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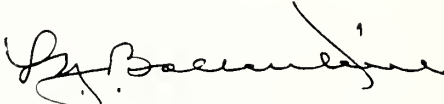

FOREWORD

Agriculture, as we know it today, is the result of far reaching technological changes which have occurred within a relatively short period. From 1820 to 1850 one U. S. farmer produced food for himself and three other people. Today, one farmer is producing enough food for himself and 25 other people. Farm output per man-hour of labor is now twice as high as in 1940. This means that the record high output of food and fiber is being attained by fewer and fewer farm workers. More than twice as many people are engaged in activities related to agriculture than in the actual production of food and fiber. In addition to about 7.5 million workers on U. S. farms and ranches, about 6 million people are employed by agricultural industries to supply farmers with equipment, fertilizer, seed and other items used in production, and another 10 million people are needed to store, transport, process, and merchandise agricultural products. Hence, almost one-third of the Nation's labor force is engaged in agriculture and related industries.



This issue of "AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS" represents one of several activities carried on by the North Carolina Department of Agriculture in serving Tar Heel farmers and others in various segments of business and Government closely related to agriculture. Statistics are a basic tool in determining the current status of agriculture and serve as guideposts in making plans for the future. This publication is intended to supply much of the informational material about agriculture in North Carolina needed and requested by individuals and organizations.

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INTRODUCTION

Crop and livestock reporting is a service rendered to farmers and others in our State by the North Carolina Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

This issue of 'Agricultural Statistics' brings together the more important series of current and historic statistics concerning agriculture in the State. Information comparable to that given in this publication for earlier years may be obtained from previous issues of 'Agricultural Statistics'. Our semi-monthly release entitled 'Farm Report' and various other periodic releases are published to meet the needs of persons requiring information on a weekly, monthly or seasonal basis.

County estimates of acres harvested for each of the eleven principal crops, shown on pages 12 through 25, are based on the Annual North Carolina Farm Census.

The North Carolina Crop Reporting Service publishes official estimates of Crop and livestock production, prices paid and received by farmers, and various other special reports. A list of the more important reports and the approximate date of release is shown in the table on this page. 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Total cash farm income, including Government payments, received by North Carolina farmers during 1959 amounted to \$978,936,000 - a drop of 65 million dollars, or about six percent, from the \$1,043,720,000 received in 1958. The loss in receipts was due to a drop in income from both crops and livestock and to a drastic reduction in Government payments, the last item falling from \$38 million in 1958 to \$11 million in 1959 for a decrease of 71 percent. The sharp cut-back in Government payments followed the discontinuance of the Soil Bank program which was no longer in effect after the 1958 crop year.

Cash farm income and 'cash receipts' as treated in this publication refer to receipts from sales of farm commodities during the calendar year and should not be confused with value of production during the year.

CASH RECEIPTS FROM LIVESTOCK SECOND HIGHEST OF RECORD

North Carolina farmers received \$297,335,000 from the sale of livestock and livestock products during 1959, the State's second highest income from these sources on record. The record high, 4.9 percent above the 1959 receipts and amounting to \$312,038,000, was obtained in 1958. The livestock industry from a standpoint of cash income thus has become second to the production of tobacco in North Carolina. A detailed treatment of trends in production and income from livestock will be found on page 31.

CASH RECEIPTS FROM 1959 SALE OF CROPS DOWN 3.3 PERCENT

Cash farm income during 1959 from the sale of crops in North Carolina at 671 million dollars showed a decrease of 3.3 percent from the previous year's receipts of 694 million, and it was short of the 1956 record income of 755 million by 11 percent.

Although there was an increase for 1959 over 1958 in receipts for cotton, wheat, and oats, other major crops registered losses. Bearing the brunt of these losses was tobacco with an 18 million dollar setback, followed by peanuts with a 13 million dollar loss. Less spectacular reductions were registered by corn and soybeans. Among the remaining crops, gains and losses were about offsetting.

HARVESTED CROPLAND TAKES UPTURN

Acres of crops harvested in North Carolina during 1959 amounted to about 380,000 more than were harvested in 1958, bringing the total close to five and a half million acres. This increase marks the first time since 1952, when six and a quarter million acres were harvested, that the acreage producing crops has not been below the acreage harvested during the preceding year.

ACREAGE, YIELD AND PRODUCTION OF MAJOR CROPS

TABACCO: North Carolina far outstrips all other states in the nation in the production of tobacco. Acres of all types harvested in 1959 amounted to 468,300. This was more than double the 222,300 acres harvested in Kentucky, the State's nearest competitor, and it was almost 41 percent of the United States' total. Its production at 723,130,000 pounds was over twice that of Kentucky's and it made up 40 percent of the United States total. The State's 1959 flue-cured crop covering 463,000 acres, made up two-thirds of the Nation's total and towered above South Carolina's acreage, the next largest, by 472 percent. North Carolina flue-cured production at 702,942,000 pounds amounted to 65 percent of the United States total.

Trends in North Carolina's tobacco yields have climbed to a very high level, with those for 1958 breaking all previous records for all tobacco types. In that year, one percent more flue-cured tobacco than was harvested in 1949 was produced on 31 percent fewer acres.

Improvements in burley yields have been as spectacular as those for flue-cured, having been increased by 39 percent within the same 1949-58 period. Thus, statewide improvements in yields have greatly helped to reduce losses in cash receipts for tobacco which otherwise would have occurred through drastically reduced acreages. The 1958 flue-cured acres amounted to only 429,000, the smallest acreage since 1921 when only 415,000 acres were harvested. With favorable weather conditions and good management practices, however, a record flue-cured yield of 1,718 pounds per acre was harvested in 1958, lifting total production to 737 million pounds or 86 million pounds (13.2 percent) above the production for 1957. Due to very unfavorable weather 1959 yields were not so good as for 1958, and production dropped 4.6 percent despite a 6.9 percent increase in acreage harvested.

In addition to turning out a smaller production in 1959, growers received slightly less (one-tenth of a cent) per pound for tobacco than in 1958. Cash receipts for tobacco were, thus, decreased by 4.1 percent to \$420,164,000, or, as previously recorded, \$18 million less than the \$438,214,000 received in 1958.

Burley tobacco made up only 2.1 percent of the total 1959 tobacco acreage in North Carolina. This crop, nevertheless, is of

considerable economic importance in the areas where it is grown, principally in the Mountains. The burley acreage also has been sharply reduced. In 1945 it occupied 13,000 acres. By 1958 it had been cut to 9,300 acres or the lowest since 1943 when 8,500 acres were harvested. The 1959 growth was increased to 9,800 acres with a record yield of 2,060 pounds per acre. Production amounted to 20,188,000 pounds. This output was 1,588,000 pounds, or 8.5 percent more than the previous year's crop and it was the largest crop of burley produced since 1954.

Record high and low acreages, yields and production of all types of tobacco and other crops will be found on the inside back cover.

CORN: Production of corn is more widely distributed and occupies larger acreages of cropland than that of any other crop grown in North Carolina. Acres harvested fell below two million only one time from 1876 to 1955 and that was in 1929 when almost two million, namely 1,985,000, acres were harvested. From 1940 to 1957 the acreage showed a gradual decline. In 1956 it again fell below the two million mark and in 1957 and 1958 it was estimated at 1,850,000 acres. With the release of land from the Soil Bank and a sharp reduction in soybeans planted, the corn acreage lacked only 2,000 acres of hitting again the two million mark in 1959.

