get mushy). Remove from heat to cool slightly. Spoon caramelized apples over the bread.

Bake on center rack for 20-30 minutes. Knife inserted in the middle should be dry. Remove from oven. Drizzle with maple syrup.

### Papi's Pecan Pie Pancakes

2 cups flour  
3 tablespoons white sugar  
2 tablespoons baking powder  
1 1/2 cups chopped pecans  
1/4 cup butter, melted  
1 3/4 cups milk  
2 tablespoons cinnamon  
2 eggs  
1/2 cup brown sugar (to be sprinkled on pancakes)

Mix the flour, white sugar, baking powder and pecans until well combined. Add the milk and eggs and mix until the mixture is combined; you will still have lumps. Then add cinnamon and melted butter. Preheat pan to 350 F and butter lightly. Pour a healthy 1/2 cup of batter to the pan, distributing the pecans. Before flipping the pancake, sprinkle about a tablespoon of brown sugar on pancake. Try to avoid edges, because it will burn. For a crunchier cake, you can add more pecans with the brown sugar as well.

kept confidential and will only be available in an aggregate form. Meaning your information will be part of a collective number regarding production, but would not be made available if the release of the information would individually identify an operator. You should feel confident that your information will be handled carefully and re-

sponsibly.

Information packets should arrive in December and you are asked to complete the Census by February. There will be an online option for farmers, too, if you would prefer to avoid mailing a paper copy. You will receive a postcard in December providing you with a link to the online Census form. If you have questions, you can call 1-888-424-7828 or

## Four stores pay for price-scanning errors

The N.C. Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services' Standards Division recently collected fines from stores in Durham, Onslow, Richmond and Scotland counties because of excessive price-scanner errors.

"As the holiday's approach, we want consumers to be confident that the price on the shelf matches the price that's scanned at the register," said Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler. "Most stores pass inspection. Ones that have excessive price-scanner errors are fined until they come into compliance. Consumers who would like to file a complaint about a store can call the Standards Division at 919-707-3225."

The department conducts periodic, unannounced inspections of a business' price-scanner system to check for accuracy between the prices advertised and the prices that ring up at the register. If a store has more than a 2-percent error rate on overcharges, inspectors discuss the findings with the store manager and conduct a more intensive follow-up inspection. Undercharges are also reported, but do not count against a store.

Penalties are assessed if a store fails a follow-up inspection. In addition to the penalties paid, the store will be subject to re-inspection every 60 days from the last inspection until it meets the 2-percent-or-less error rate. Additional penalties may be assessed if the store fails a re-inspection. Following are stores that paid civil penalties in the first quarter of 2017:

(Durham) Dollar General #12773 at 101 Gan-yard Farm Way, Durham, paid \$2,622.50 in civil penalties. An initial inspection in March found an

error rate of 6 percent, based on three overcharges in a 50-item lot. A second inspection in April found an error rate of 3 percent, based on nine overcharges in a 300-item lot. The store paid \$517.50. A third inspection in June found an error rate of 5.67 percent, based on 17 overcharges in a 300-item lot. The store was assessed and paid \$2,105 in penalties. The store passed inspection in August.

(Onslow) K-Mart, 175 Freedom Way, Jacksonville paid \$720 in civil penalties. An initial inspection in May found an error rate of 3 percent, based on three overcharges in a 100-item lot. A second inspection in June found an error rate of 3 percent based on nine overcharges in a 300-item lot. The store paid \$720. A third inspection in August found an error rate of 2.67 percent, based on eight overcharges in a 300-item lot. The store was assessed \$1,595 in penalties and will be re-inspected.

(Richmond) Wal-Mart, 720 US Hwy 74 E, Rockingham, paid \$1,350 in civil penalties. An initial inspection in June found an error rate of 5 percent, based on five overcharges in a 100-item lot. A second inspection in August found an error rate of 3 percent, based on nine overcharges on a 300-item lot. The store paid \$1,350 and will be re-inspected.

(Scotland) Wal-Mart, 901 Hwy 401 South, Laurinburg paid \$1,035 in civil penalties. An initial inspection in May found an error rate of 4 percent based on four overcharges in a 100-item lot. A second inspection in June found an error rate of 2.67 percent based on eight overcharges in a 300-item lot. The store paid \$1,035. The store passed inspection in August.

## Ips and pine damage

and filled with wood dust. If an adult beetle is present, a magnifying glass may aid in confirming its identity. Ips species are very small and have depressed or concave hind ends. They look like some bigger bug took a bite out of their behinds.

Once Ips is diagnosed in a tree, only half of the puzzle is solved. Remember, Ips are opportunists so something else caused the tree to be damaged or stressed in the first place. Lightning, prolonged drought or flooding, as well as damaging ice and wind storms are natural tree stressors that often precede Ips attacks. Trees can also be stressed by human activities, and secondary pests like Ips often tell us we are not treating our trees right. When we have positively diagnosed Ips, but cannot pin the cause of the infestation on a natural event, it's time to pull out an unlikely investigatory tool, a hand-held mirror. Looking at the image in the mirror, one should ask, "did I do something that stressed my trees, or did I give my trees the best chance to grow healthy and strong?"

Some ways we stress our trees, often without knowing it, are:

Forgetting about the roots. Usually we only think about the part of the tree we see; the part above the ground. However, it is estimated that 20 percent of a tree is underground in the root system. Roots can be stressed or killed by lack of drainage, compacted soil, grade changes, or mechanical damage. Root loss creates an imbalance that causes the tree tops to suffer also.

Not thinking like a pine. Ask any pine and it will tell you it is happy when you give it plenty of sun, leave its roots alone, and let the organic forest floor provide it with life giving nutrients. They won't talk about it often, but pines despise being forced to coexist with turf grasses, which are fierce competitors for water and nutrients in the soil. Most pines like a little bit of competition but will complain that turf grasses do not play fairly (turf grasses feel the same way about pines). If given a choice, pines prefer a natural forest floor or a mulched landscape understory over manicured lawns.

Lack of room to grow. Thinning is important to pines. Historically, fires and insects killed weaker trees and opened forest canopies for healthy pine crowns to spread out. If you don't thin your pine stand, Ips will thin it for you, and you might not like the way they do it.

Now put down your magnifying glass and mirror, and take a walk in the forest. Be sure to ask your trees what they need. And don't let Ips finish the sentence for the pines. If you need help, or have trouble understanding tree language, call your county ranger and ask them to translate for you. They can get you started with a plan to grow healthy, happy trees.
