ADFP Trust Fund awards over \$3.2 million

The N.C. Agricultural Development and Farmland Preservation Trust Fund recently awarded more than \$3.28 million to help communities across the state protect farmland and promote agricultural enterprises. More than \$2.8 million went towards obtaining conservation easements on 1,432 acres of land across the state.

"I am excited that we have been able to help fund easements on more than 1,400 acres of farmland across our state," said Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler. "These easements take the development pressure off of these families and help maintain their status as working lands for generations to come."

Following is a list of projects:

Ashe County received \$14,000 to create a Farmland Protection Plan.

Cabarrus Soil and Water Conservation District received \$60,146 to help purchase a perpetual conservation easement on 35 acres of cropland and forestland in Cabarrus County.

Catawba Lands Conservancy received \$183,461 to help purchase a perpetual conservation easement on a 275-acre dairy farm in Lincoln County.

Cleveland County received \$150,000 to assist in the purchase of specialized grain handling equipment in Cleveland County and the surrounding area with the objective of developing a regional marketplace for corn, soybeans, wheat and specialty small grains.

Hyde Soil and Water Conservation District received \$540,611 to help purchase a perpetual conservation easement on 210 acres of cropland.

Mainspring Conservation

Trust received \$1,240,368 to help purchase a perpetual conservation easement on 104 acres of cropland in Cherokee County.

N.C. Foundation for Soil & Water Conservation received \$114,000 to assist with the purchase of equipment and supplies for a statewide outreach program to improve pasture management, ensure farms are drought resilient and provide conservation equipment to soil and water conservation districts.

Pender County Soil and Water Conservation District received two grants: \$32,678 to purchase a 50-year easement on 103 acres of forestland and \$17,705 to help purchase a perpetual conservation easement on 105 acres of cropland and forestland.

Piedmont Lands Conservancy received two grants: \$208,475 to help purchase a perpetual conser-

vation easement on a 114-acre dairy farm and \$167,905 to help purchase a perpetual conservation easement on a 94-acre dairy farm. Both farms are in Randolph County.

Southern Appalachian Highlands Conservancy received two grants: \$210,000 to help purchase a perpetual conservation easement on 215 acres of cropland and forestland and \$125,000 to help purchase a perpetual conservation easement on 155 acres of cropland and forestland. These lands are in Haywood County.

Stanly County received \$200,000 to assist with the purchase of equipment for a multi-use arena project. The arena will provide a new venue for activities related to outdoor agriculture, livestock and agritourism.

Peak-season agronomic lab fees go into effect Dec. 1

Sample and submit now to avoid fees

Fall is not only a great time of year for football, pumpkin spice and changing leaves, it is also an excellent time to take soil samples for testing through the N.C. Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services Agronomic Services Lab.

By submitting samples before Dec. 1, users

can avoid peak-season fees and get results back quickly.

The peak-season testing fee will be in effect through March 31, 2018. During this time period, the cost of soil testing is \$4 per sample. The fee originated in 2013 to encourage earlier sampling in the fall, one of the busiest times of the year for the lab.

Outside of the peak season, soil testing is free to growers. Samples with completed soil sample information forms must be delivered and received by the Agronomic Services Division prior to Dec. 1 to avoid the fee. Samples will not be accepted without completed paperwork.

"The agricultural industry is very much aware of the peak-season fee now, and it has been successful," said Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler. "With people submitting their samples earlier, it has helped reduce turnaround time for test results. In addition, our lab has

As I am writing this, we are midway of the 150th N.C. State Fair, and we had a great opening weekend of junior livestock shows. You will find photos and an article on page 8 of the newspaper about the Junior Livestock Sale of Champions that brought in a record \$182,500 for our young people.

I am proud and humbled by the support the agricultural community has shown to our youth pro-

grams, and I know their support is helping to develop our future agricultural leaders.

Money raised through the sale goes to the competitors, with a portion also going into a scholarship and education fund. All kids that compete in the livestock shows are eligible to apply for scholarships for higher education purposes. This year, \$73,000 was raised for the scholarship fund, which is a win for all the kids.

I was also honored opening weekend to induct five new members into the N.C. State Fair Livestock Hall of Fame. The five have made significant contributions to the livestock shows at the N.C. State Fair and to the industry.

This year's class included Casey Armstrong of Enfield, Jean Fish of Fuquay-Varina, Carol Turner of Raleigh, Mike Smith of Madison and Wesley Looper of

Granite Falls.

Armstrong has been a member of the N.C. Horse Council for 20 years and served as president of the group in 2005 and 2006. She has also served on the N.C. Board of Agriculture. She was recognized for her support of the horse industry and the horse shows at the fair.