Recent improvements in yields through improved practices and wider use of hybrid seed have been outstanding. In 1958 North Carolina farmers made a record corn yield of 44 bushels to the acre, which exceeded the previous record (1956) by three bushels. Production in 1958 at 81,400,000 bushels was also a record even on a greatly reduced acreage. Production of corn in 1959, under a greatly expanded acreage and with a yield only one bushel short of the 1958 record, again hit an all-time high in amounting to 85,914,000 bushels. Sharply reduced prices, however, brought cash receipts of \$35,741,000 to 1.2 percent below the \$36,174,000 reported for 1958.

SORGHUM GRAIN: This crop has become of increasing importance in North Carolina during recent years. The 106,000 acres harvested in 1959 was 6,000 above the acreage for 1958. The 1959 yield broke all previous records by reaching 33 bushels per acre, or one-half bushel above the previous high reached in 1958. Production for 1959 amounted to 3,498,000 bushels, or an increase of 7.6 percent over the 3,250,000 produced in 1958. Cash farm receipts for sales of sorghum grain in 1959 amounted to \$1,832,000 as compared with receipts of \$1,467,000 in 1958.

COTTON: North Carolina farmers harvested 390,000 acres of cotton in 1959, or an increase of 48.3 percent over the 263,000 harvested in 1958. This sharp increase came about almost wholly through the planting of acreages released from the Soil Bank. Even so, the acreage harvested was the third smallest since 1868 and it emphasizes the extent to which cotton growing has been reduced when compared with the 1,802,000 acres harvested in 1926. Total bales produced in 1959 amounted to 322,000 as against 256,000 produced in 1958. Cash farm income from cotton lint and seed totaled \$55,358,000 in 1959, a \$7,357,000 increase over the receipts from this source in 1958.

SOYBEANS: There has been a marked increase in the production of soybeans in North Carolina within the past five years. In 1954 the acres harvested amounted to 289,000 and in 1958 they reached 454,000, or an increase of 57 percent. Yields likewise have been on the increase. In 1954 the average yield was 17 bushels per acre and in 1959 the average was 22 bushels. The record yield was 23 bushels in 1958. Production in 1959 amounted to 9,592,000 bushels or 8.1 percent less than the 10,442,000 - bushel crop of 1958. Cash farm income from soybeans amounted to \$19,866,000 which was short of the receipts of \$22,535,000 for 1958 by 11.8 percent.

PEANUTS: A total of 281,240,000 pounds of peanuts was harvested in the State during 1959. This output was considerably short of the 331,080,000 pounds produced in 1958. Since total acres harvested were the same (178,000) for both years, a sharply reduced yield for 1959 accounted for the difference in production. In 1958 the average yield at 1,860 pounds was an all-time record high, while under very unfavorable weather conditions in 1959 the yield dropped to 1,580 pounds per acre. Cash farm receipts for peanuts amounted to \$29,650,000 in 1959, which was almost 13 million dollars short of the \$42,319,000 received in 1958.

OATS: During most of the 1880's North Carolina produced over a half million acres of oats. From this high the acreage gradually shrank to 142,000 in 1920, after which there was a slow build up, with minor fluctuations, to 492,000 acres in 1956, which was followed by another downward trend. Acres harvested in 1959 amounted to 390,000 or a 16 percent increase over the 1958 acreage of 336,000. Cash farm income from the sale of oats in 1959 amounted to \$2,193,000 as compared with receipts of \$2,164,000 in 1958.

WHEAT: Acreage of wheat harvested reached a high of 800,000 acres in 1884 and again in 1901 and 1902, after which it hovered fairly close to a half million until 1920. By 1930 acres harvested had shrunk to 265,000. Since then it has wavered from a little over 300,000 acres to slightly over a half million, landing at 398,000 acres in 1959. A 1959 yield of 23.5 bushels per acre (short of the record 25.5-bushel yield of 1956 by one and a half bushels) brought forth a production of 9,353,000 bushels, the second highest of record and exceeded only by the 9,384,000 - bushel crop of 1956. Cash farm income from wheat for 1959 totaled \$12,024,000 and exceeded the \$9,154,000 received in 1958 by 31.4 percent.

1958 MONTHLY WEATHER CROP SUMMARY

JANUARY: This was the coldest month in ten years. All of North Carolina had temperatures averaging from five to ten degrees below normal. Freezing weather occurred on most days throughout the state. Precipitation totals did not vary greatly from normal amounts for January, and no section of North Carolina reported either unusually large or unusually small amounts of precipitation. Soils remained quite wet during the month, however, due to the persistent cold weather which hindered normal drying processes. Small grains were damaged somewhat by the cold, wet weather. On the whole, January weather was unfavorable to outside farm activity.

FEBRUARY: February was even colder than January, and was the coldest February in 24 years. There were two days on which the mercury failed to climb above the freezing mark in any part of North Carolina. A new all-time record low temperature for the State was established on the morning of the 17th when a reading of twenty-three degrees below zero was recorded at Clingman's Peak. Precipitation was near normal in all areas. Snow fell in all sections and was only slightly above normal. Farm work continued at a standstill as soil moisture remained above normal and the ground was frozen during much of the month. Small grains bore the brunt of the frigid weather.

MARCH: A continuation of below normal temperatures marked the third month of 1958 in North Carolina. Although there was no severely cold weather, a majority of days featured cloudiness which kept daytime warming at a minimum. Statewide averages of temperature ranged from four to seven degrees below normal. Precipitation varied from slightly below normal amounts in the west to a little above normal in the coastal area. Nearly all crop conditions were reported as poor to fair with soil moisture remaining above normal for the third consecutive month. Most farm operations were behind schedule.

APRIL: North Carolina weather was variable in April. Even though monthly temperatures averaged near normal, there were below normal temperatures during the first part of the month, while quite warm weather occurred during the latter part. Frequent rain, heavy cloudiness, and a few severe thunderstorms further characterized April. Statewide rainfall was variable with heavy amounts falling in the southwestern counties, tapering off to near normal in the eastern Coastal Plain. Soils were rather wet, causing delay in planting of crops. Pastures and small grains made good recoveries from the damaging winter weather.

MAY: Weather patterns changed with regularity during May so that both fair and foul weather were equally significant. No great departures in temperatures were noted, and monthly averages were nearly normal throughout North Carolina. Rainfall was at least normal in amount over practically all areas of the State, and some sections of the upper Coastal Plain had as much as twelve inches. Rain was also heavy over the upper basins of the Tar and Neuse Rivers, causing some of the heaviest flooding in several years on those rivers. Soil moisture conditions were generally favorable in most sections for transplanting and seeding operations to proceed rapidly.

JUNE: Changing weather conditions prevented June weather from becoming stagnant for any prolonged period. Conditions were generally satisfactory for agriculture, and crops made adequate growth. Soil moisture varied from dry to wet, depending on the location and the time of the month. Temperatures averaged below normal in all sections, especially in the eastern half of the State. The first part of the month was about normal, while the latter part was cool for the time of year. Rainfall was heavy in the southeastern counties ranging to much below normal in the southern mountains. Frequent showers brought most other sections near normal rainfall.

JULY: North Carolina weather during July was controlled by a persistent high pressure area centered off the southeast coast. As a result, southerly winds bringing warm, moist air over the State resulted in frequent thundershower activity during nearly every day of the month. This scattered activity produced normal and above normal amounts of rainfall except on the immediate coast, where generally less than one inch of rain fell. Temperatures remained near normal most of the month, with a rather hot spell as the month ended; high humidities and sultry weather added to the effect of the heat. Frequent thundershowers maintained ample soil moisture in most areas, enabling crops to approach maturity with excellent prospects.

AUGUST: August followed the pattern of the earlier summer months by having near normal temperatures and rather numerous thundershowers. Above normal rainfall was recorded over the eastern half of North Carolina, with the northeastern Coastal Plain averaging near ten inches. Hurricane Daisy passed some distance offshore on the 28th, but little damage was caused by the storm. Most of the rainfall surplus came from this storm; some areas had even been dry before, but no widespread harm had resulted from drought. Harvesting of early maturing crops was on schedule, and the outlook for corn and other late fall crops was good.

