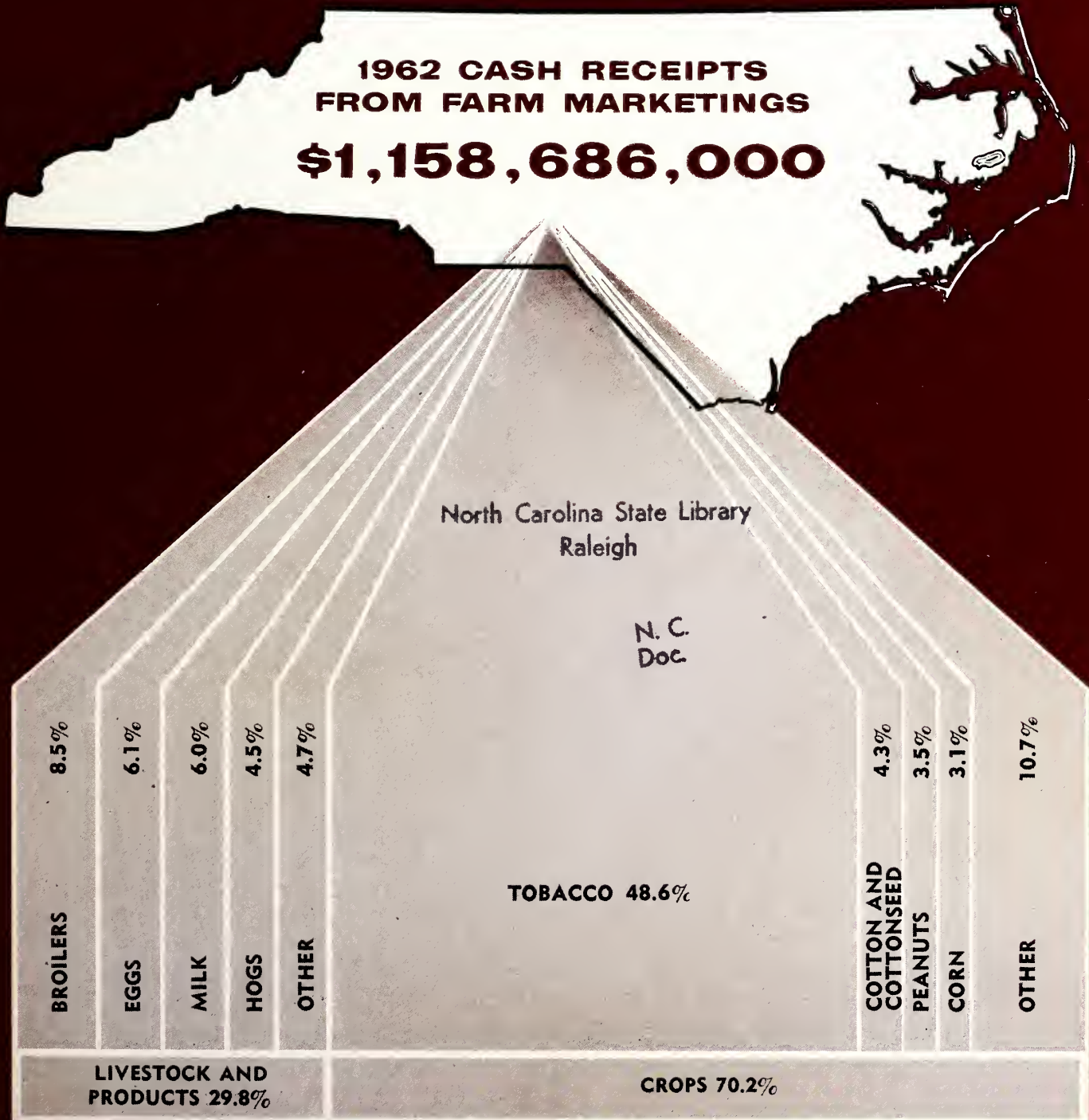

Front Cover

The graph on the front cover shows the source of cash receipts from farm marketings of crops, livestock and livestock products during the calendar year 1962. Cash receipts from marketing of all farm products by Tar Heel farmers totaled \$1,158.7 million — a record high. It will be seen from this graph that all crops accounted for 70.2 percent of the total cash farm receipts and livestock and livestock products accounted for 29.8 percent of the total. Tobacco accounted for 69.2 percent of the total cash receipts from crops and for 48.6 percent of the total cash receipts from marketings of all farm products. It will be noted that the percent of total cash receipts from broilers, eggs, milk and hogs exceeded the percent from any major crop except tobacco.

