The 4th Annual Got to Be NC Show Pig Sale will be held June 9 at the Johnston County Livestock Arena at 520 County Home Road, Smithfield. The show will start at 9 a.m., with the sale to begin at 1 p.m.

"This sale features top quality hogs for youth interested in show-quality animals," said Billy Lewis, livestock marketing specialist with the N.C. Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.

At this year's sale, fair youth participants are eligible to enter a drawing for a purebred gilt that will be given away after the sale. The gilt is provided by

On-farm review program aims for compliance with Food Safety Modernization Act

The Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA) was signed into law in 2011 to improve the safety of all foods regulated by the FDA, including fruits and vegetables. FSMA establishes a "farm to fork" approach of ensuring the safety of our food supply with a focus on preventing food safety issues.

In 2015, FDA issued the Produce Safety Rule which details science-based minimum standards for the growing, harvesting, packing and holding of fruits and vegetables. Farms that produce fresh fruits and vegetables commonly consumed raw may be

subject to the PSR. Farm eligibility to the PSR is detailed and includes several size and activity based exemptions and exclusions that farmers need to understand before inspections begin in early 2019.

Under the leadership of Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler, the department worked with the National Association of State Departments of Agriculture to establish the Produce Safety Consortium. This group of state and federal partners was tasked with establishing produce safety programs, resulting in the development of the On-Farm Readiness Review to assist farmers with FSMA and PSR compliance.

Troxler recognized early on that the farming community would need assistance in order to be successful in implementing these new and far-reaching food safety standards.

An OFRR is an anonymous, voluntary, non-regulatory visit conducted by produce safety professionals at the invitation of the farmer. The goal of the OFRR is to help farmers determine if they are exempt from the Produce Safety Rule, assess current farm readiness for PSR compliance and provide farmers with information

to help them in their preparations to meet the requirements of the PSR.

An OFRR is not an audit, nor is it a pre-inspection – the farm is provided with resources and information to assist their food safety efforts. NCDA&CS, in collaboration with N.C. State University Cooperative Extension, is signing growers up for On-Farm Readiness Reviews for fruit and vegetable farms potentially impacted by the PSR.

"I strongly encourage all fresh fruit and vegetable farm-

NCDA&CS encourages WNV and EEE vaccinations

Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler is encouraging horse owners to have their animals vaccinated against Eastern Equine Encephalomyelitis and West Nile Virus. "April until November is prime mosquito-breeding season in North Carolina and when horses are at risk if

not properly vaccinated," Troxler said. "EEE is fatal 90 percent of the time in horses and WNV has a fatality rate of 30 percent. Both diseases are preventable by vaccination."

There were six recorded cases of EEE in horses in North Carolina in 2017, but the mild winter

could cause that number to go up this year, State Veterinarian Doug Meckes said. Meckes recommends that equine owners talk to their veterinarians about an effective vaccination protocol to protect horses from mosquito-borne diseases. The combination vaccination initially requires multiple

injections for horses, mules and donkeys that have no prior vaccination history. Meckes recommends a booster shot every six months.

Symptoms of EEE include impaired vision, aimless wandering, head pressing, circling, (See WNV and EEE, pg. 2)

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From the tractor by Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler


Many colleges and universities have recently turned out this year's brand new crop of graduates, and I hope as they look to begin their careers some will consider jobs in agriculture.

ers to take advantage of the opportunity," Troxler said. "The Produce Safety Rule requirements are complicated and the review is a great way to get one-on-one technical assistance to better understand these requirements."

Prior to participating in an OFRR, farmers must attend the Produce Safety Alliance Grower Training Course, or an equivalent training course, to become familiar with the PSR rule. These training courses satisfy the training requirement

Companies recall kratom powders

Pious Lion of Asheville and Buffalo Distro Group of Mechanicsville, Va. are voluntarily recalling kratom powder distributed in North Carolina.

The companies launched the recall after samples collected from a retail location by the North Carolina Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services Rapid Response Team tested positive for Salmonella, which may cause life-threatening illness.

"This is a very serious issue and consumers should take immediate action if they have these products in their homes. Consumers are advised to discard these products and are warned not to consume them," said Joe Reardon, assistant commissioner of regulatory programs.