SEPTEMBER: Generally fair and dry weather prevailed in North Carolina during September until the end of the month, when Hurricane Helene moved up the lower coast. Wind gusts as high as 144 miles per hour were recorded with the storm, and damage was widespread, but no deaths or injuries were reported. Rainfall totals on the immediate coast were boosted considerably, with some totals for the month as high as ten inches. The inland sections remained dry, however, with some totals less than an inch for the entire month. Crop damage from Hurricane Helene was mainly to corn in the coastal counties.

OCTOBER: Pleasant October weather was the rule for all of North Carolina except the coastal region. Farming operations were aided by many sunny days as most of the harvesting was completed. Several passing low pressure areas caused more cloudiness near the coast, as well as above normal rainfall over most of the Coastal Plain. Elsewhere, rainfall was near normal and provided generally adequate moisture for the soil. Temperatures over the State were a little on the cool side, averaging somewhat below normal for the month. Light frost occurred at scattered inland points, but no general killing frost was noted.

NOVEMBER: North Carolina weather was mostly fair and dry during November, with the result that soil moisture declined progressively throughout the month. Such harvesting operations as remained to be carried out proceeded rapidly in the fine weather, but fall seedings of grain suffered somewhat, as did pastures. Temperatures were cool, warm, and near normal in three respective periods from beginning to end of month. Overall, monthly averages were two or three degrees above normal. Rainfall totals were less than two inches east of the mountains except for some wet spots on the Outer Banks.

DECEMBER: Persistent cold weather and record-breaking amounts of rain and snow characterized North Carolina weather during December. Record December snowfalls of eight to eighteen inches occurred in the eastern Piedmont and western Coastal Plain in connection with a low pressure area on the 11th. Several localities set new records for the greatest one-day December rainfall on the 28th when around three inches fell. Monthly averages of temperature were from three to eight degrees below normal; some localities in the central sections had near zero weather on one or more mornings. Snow was beneficial in restoring soil moisture, and the end-of-the-month rains made most areas too wet.

1959 MONTHLY WEATHER CROP SUMMARY

JANUARY: January had a variety of weather, including more than usual sunshine, a few thunderstorms, light snowfall and below normal temperatures. Most farm activity was confined to the latter part of the month because of cold weather and wet soils during the first of the month. Precipitation varied from seven inches in the western mountains to less than two inches over much of the Coastal Plain; even these lesser amounts were sufficient to maintain soil moisture, as temperatures averaged two to four degrees below normal and evaporation was at a minimum.

FEBRUARY: North Carolina weather during February was about normal in most respects. Weather systems moved through the State with constant regularity so that no extreme weather of any one type could dominate the month. There was rain on about half the days, keeping soils rather wet most of the month. Precipitation totaled between two and four inches over most of the State, and some places in the southeastern counties received up to six inches. Sleet and freezing rain on the 3rd did very little damage. Temperatures were about normal throughout the State.

MARCH: This was a satisfactory month for farming operations as soil conditions maintained an ample amount of moisture. Rainfall occurred frequently, but usually in small quantities. Monthly totals of precipitation were a little above normal in the Coastal Plain and generally near normal elsewhere, with only the northern Piedmont falling below normal with less than three inches total. Monthly averages of temperature were one or two degrees below normal, and freezing weather occurred on about half of the days of the month. There were no unusual extremes, however, of either cold or warm weather.

APRIL: The month of April was characterized by frequent changes in weather, and featured some heavy amounts of rainfall. Although planting operations were curtailed for small periods, generally steady progress was made and crops were in good condition. Temperatures averaged slightly above normal, with no great extremes in either direction. All areas except the extreme southeast coast had above normal rainfall with a band of heavy rain extending throughout the east central portion of North Carolina. A few localities had record April rains with more than eight inches recorded.

MAY: High pressure controlled North Carolina weather during most of the month

of May, and favorable weather enabled agricultural interests to proceed with normal farming operations. Rainfall was normal, however, over most of the State, and soil moisture adequate; only the northeastern corner was notably dry, having less than an inch of rain at some points during the entire month. At the other extreme, parts of the southern mountains received as much as 14 inches. Temperatures were mild throughout North Carolina, with averages for the month just a little above normal.

JUNE: Monthly averages of June weather are quite deceptive, for they fail to indicate the extremes that occurred. Temperatures averaged near normal, but a cool spell occurred during the middle of the month with readings dropping to the upper forties in the northern part of the State. On the other hand, readings as high as 105 degrees were recorded during the last five days of June. Rainfall totals for June were also near normal over most of the State, but soils became very dry during a nineteen day period in the middle of the month when scarcely any rain fell in any section. Moderate rain for several days at the beginning of the month and scattered showers near the end accounted for the near-normal totals.

JULY: The weather in July over North Carolina was dominated by moist tropical air that brought frequent thundershowers and uncomfortable high humidities. Rainfall was especially heavy in the eastern two-thirds of the State, where more than eight inches fell in nearly all sections. Amounts varied considerably even over short distances, ranging up to 18 inches at Wilson. Remnants of tropical storm Cindy caused some of the heavy rain, with local thundershowers accounting for the remainder. Temperatures averaged near normal during the month, and showed little day-to-day variation. Crops showed improvement with increased rainfall, and were rated as good over the State generally.

AUGUST: August weather was quite variable both as to time and to place within North Carolina. Temperatures were below normal during the first half of the month, but were consistently on the warm side the rest of the time, resulting in monthly averages just slightly above normal. There were both dry spots and wet spots scattered around the State, with final rainfall totals for the month ranging from one inch to ten inches in varying locations. Soil conditions varied with rainfall distribution, but no locality suffered any appreciable crop damage.

SEPTEMBER: The crop season neared an end with ample amounts of soil moisture in most sections of North Carolina and the condition of crops remaining in the fields at the end of September was reported mostly good. Moderate to heavy rainfall occurred early in the month under the influence of easterly winds off the Atlantic, and more heavy rain fell late in the month as the remnant of Hurricane Gracie moved into the Western Piedmont. Rainfall totals for the month were generally above normal, ranging from three to five inches in the eastern part of the State and six to nine inches in the west. Temperatures averaged near normal, with warm weather at the beginning and end of September and a cool period between.

OCTOBER: The absence of the usual persistent high pressure area over North Carolina prevented the typical autumn weather of dry, sunny days. On the contrary, harvesting operations were hampered by rainy days which numbered about fifteen in all the State. Wet soils also disrupted fall land preparation. All parts of North Carolina had above normal rainfall, with totals ranging from five to ten inches in most sections. There were considerable ups and downs of temperature, but when all days were averaged near normal conditions are shown for the whole month. There was no freezing weather outside the mountains.

NOVEMBER: November followed fairly close to the typical weather pattern for the time of year, featuring fair, sunny days and cold nights. This is normally one of the driest months of the year, and generally light rainfall this month kept totals near normal in all but the coastal and extreme western sections. A few warm days came early in the month, while several nights toward the end dropped into the low twenties. As was the case in the earlier autumn months, averages of temperature were near normal in all parts of the State. The return of good weather enabled farmers to catch up on harvesting and planting delayed during the wet October weather.

DECEMBER: A steady procession of high and low pressure areas kept North Carolina's weather from becoming extreme in December. Taking the month as a whole, the State had near normal conditions of both temperature and precipitation. Cloudiness and fair weather also alternated with the changing weather systems, to give an almost equal amount of each. Precipitation varied with lightest amounts of two inches occurring in the east central area and heavier amounts up to five inches along the coast. Soils ranged from rather wet in some areas of the State to adequate moisture in most areas.