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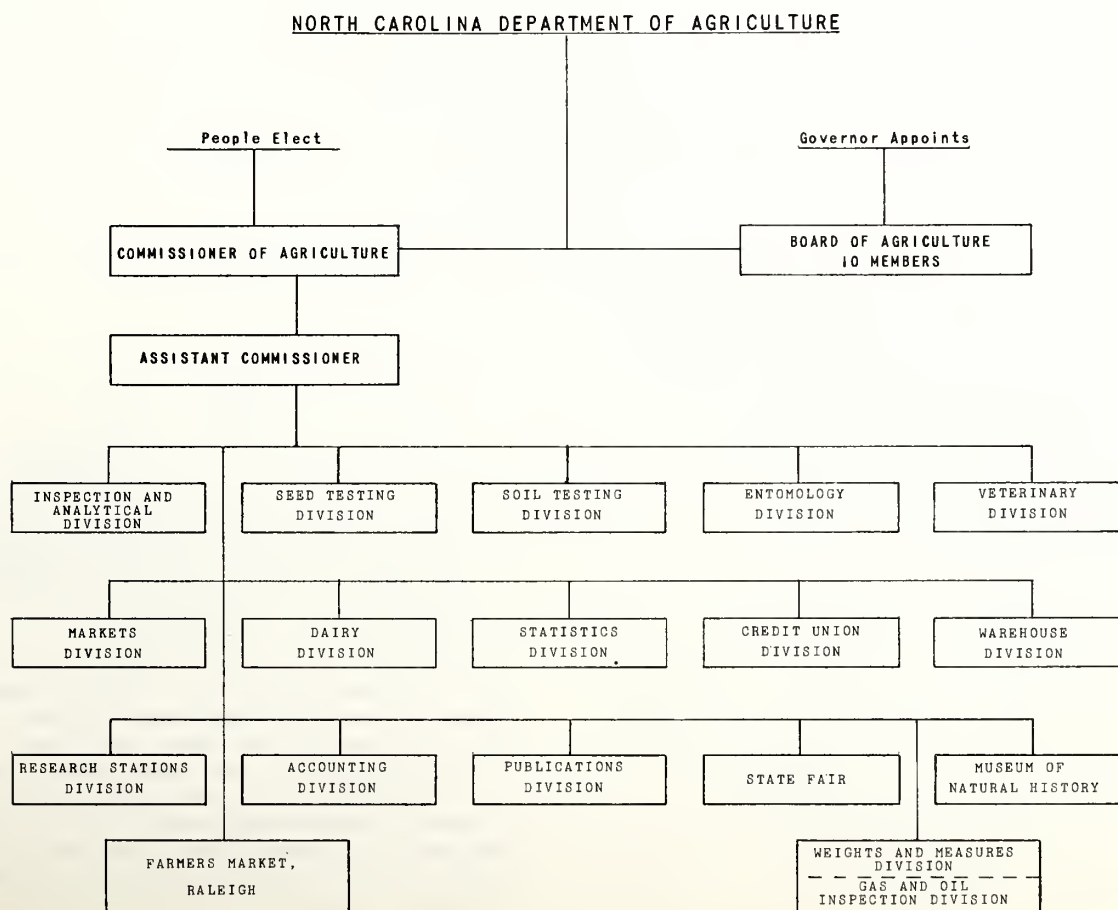

INTRODUCTION

NORTH CAROLINA AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS brings together the more important series of current and historic statistics concerning agriculture in the State. Where possible, we have included the type of information most often requested by farmers, by the general public and workers in other Government agencies. Our semi-monthly release entitled "Farm Report" and various other periodic releases are published to meet the needs of persons requiring information on a weekly, monthly or seasonal basis.

Crop and livestock reporting is a service rendered to farmers and others in our State by the U. S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the North Carolina Department of Agriculture. The collection and dissemination of agricultural statistics is the oldest activity of the United States Department of Agriculture, having had its start in 1863 during the Civil War. Recognizing the many advantages of a joint relationship between the State and Federal Governments in the development of agricultural statistics, North Carolina, in 1919, entered into a cooperative agreement with the U. S. Department of Agriculture to provide detailed agricultural statistics, which are so vital to the economy of our State. The agreement resulted in the creation of the crops Statistics Division of the North Carolina Department of Agriculture, which is popularly known--as the North Carolina Crop Reporting Service.

COUNTY ESTIMATES

Acreages by Counties for each of the eleven principal crops shown on pages 11 through 27 are based on the annual North Carolina Farm Census.