Fish worked at the N.C. Cattlemen's Association's fair booth for more than 30 years, answering questions on cattle breeds, cattle production, show schedules and most any other questions that fairgoers had. She was always patient and gracious in her responses, and many first-time competitors, especially nervous ones, will remember her handing out lucky pennies before they stepped into the show ring. There's no telling how many pennies she passed out over the years.

Turner worked in the State Fair Livestock Office for many years, handling the paperwork and show schedules for the shows. But she was recognized for her role in starting and growing the Special Awards Show. This program gives youth and adults with special needs the opportunity to show animals at the fair. Because of her work, the exhibitors receive ribbons, medallions and fair premiums for showing, an enriching experience for the competitors and one that did not exist before Turner started the special shows 20 years ago.

Smith is the inspiration and a driving force behind the Special Awards Show. He was the first and only exhibitor the first year of the program. Smith, who has Down Syndrome, trav-

eled across the state with his family to livestock events, but never had the opportunity to participate until 1997. We work very hard as a department to highlight our No. 1 industry and help consumers make a connection between the farm and the food, fiber and fuel that is produced there.

Fall fire prevention tips offered

With fall wildfire season here, the N.C. Forest Service encourages North Carolinians to take steps to ensure careful burning of leaves and yard debris.

Fall wildfire season typically lasts from mid-October until mid-December, the time of year when people do a lot of yard work that may include burning leaves and yard debris. These fires sometimes escape and start wildfires. In fact, debris burning is the top cause of wildfires in N.C.

“Between October and November of 2016, there were 1,138 wildfires that burned more than 59,511 acres across the state,” said Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler. “All of us can do our part to avoid another fall fire season like last year by exercising caution while burning debris.”

There are many factors to consider before burning any debris. The N.C. Forest Service encourages residents considering debris burning to contact their local county forest ranger. The ranger can offer technical advice and explain the best options to help maximize the safety to people, property and the forest.

Follow these tips to protect property and prevent wildfires:

Consider alternatives to burning. Some types of debris, such as leaves, grass and stubble, may be of more value if they are not burned, but used for mulch instead.

Check local burning laws. Some communities allow burning only during specified hours. Others forbid it entirely.

Make sure you have a valid permit. You can obtain a burning permit at any Forest Service office or authorized permitting agent, or online at <http://ncforestservice.gov>.

Keep an eye on the weather. Don't burn on dry, windy days.

Local fire officials can recommend a safe way to burn debris. Don't pile vegetation on the ground. Instead, place it in a cleared area and contain it in a screened receptacle away from overhead branches and wires.

Household trash should be hauled away to a trash or recycling station. It is illegal to burn anything other than yard debris.

Be sure you are fully prepared before burning. To control the fire, you will need a hose, bucket, steel rake and a shovel for tossing dirt on the fire. Keep a phone nearby, too.

Never use kerosene, gasoline, diesel fuel or other flammable liquids to speed debris burning.

Stay with your fire until it is completely out.

These same tips hold true for campfires and charcoal grills as well. Douse burning charcoal briquettes or campfires thoroughly with water. When soaked, stir the coals and soak them again. Be sure they are out cold and carefully feel to be sure they are extinguished. Never dump hot ashes or coals into a wooded area.

Burning agricultural residue and forestland litter: In addition to the rules above, a fire line should be plowed around the area to be burned. Large fields should be separated into small plots for burning one at a time. Before doing any burning in a wooded area, contact your county ranger, who will weigh all factors, explain them and offer technical advice.

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N.C. wine and grape industry grows to \$1.97 billion

A recent study has found that North Carolina's wine and grape industry continues to grow, posting a 15 percent increase since the last study was conducted two years ago. The total economic impact of the industry now is \$1.97 billion.

"When you establish a vineyard in a community, you are physically and financially setting down roots in that community for the long haul," said Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler. "Growth in the state's wine industry represents long-term economic growth for rural North Carolina."

The study was commissioned by the N.C. Wine and Grape Growers Council and conducted by Frank, Rimerman

+ Co. using data from 2016. The firm also conducted the council's 2009, 2013 and 2015 economic impact studies.

The most significant change in the reports is the increase in wine production. Since 2013, North Carolina wineries have produced

96 percent more cases of wine, from 569,000 nine-liter cases to 1,115,000 cases. The state also saw increases of more than 40 percent in wages paid to employees, retail value of wine sold, and taxes paid to federal, state and local governments.

The majority of N.C. wineries rely on sales at their tasting rooms or direct sales to restaurants and retail stores. As such, tourism is a significant part of revenue for many of the state's wineries. In 2016, an estimated 1.9 million people visited N.C. wineries. Increased tourism was responsible for a 47 percent increase in tourism jobs from 2013 to 2016.

New Improving Pastures Program announced

The North Carolina Conservation Partners announce the roll out of the 2017 Improving Pastures Program, which includes pasture renovation equipment for rent to producers.