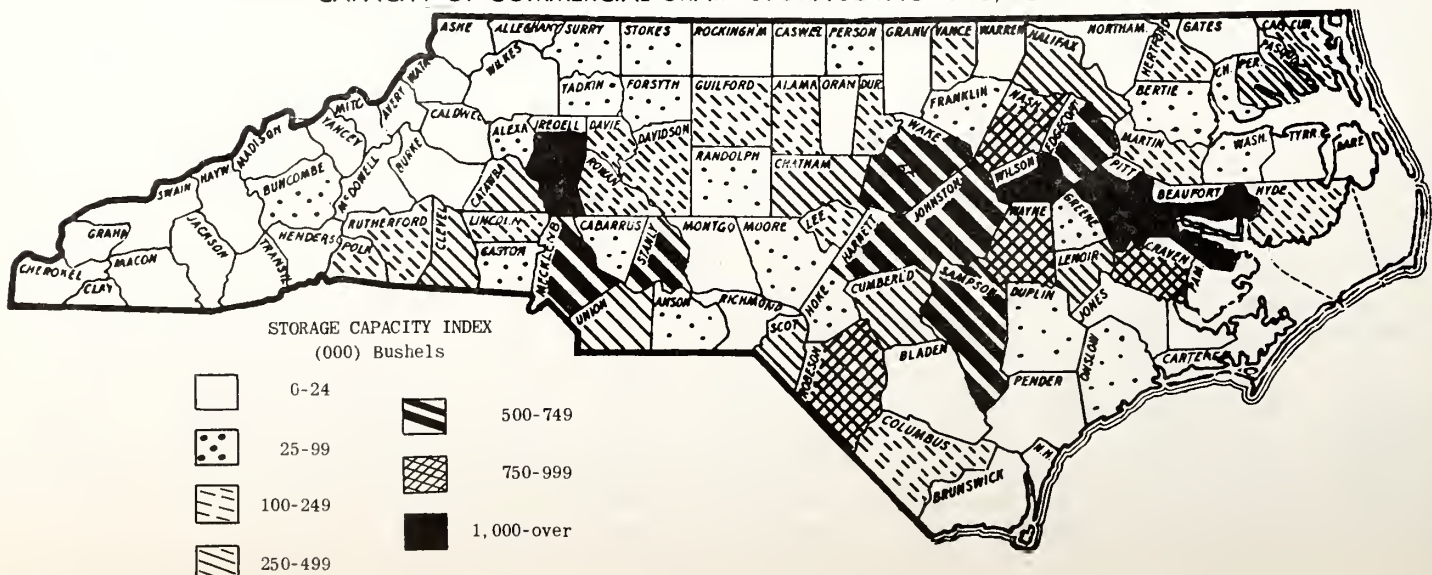

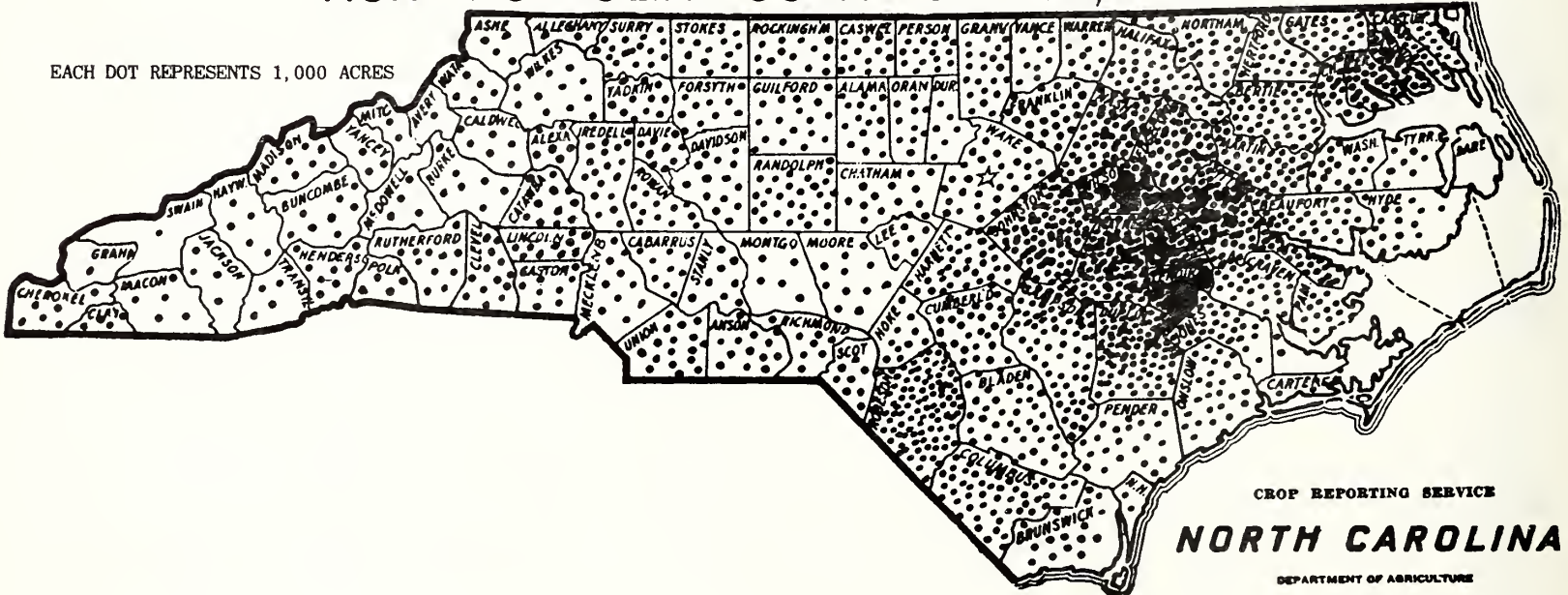
NORTH CAROLINA TOBACCO ACREAGE, 1959

EACH DOT REPRESENTS 1,000 ACRES



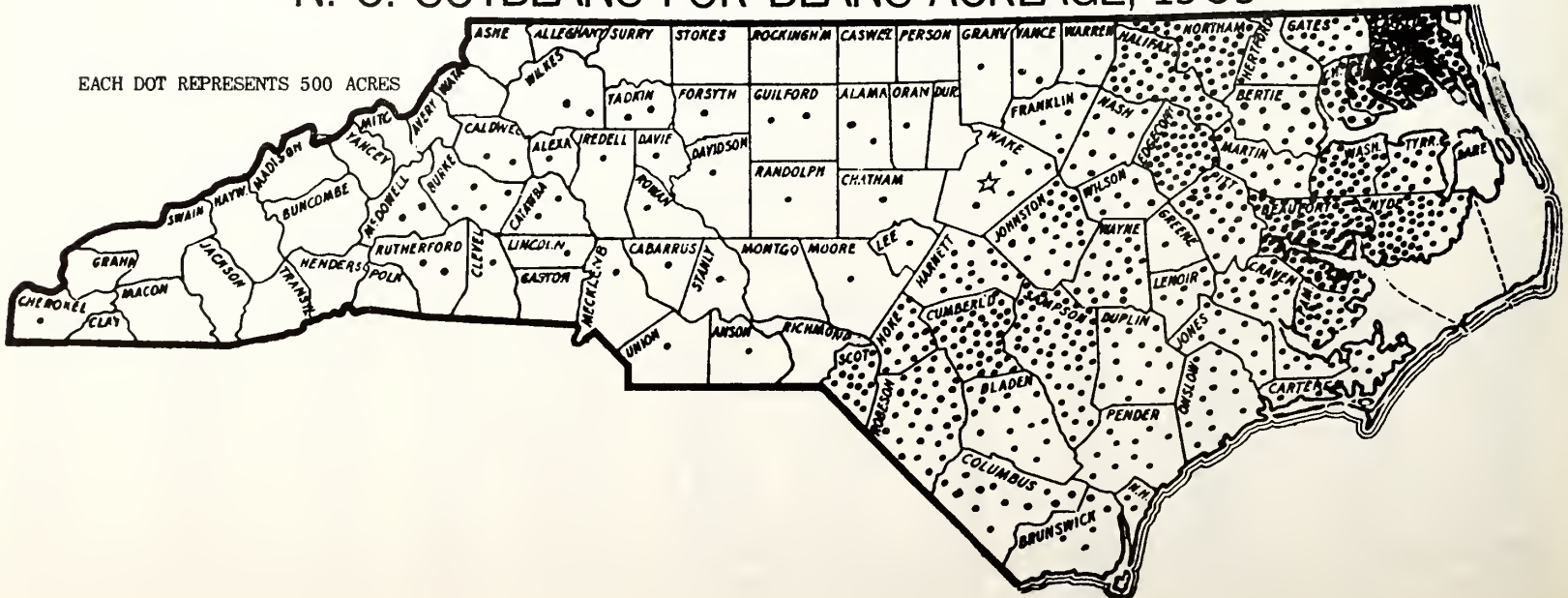

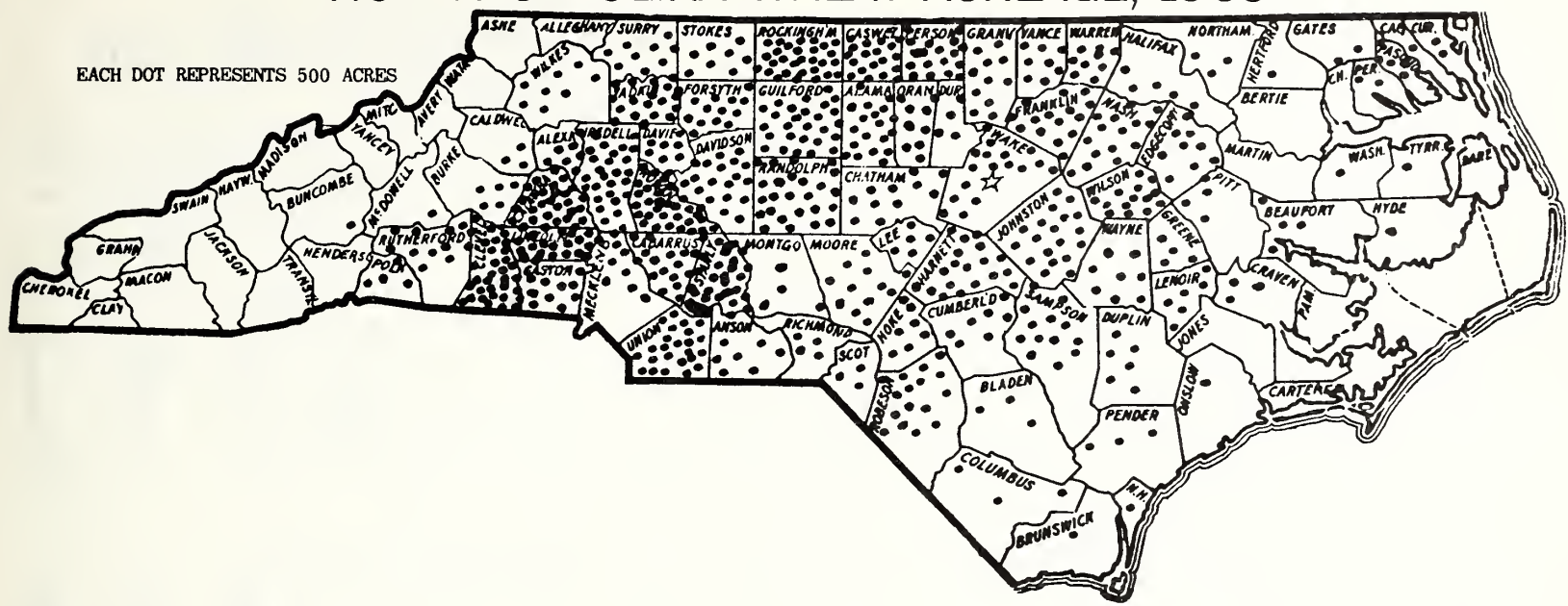

N. C. SOYBEANS FOR BEANS ACREAGE, 1959

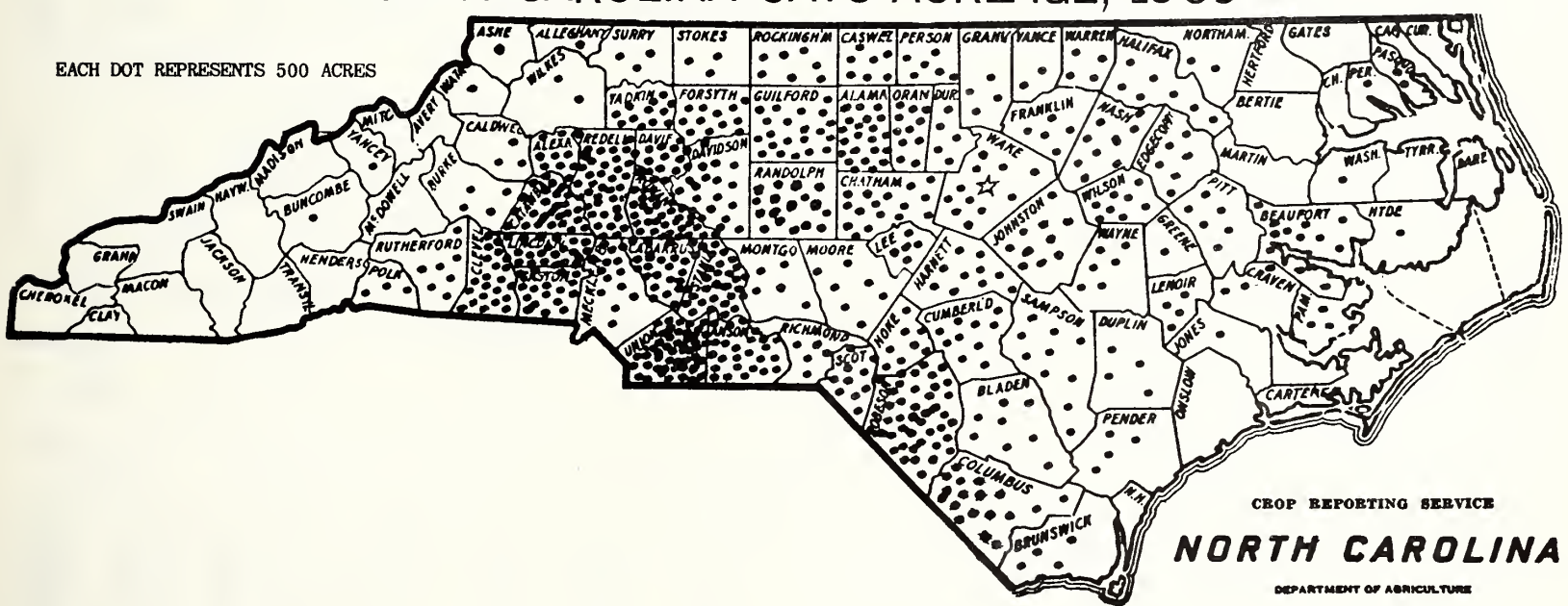

NORTH CAROLINA WHEAT ACREAGE, 1959

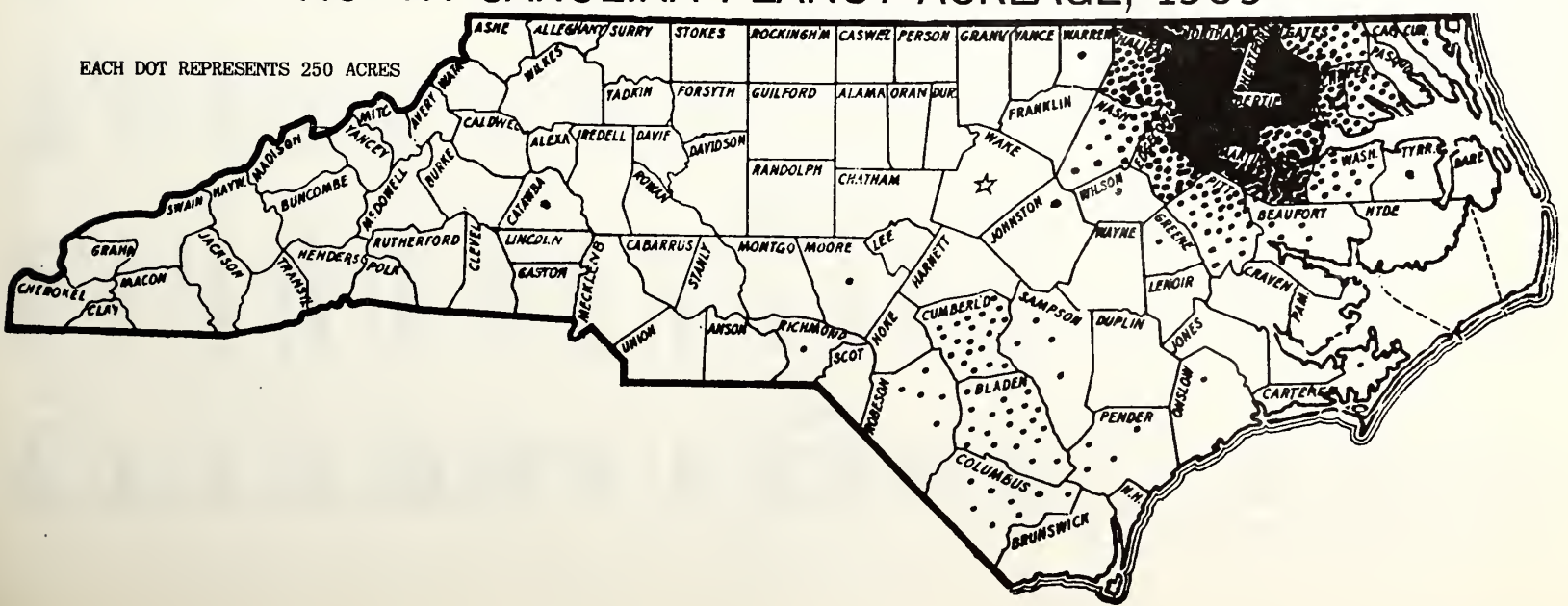


NORTH CAROLINA OATS ACREAGE, 1959