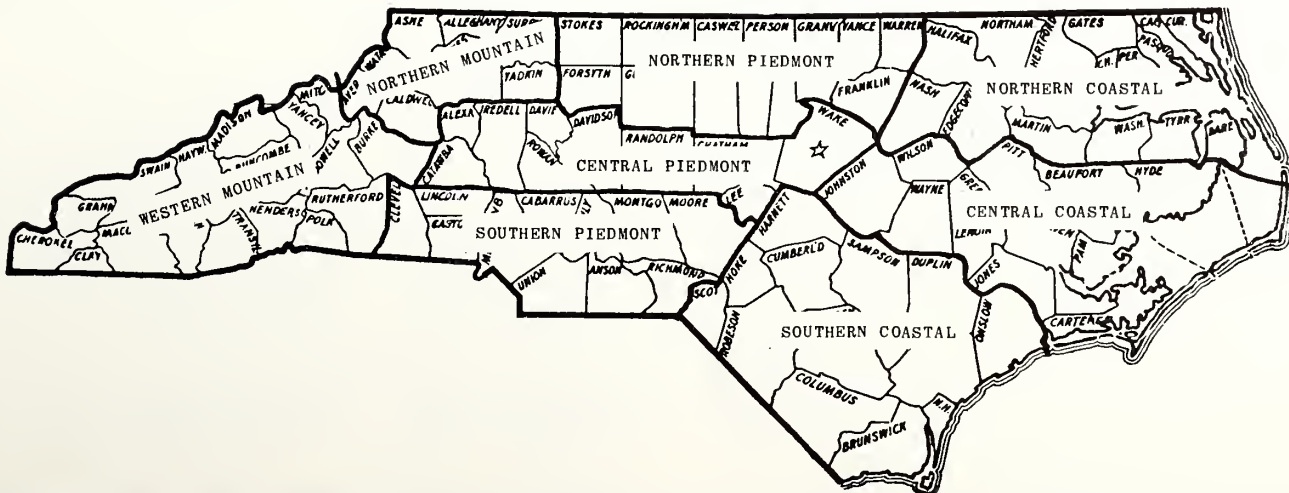
The North Carolina Crop Reporting Service publishes official estimates of crop and livestock

NORTH CAROLINA CROP REPORTING DISTRICTS

North Carolina is divided into eight Crop Reporting Districts as outlined on the map below. County estimates for both crops and livestock are compiled by Crop Reporting Districts, and the counties within each district are listed in alphabetical order.



A REVIEW OF NORTH CAROLINA'S AGRICULTURE

North Carolina farmers received record high cash receipts of \$1,198 million for farm marketings and Government payments in 1962. The year's total showed an increase of about four percent, or \$46 million, over the previous record of \$1,152 million received in 1961. The increase in income was due to substantial rises in receipts from crops, Government payments, and livestock and livestock products. In 1962 Government payments rose to a new high of \$39.5 million, exceeding the previous high recorded in 1958 by \$2 million. The increase in Government receipts was largely due to the 1962 Wheat Stabilization Program which paid over \$9 million to North Carolina farmers participating in the program.

It is emphasized that "cash receipts" as used in this publication relate to money received for commodities sold during the calendar year, regardless of when produced. They do not refer to the value of production for a given crop year.

CASH RECEIPTS FROM MAJOR COMMODITY GROUPS HIGHEST OF RECORD

Record high cash receipts were realized by North Carolina farmers in 1962 for crops and for livestock and livestock products. Cash receipts from crops amounted to \$813.8 million, up \$16 million, or 2 percent, from such receipts in 1961. Sales of livestock and livestock products brought in \$344.8 million - \$22.9 million, or 7.1 percent, more than in 1961. Crops accounted for 70.2 percent of the total from all sources, excluding Government payments.

HARVESTED CROPLAND TAKES UPTURN

Acres of crops harvested during 1963 amounted to about 112,000 more than were harvested in 1962, bringing the total close to four and a half million acres. This increase marks the first time since 1959 that harvested acres have not been below the acreage harvested during the preceding year. Crops harvested in 1959 occupied about five and a half million acres.

ACREAGE, YIELD AND PRODUCTION OF MAJOR CROPS

TOBACCO: North Carolina greatly exceeds all other states of the Nation in the production of tobacco. Acres of all types harvested in 1963 amounted to 471,500. This acreage was nearly double that harvested by Kentucky, our nearest competitor, and was 40 percent of the Nation's total.

Production at 924,763,000 pounds was almost 41 percent of the United States total. In 1962 48.6 percent of all cash receipts from farm marketings in North Carolina came from tobacco. North Carolina's position with other states in flue-cured production is much stronger. In 1963 we produced nearly five and a half times more flue-cured tobacco than our closest competitor, South Carolina. North Carolina's total of 901,663,000 pounds accounted for 66 percent of the entire flue-cured crop in the Nation.

For the past several years North Carolina farmers have made tremendous progress in tobacco production. The result has been higher yields, and in 1963 farmers produced 1,961 pounds per acre for all types, exceeding the record-high yield recorded in 1962 by 65 pounds. The average season price was 58.2 cents in 1963, two cents lower than in 1962, but for the fourth consecutive year value of production of the tobacco crop surpassed the one half billion dollar mark. Value of the 1963 crop was \$538,648,000 - a decrease of \$25,367,000 from the record-setting value realized in 1962.