The following products are included in this advisory:

-- Pious Lion Pure Premium Potent Limited Release Pink Bali, 1 oz
-- Pious Lion Pure Premium

Potent White Maeng DA, Bright Uplifting Energy, 4 oz

Pious Lion may distribute these products in other size packages, and none of the packages bear code information.

-- Buffalo Distro Group Red Maeng Da Organic Kratom Powder (All sizes) – Distributed between April 1 – May 15, 2018

Any containers used to store the kratom product should be thoroughly washed and sanitized. In order to prevent cross-contamination, consumers should wash their hands, work surfaces and utensils thoroughly after contact with these products, and not prepare any food in the area at the same time.

The products were collected for testing by the NCDA&CS Rapid Response Team after notification by the N.C. Department of Health and Human Services of a possible association of these products with an illness attributed to Salmonella. DHHS, the Centers for Disease Control and other

inability to swallow, irregular staggering gait, paralysis, convulsions and death. Once a horse has been bitten by an infected mosquito, it may take three to 10 days for symptoms to appear.

Symptoms of WNV include fever, weakness or paralysis of hind limbs, impaired vision, head

pressing, seizures and aimless wandering.

"If your horses or other equine animals exhibit any symptoms of EEE or WNV, contact your veterinarian immediately," Meckes said.

"It's also a great time to make sure your animal is current on

its rabies vaccination, Troxler said. "In North Carolina we see about five cases of rabies in livestock each year. Horses are naturally curious animals, which puts them at risk for a bite if a rabid animal gets through their fence line."

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Agronomic advice to improve your centipede lawn

Centipede is a popular, low-maintenance turf for lawns that is particularly adaptive to sandy soils in eastern North Carolina, as well as more clayey soils in the Piedmont region of the state. It requires infrequent mowing and little management compared to other warm-season grasses such as Bermuda or St. Augustine. With warm-season grasses now greening up, it is a good time to look at centipede from a fertility management perspective.

In general, centipede is a grass that performs best long-term with minimal fertilization. In many soils, phosphorus index levels (P-I) may already be high from prior fertilization. This may have occurred over time by over-application of phosphorus-rich fertilizers in a lawn or may already exist in new landscapes

converted from farmland where fertilizer demand was higher.

Centipede health may decline when soil test P levels are excessive (P-I > 100). Another important point to remember is that centipede needs low nitrogen fertilization, only a half-pound per 1,000 sq. ft. applied once a year around late May to early June. Do not overfertilize it with nitrogen to achieve a dark green turf; it is naturally light-green in color. Nitrogen and phosphorus are the first and second numbers on a bag of fertilizer, respectively, listed as percentage by weight.

“Before planning to grow centipede, it is always a good idea to test your soil first” said Jagathi Kamalakanthan, an agronomist with the N.C. Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services. Unlike other warm-season turf species that can tolerate a soil pH

of 6.0 or higher, a soil pH of 5.5 is desired for centipede lawns. High soil pH may occur due to over-application of lime and may exist naturally in coastal counties where soil often contains shell fragments. Frequent use of high alkaline irrigation water, also found in coastal counties, may also result in high soil pH.

If centipede is desired and not established, soil pH can be adjusted by using elemental sulfur (S) at a rate of 5 lbs. per 1,000 sq. ft. to drop the soil pH by 1 unit (for example pH 6.5 to 5.5). For clay soils, the rate can be doubled. These are general guidelines. To speed up sulfur’s reactivity, mixing S well in the top four inches of soil and keeping the soil moist is helpful. Since the overall process is slow, it is important to plan well in advance of establishing a centipede lawn. Soil ideally

needs to be resampled in four to six months after a sulfur application to check pH prior to seeding or sod establishment. Precautions and label directions for elemental sulfur use should be followed to avoid any physical harm to the applicator.

In established lawns with high pH, attempts to lower pH by S addition can be made, but success may not be achieved depending on the existing pH level. It is also important to wash S off foliage to avoid burn. Iron deficiency often results from high soil pH and higher-than-desired P levels; yellow color resulting from these conditions can be temporally resolved by foliar iron sprays.

“Where soil test reveals a pH level greater than 6.5, such as often found in coastal counties, or when high phosphorus index levels are believed to be

the problem, the best long-term solution may be selection of another grass type such as St. Augustine, Zoysia or Bermuda as these grasses can grow well in soils where centipede struggles,” Kamalakanthan said.

