Who we are: Tuttle Educational State Forest is a 361-acre forest located in the Foothills between Lenoir and Morganton. We have three full-time rangers dedicated to the education of school groups and maintenance of the forest. Our forest is comprised of more than 20 different timber stands, several wildlife food plots and more than 10 miles of well-marked hiking trails.

What we offer to teachers:

 We have more than 15 classes that we can teach, which are all free and correlated to the North Carolina Standard Course of Study. Classes are conducted outdoors and provide hands-on activities for students.

What we offer to children and their families:

- 1) We have a Kids Fish for Fun day in May for children aged 12 and younger who are accompanied by a chaperone. Participants must sign up at Tuttle Educational State Forest office ahead of time.
- 2) We have a youth deer hunt in November for youth ages 12-17 who are accompanied by a chaperone. Participants must register for a permit with the N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission.
- 3) We have 13 open picnic sites and one covered shelter available by reservation only, more than 10 miles of hiking trails and multiple self-guided exhibits throughout the forest. These amenities are available at no cost.