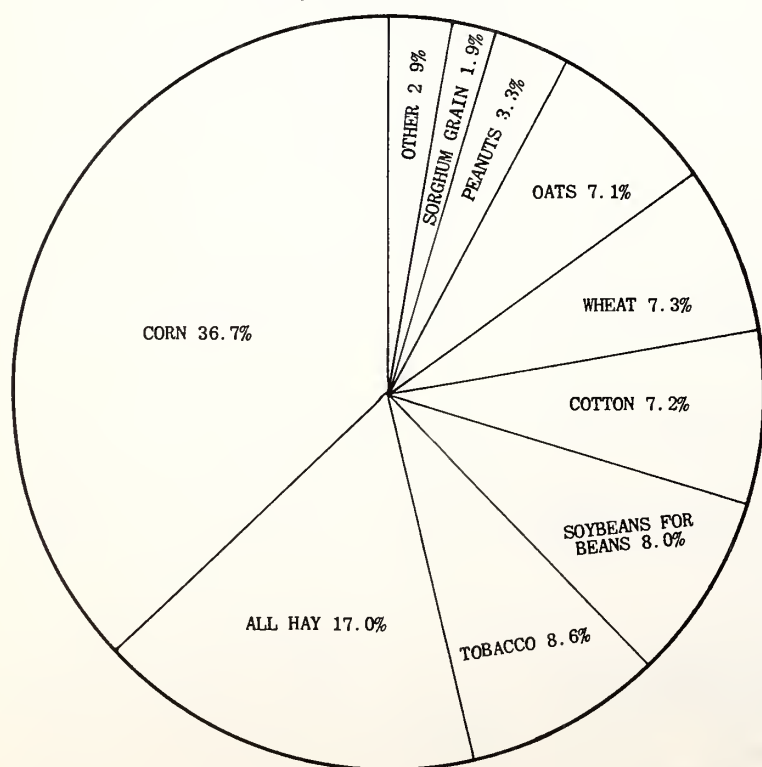

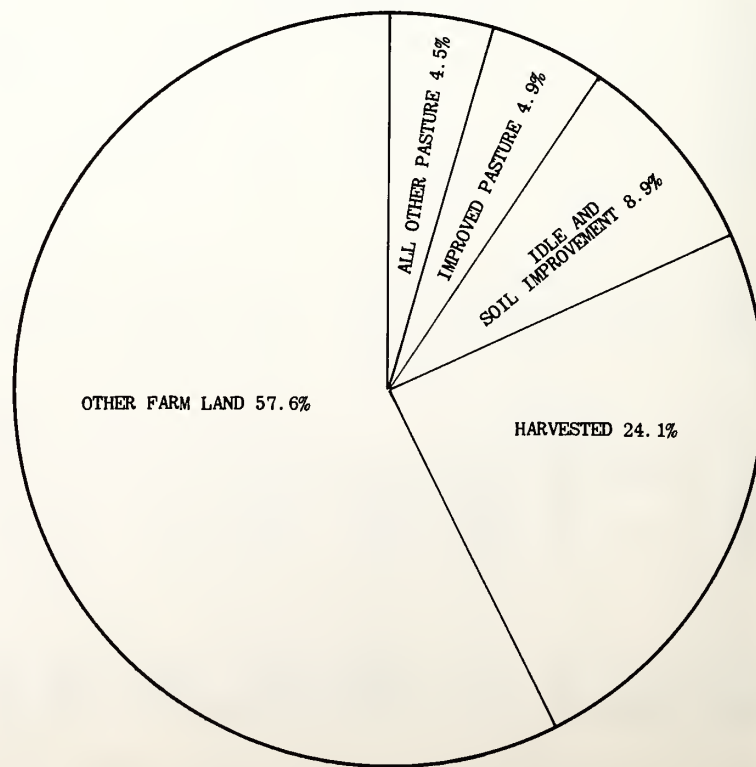

NORTH CAROLINA LIVESTOCK

Livestock production in North Carolina during 1959 continued the uptrend that was prevalent throughout the 1950's. All time record highs for the State were established with the 1959 production of commercial broilers, eggs, cattle and calves, and hogs, and the production of turkeys and milk was the second highest of record. Among other states in the Nation North Carolina ranked fourth in the production of commercial broilers, eleventh in the production of hogs and eggs, thirteenth in the production of turkeys, twenty-first in the production of milk, and thirty-seventh in the production of cattle and calves. In total cash farm receipts from livestock and livestock products during 1959 the State ranked 19th.

