- We provide our sister agency, the N.C. Division of Water Quality, with forestry statistics and information for each of the 17 river basins in North Carolina
- Each year, the DWQ revises several basin-wide plans.



RESTORATION

Purlear Creek in Wilkes County

Received a \$508,000 grant from the Clean Water Management Trust Fund to help restore 4,000 feet of stream and a forest riparian buffer on Rendezvous Mountain Educational State Forest.

...Acquired <u>NEW</u> state-of-the-art Sand Wand® technology from a U.S. EPA Non-point Source 319 Grant for low-impact sediment removal as part of this project.

Riparian Land Protection

- With our state and local funding partners, we protected 200+ acres in the Triangle metro area
- More than \$1 million provided by our partners for critical riparian forestland protection (this includes a Neuse River stream branch confirmed as habitat for the Least-Brook Lamprey, an endangered species in North Carolina).
- Completed our final report on the stabilization of 1,200 acres of land along Mountain Island Lake.
- ...This property, owned by local governments, is being transformed into a <u>NEW</u> educational state forest to serve people in the Charlotte metropolitan area.