North Carolina's pasture and haylands support the state's livestock industry, one of agriculture's key economic sectors. Many N.C. pastures and haylands were damaged during the 2016 drought. This program seeks to improve drought resilience of pastures.

The Golden LEAF Foundation awarded a \$200,000 grant to the N.C. Foundation for Soil and Water Conservation to purchase pasture renovation equipment in 14 counties – Alamance, Alexander, Buncombe, Cleveland, Franklin, Harnett, Haywood, Johnston, Lincoln, McDowell, Macon, Madison, Surry and Union.

Producers can rent the equipment through their local soil and water conservation district offices. Equipment purchased includes no-till drills, broadcast seed spreaders and weed wipers. Conservation districts chose equipment that would be most useful to their county's producers.

"Golden LEAF is pleased to support North Carolina farmers," said Dan Gerlach, Golden LEAF president. "Recent natural disasters have left pastures in poor condition and this collaborative outreach program will help farmers in 14 counties increase crop yields by providing technical resources, training, and equipment needed to improve pastures and drought resilience."

The N.C. Agricultural Development and Farmland Preservation Trust Fund awarded \$114,000 to the N.C. Foundation for Soil and Water Conservation to purchase additional equipment in Cabarrus, Rutherford, Wilkes, and other counties and to establish pasture management demonstrations in 21 counties. Local soil and water conservation districts will manage the equipment and host field days to highlight effective pasture and forage management techniques. Participating counties will be announced in the future. 2018 field days will be advertised broadly so all producers can take advantage of these opportunities.

"The health of our pastures is very important for the health of our livestock," said Agriculture Commission-

er Steve Troxler. "The Agricultural Development and Farmland Preservation Trust Fund is pleased to help fund the purchase of equipment and support educational programs to assist farmers with pasture renovation."

The project is supported by the N.C. Cattlemen's Association, the N.C. Horse Council, the N.C. Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts, the N.C. Farm Bureau Federation, the N.C. Agriculture Foundation and N.C. Cooperative Extension.

"It is important to the North Carolina Cattlemen's Association that our farmers have the resources and training to renew and maintain grazing systems that will not only help them to be profitable but to ensure they can continue to be good stewards of the animals, land and the water that these hard-working farming care for," said Bryan Blinson, NC Cattlemen's Association Executive Director.

"N.C. Farm Bureau is very proud to participate in the 2017 Improving Pastures Initiative helping farm-

been able to improve efficiency by using fees to add robotic equipment and hire temporary personnel during the busy season."

Last year the soil testing lab's longest turnaround time was nine weeks, which occurred on Dec. 1 after the start of the fee period. Turnaround time was down to two weeks by the third week of January. Up-to-date turnaround times can always be found at www.ncagr.gov/agronomi/PALS/.

Access to the Eaddy Building for sample drop-off is limited so growers need to keep this in mind. This year the gate will be closed during the Thanksgiving holiday period – Wednesday, Nov. 22, at 5 p.m. through Monday, Nov. 27, at 6 a.m. During the fee period, sample drop-off times will be between 6 a.m. and 6 p.m. Monday through Friday. There will be no after-hours drop-off of samples during peak season.

Growers are encouraged to submit sample information forms online. Starting Dec. 1, they can also pay peak-season

fees with a credit card using a secure online payment service called PayPoint. Online submission can be accessed through the PALS homepage at www.ncagr.gov/agronomi/PALS/ after a user account is established under the Utility link.

If faster turnaround time is needed, the lab offers an expedited soil testing service on a limited basis. Growers can purchase expedited shippers, which can hold up to 36 soil samples, for \$200 each while supplies last. The service guarantees a seven-

business-day turnaround time if the lab is contacted and notified 24 hours in advance of the quantity being delivered. Otherwise, the guaranteed turnaround time of two weeks upon delivery at the lab is offered. These guarantees exclude the Christmas season. Unused expedited shippers can be used in following years.

ers learn ways to improve their pastures and haylands as well as provide access to pasture and hayland renovation equipment such as no-till drills and weed control tools.” said Larry Wooten, NC Farm Bureau President.

“Members of the Better Pastures NC, an interagency consortium to support pasture-based agriculture, gathered to plan demonstration on how to renovate these damaged pastures and then manage them to be resilient to future disasters. Obtaining new no-till drills suitable for plating a variety of forages was a high priority for the group given the lack of equipment is one factor limiting the ability

of farmers to renovate their pastures. We greatly appreciate the leadership of the NC Foundation for Soil and Water Conservation in obtaining funding from the Golden LEAF Foundation and the NC Agriculture Development and Farmland Preservation Trust Fund to help support the purchase of this crucial equipment”. said Dr. Matt Poore, the Extension Livestock Commodity Coordinator with N.C. Cooperative Extension.