Gains in cash receipts from livestock and livestock products, as might be expected, have closely paralleled increases in livestock production so that the contribution of livestock to total farm income is now greater than it was a few years ago. However, cash receipts for livestock and livestock products marketed in 1959 at \$297,335,000 showed a decline of 4.7 percent from the receipts of \$312,038,000 in 1958. Less favorable prices especially for broilers, hogs and eggs were responsible for the decrease. Total cash receipts from livestock and livestock products in 1959 were distributed as follows: broilers, 23.2 percent; dairy products 22.2 percent; hogs, 19.2 percent; eggs, 18.2 percent; cattle and calves, 11.9 percent; turkeys, 2.8 percent, and other 2.5 percent.

Cattle and Calves

There were 1,075,000 cattle and calves on North Carolina farms as of January 1, 1960. This number represented a six percent increase over the 1,014,000 on hand a year earlier, and was 24 percent above the 1949-58 ten-year average inventory of 868,000. The 1960 first-of-year inventory was the highest of record, and marked the fourth consecutive year of increase.

Beef cattle and calves on farms January 1, 1960 amounted to 498,000, the largest inventory of record and an increase of 9 percent over the previous record of 457,000 on farms January 1, 1959. During the 1950's the beef cattle industry expanded at an accelerated rate, with inventories increasing in nine of the 10 years. The one decrease in numbers was in 1956, and it was only a slight change of 4,000 head. The January 1, 1960 inventory is 332 percent above the 150,000 head on hand January 1, 1950.

Cattle and calves have also shown rapid gains in total pounds of meat (liveweight) produced. In 1949, production was estimated at 106,430,000 pounds. For 1959, the production was 201,035,000 pounds or an increase of 6 percent over the 1958 production of 189,720,000 pounds and 89 percent above production in 1949.

Cows and heifers, two years old and over for milk, were estimated at 382,000 as of January 1, 1960, an increase of 2 percent over the 1959 inventory of 375,000. The increase over 1959 in the total number of all cattle was primarily in larger numbers of young animals being raised both for milk production and for beef. Milk cow numbers with moderate fluctuations have been relatively stable for the past several years. The highest number of record, 400,000, was recorded in 1944, and 1945, but numbers have been on a lower level since World War II.

Milk Production

Average milk production per cow in 1959 equaled the record high of 4,960 pounds estimated for the State in 1957. With an average of 351,000 cows milked during the year, production amounted to 1,741 million pounds, and ranked second to the record production of 1,771 million pounds in 1957. In 1947, the 353,000 average number of cows milked produced 1,486 million pounds for a per cow average of only 4,210 pounds. In other words with 2,000 fewer cows than in 1947 the 1959 production was 17 percent greater, the increase being solely attributable to a larger average production per cow. Through better breeding and management practices North Carolina farmers are producing more milk without increasing the number of cows.

Calves Born

During 1959 an estimated 484,000 calves were born on North Carolina farms. This was a record calf crop for the State, exceeding the previous high of 474,000 born in 1958 by 2.1 percent. Births in relation to cows and heifers on hand January 1, have been on the increase particularly in recent years. Thus the increase in the calf crop is due not only to a larger number of milk and beef cows, but also to more intensive breeding programs to increase milk and beef production.

Hogs

Hog numbers on North Carolina farms have followed no particular trend but have fluctuated over the years and are now near the highest

of record. The highest inventory was reported as of January 1, 1916 at 1,675,000 and the lowest occurred in 1930 at 830,000. Since 1956, inventories have shown an increase and for January 1 of 1960 the number stood at 1,564,000 -- up five percent from the 1,490,000 reported for 1959 and exceeding the 1949-58 average of 1,248,000 by 25 percent. Pigs saved in 1959 amounted to 2,613,000 head, the largest pig crop of record, exceeding the previous record number of 2,248,000 saved in 1958 by 16 percent and outstripping the 1949-58 10-year average of 1,862,000 pigs saved by 40 percent. The 1959 crop was 75 percent greater than the 1,489,000 pigs saved in 1948. The increases have been brought about by improved breeding and management practices as well as by larger numbers of sows farrowing. The average number of pigs saved per litter has increased about 16 percent in the last 20 years. Production of pork is also up sharply. Production in 1959 was a record high, amounting to 498,149,000 pounds which was 21 percent above the 410,119,000 produced in 1958 and 72 percent more than the production of 289,566,000 pounds for 1948.

Sheep and Lambs

There were 73,000 sheep and lambs on North Carolina farms as of January 1, 1960. This number represented a 3 percent increase over the 71,000 on hand a year earlier, and was 52 percent above the 1949-58 ten-year average inventory of 48,000 head. Numbers have been increasing rather steadily since 1950 when 35,000 head were reported. In the past 40 years sheep and lamb numbers have fluctuated in the 35,000 to 95,000 range. In earlier years there were much larger numbers in the State, with inventories greater than a half million in the late 1860's.

In 1959 55,000 lambs were saved, to produce a lamb crop 15 percent greater than the 48,000 saved in 1958.

Wool production in the State in 1959 was estimated at 365,000 pounds, a 11 percent increase over the 330,000 pounds shorn in 1959. Wool production also has been increasing steadily since 1950.

Workstock

On January 1, 1960, 179,000 horses and mules were reported on North Carolina farms. This represented a 4 percent decrease from the 186,000 on hand for the 1959 inventory. Also, this is the lowest number of workstock on record in the State. The highest inventory was 428,000 head in 1920, but since then farm mechanization has been growing rapidly and the result has been a rapid decrease in workstock numbers. Even with the large reduction, however, North Carolina ranks second, in the number of workstock on farms being exceeded only by the 218,000 head on farms in Texas. Further reduction will probably be less marked due to the large number of small farms in this State.

Poultry

Chickens on farms (excluding commercial broilers) were estimated at 13,641,000 on January 1, 1960. This was 3.6 percent less than the 14,146,000 on hand on January 1, 1959, but 8 percent above the 1949-58 ten-year average of 12,597,000. In fact the level reached in 1959 and 1960 is comparable with the inventories of World War II years 1944 and 1945. Following World War II a level of about 12,000,000 was maintained until the late 1950's when numbers turned upward.

There has been a sharp reduction in the number of "farm" chickens raised, probably a direct result of the sharp increase in the production of commercial broilers. In 1949, 20,406,000 farm chickens were raised in the State, 23 percent more than the 16,575,000 raised in 1959. Production of commercial broilers has continued to increase, and in 1959 production reached 137,400,000 birds. This was 6 times greater than the number produced 10 years earlier, and 10 times greater than production 15 years ago. North Carolina ranked fourth in Broiler production in 1959, being exceeded by Georgia, Alabama, and Arkansas.

Turkey production in North Carolina has also continued to increase in recent years. In 1949 turkeys raised was estimated at only 486,000. The number raised during 1959 amounted to 1,753,000 for an increase over the period of 260 percent.

Eggs

Egg production reached a record high in North Carolina during 1959 at a total of 1,973 million. This was 8 percent above the 1,828 million produced in 1958, and it exceeded the 1949-58 ten-year average of 1,464 million by 35 percent. The average number of layers on farms has been increasing, and so has the average rate of lay. In 1949 the yearly average number of eggs produced per layer was 153. The comparable figure for 1959 was 199, an increase of 30 percent.