Poor centipede growth may not be due to pH or fertilizer management. Homeowners need to be aware that centipede does not tolerate some herbicides and competition from other grasses can weaken its root system. Insects, nematodes and diseases may cause poor growth, too. Your county Cooperative Extension Service can help you with these concerns as well as those dealing with fertility. Take your pick of these blueberry recipes

Fresh NC Blueberry Coffee Cake

2 cups fresh NC blueberries
2/3 cup sugar
3 teaspoons cornstarch
3/4 cup butter, softened
1 1/2 cup sugar
3 eggs
3 cups all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
12 ounces sour cream
1 teaspoon almond extract
3/4 cup finely chopped pecans
Powdered Sugar Glaze
1 1/2 cup sifted powdered sugar
1 teaspoon warm water
3/4 teaspoon almond extract

add 1 1/2 cups sugar, beating until well blended. Add the eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Combine flour, baking powder, soda and salt. Add to creamed mixture alternately with sour cream. Stir in almond extract. Spoon 1/2 of the batter into a 10 or 12 inch tube pan.

Spoon 1/2 of the berry sauce and 1/2 the chopped pecans, swirling partially through the batter with a knife. Repeat with remaining batter, berry sauce and sprinkle with remaining pecans. Bake at 325F for 1 1/4 - 1 1/2 hours or until done. Let stand for 10 minutes before removing from pan. Place on serving plate. Combine powdered sugar glaze ingredients. Drizzle over slightly warm cake.

Blueberry Upside Down Cake

1/4 cup butter
1/4 teaspoon salt
3/4 cup brown sugar
2 teaspoons lemon juice

2 cups fresh NC blueberries
1/2 cup buttermilk
2 tablespoons sugar
1 1/3 cups flour
1 teaspoon lemon extract
1 egg, unbeaten
2 teaspoons baking powder
3/4 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon baking soda

Cream 3/4 cup brown sugar, 1/4 cup butter and 1 teaspoon lemon juice. Spread into a greased wax paper lined 8x8x2-inch pan. Coarsely chop blueberries and mix with 2 tablespoons sugar, spread over mixture in pan. Sprinkle with 1 teaspoon lemon juice and set aside. Sift together dry ingredients. In another bowl, cream 1/4 cup butter 3/4 cup sugar, buttermilk, lemon extract and egg until well blended. Mix creamed mixture into dry ingredients for 2 minutes on medium speed. Pour over blueberries. Bake at 350F 30-35 minutes. When done, loosen cake from sides, invert and gently peel off wax paper.

Combine berries, 2/3 cup sugar and cornstarch in a small saucepan. Cook over low heat until sauce is thickened, stirring constantly. About 5-6 minutes. Set sauce aside. Cream butter. Gradually

2018 blueberry crop expected to be good

Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler says the 2018 blueberry season is shaping up to be a good one despite unusually cold weather in the first quarter of the year.

“Our blueberry growers have become accustomed to dealing with unusual weather,” Troxler said. “They have done an excellent job protecting the crop from frost this year, and overall, it is in very good condition. Consumers should expect fresh, N.C. blueberries from now through July.”

To celebrate the season, the department will host two Blueberry Days in June. The State Farmers Market in Raleigh will host Blueberry Day on June 21. From 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., visitors can enjoy free blueberry dessert samples, fresh blueberries and recipes. On June 22, the Robert G. Shaw Piedmont Triad Farmers Market in Colfax will host its Blueberry Day from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Market staff will be



serving up free scoops of blueberry ice cream, recipes and more.

Blueberry lovers also can celebrate the season during the annual N.C. Blueberry Festival in Burgaw June 15 and 16. The weekend features blueberry cooking contests, a bike ride, barbecue cookoff, scholarship pageant and more. Details are available at www.ncblueberryfestival.com.

North Carolina is the sixth-largest producer of blueberries in the nation. About 8,000 acres of blueberries are grown in the state. In 2016, blueberry produc-

tion was valued at \$66.9 million. Most of the blueberries grown in the state are sold to retail stores. When buying blueberries, the department encourages consumers to look for “North Carolina” on the label. 