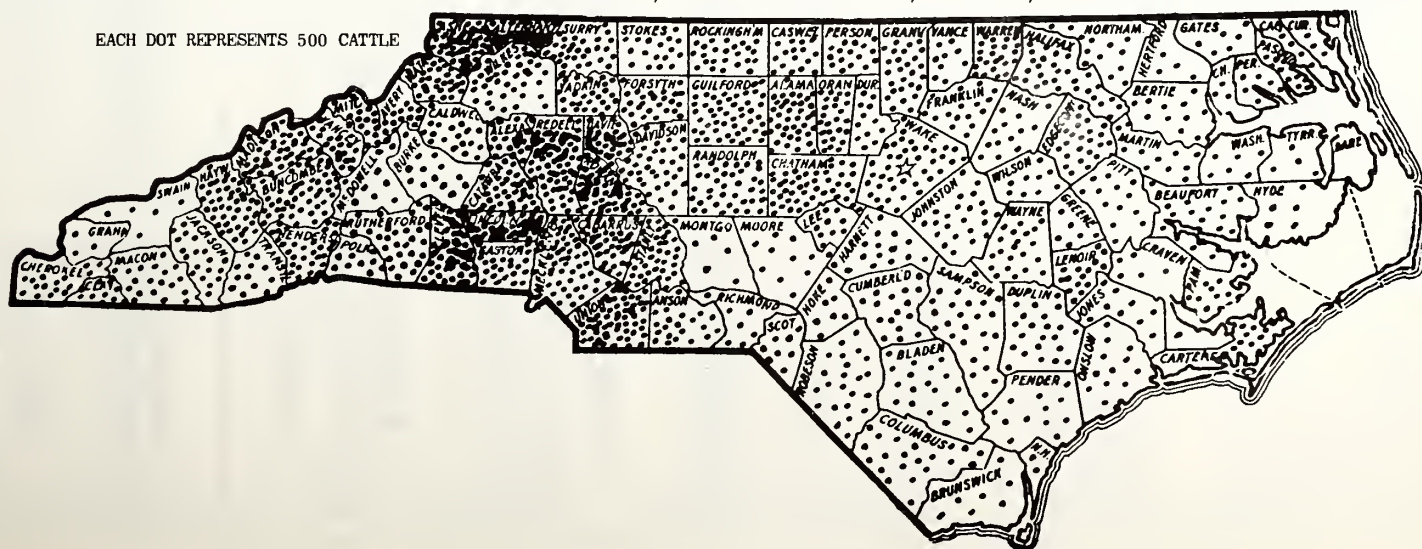

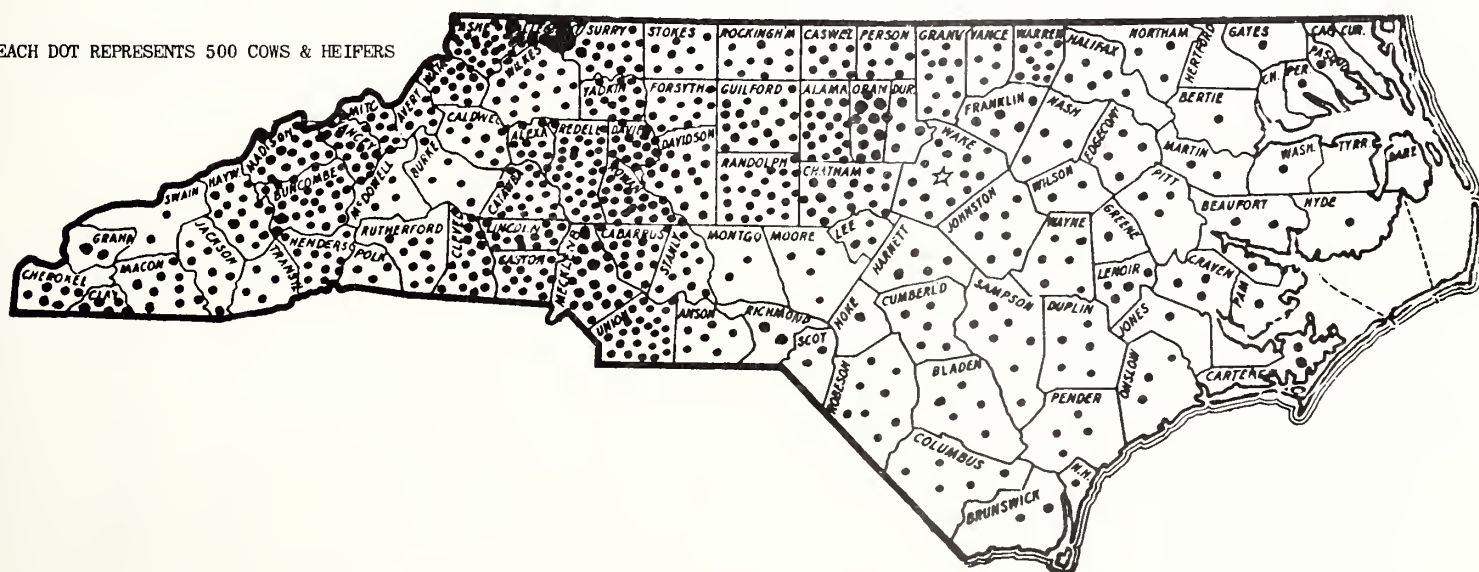

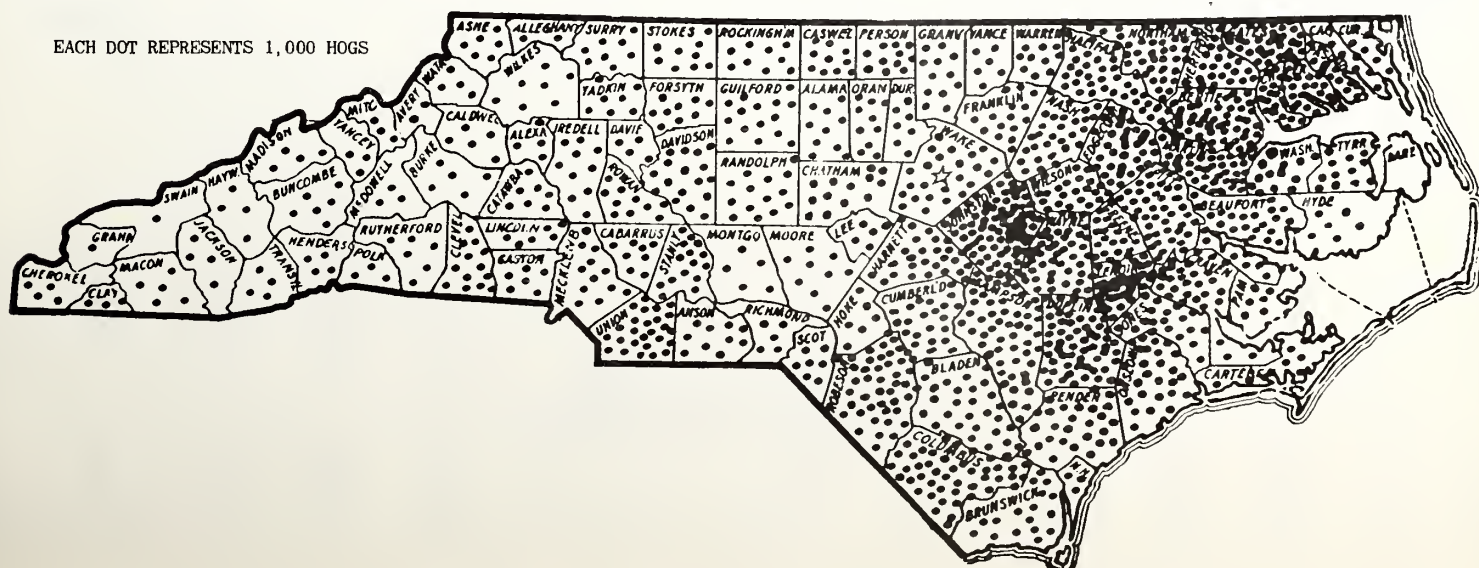