The record yield for all types of tobacco in 1963 can be credited entirely to the flue-cured crop, as the burley crop showed a decrease from 1962. All types of flue-cured tobacco averaged 1,958 pounds per acre in 1963, establishing a new record and exceeding the previous high yield recorded in 1962 by 68 pounds. Average price per pound received by producers for the 1963 flue-cured crop was 58.3 cents, 1.9 cents below the 1962 price and marking the first time in four years that the average has dropped below 60 cents. The highest price ever recorded for producers' sales in the state was 65.1 cents in 1961.

Burley producers in the western counties of North Carolina realized a yield of 2,100 pounds of tobacco in 1963. This was the second highest yield ever recorded for the State falling 85 pounds below the record yield produced in 1962. The season average price for burley in 1963 was 55.5 cents per pound, 4.5 cents below the average for 1962 and 10.5 cents below the record 66 cents received in 1961. The 1963 price was the lowest recorded since 1954 when 52 cents was the average price for the crop. Consequently, value of production dropped to \$12,820,000, about \$1.6 million below 1962 when a record value of \$14,421,000 was realized.

CORN: Production of corn is more widely distributed and uses more cropland than any other crop in the State, with the Coastal Plains being the major producing area. In 1963 1,372,000 acres were harvested for grain. This marked the tenth consecutive year that corn harvested for grain fell below the two million acre mark. In the period from 1920 through 1953, corn harvested for grain fell below this mark only three times. For the past 25 years the trend of corn acreage harvested for grain has shown a constant decline. The 1963 acreage showed a 113,000 acre increase over 1962, when an all time low of 1,259,000 was recorded. Even with the mild rally over the previous year, acreage harvested for grain in 1963 is the second lowest of record.

Offsetting the sharp decline in corn acreage North Carolina farmers during the past decade have made amazing progress in increasing corn yields. Improved practices and the wider use of hybrid seed have enabled producers to more than double their yields in the last 20 years. In 1963 farmers harvested 54 bushels of corn per acre, more than double the yield of 25 bushels in 1945. In 1962 a record high yield of 56 bushels was realized by North Carolina producers. The 54 bushels harvested in 1963 was more than enough to place it second only to 1962. With these improved yields the production of corn in 1963 amounted to 74,088,000 bushels - 38 percent more corn from 36 percent fewer acres than was grown in 1945.

SORGHUM GRAIN: This crop has become very popular with farmers in certain sections of the Piedmont to supplement low-yielding corn crops resulting from dry seasons. Harvested acreages of sorghum grain grew very rapidly from 2,000 acres in 1945 to 92,000 acres in 1955, the all-time high. The introduction of the Feed Grain Program in 1961 brought a drastic reduction in sorghum acreage harvested for grain. In 1961 acreage harvested was 55,000, a 29,000 acre reduction under the preceding year. Continued declines followed in 1962 and 1963 when 48,000 and 47,000 acres, respectively, were reported harvested.

A 39 bushel yield was produced by North Carolina farmers in 1963, four bushels under the record yield for 1962. Production for the state totaled 1,833,000 bushels, the first time since 1954 that production fell below the two-million bushel mark.

COTTON: North Carolina farmers harvested 377,000 acres of cotton in 1963, or a decrease of 6.2 percent from the 402,000 harvested in 1962. The 1963 acreage was the smallest since 1958 when 263,000 acres were harvested and it is the third lowest of record. This emphasizes the extent to which cotton growing has been reduced when compared with the 1,802,000 acres harvested in 1962. Production in 1963 totaled 355,000 bales as against 275,000 bales harvested in 1962. Value of the 1963 crop was \$58,930,000 compared with \$45,777,000 in 1962. This was the highest value of production for cotton since an evaluation of \$63,203,000 was recorded for the crop of 1954.

SOYBEANS: One of the most rapidly expanding crops in North Carolina is soybeans. In 1963 acres harvested reached 597,000, the highest of record. Since 1950 when farmers harvested 297,000 acres, soybeans grown for beans have increased over 100 percent. In 1962 and 1963 soybeans yielded 24 bushels per acre, a record for the State. Production in 1963 was 14,328,000 bushels, an all-time high which exceeded the previous record set in 1962 by almost 1,000,000 bushels.

PEANUTS: A total of 343,200,000 pounds of peanuts were harvested in North Carolina during 1963. This output was 8,800,000 pounds under the 352,000,000 pounds produced in 1962. Since total acres harvested were the same (176,000) for both years, reduced yield in 1963 accounted for the difference in production. In 1962 the average yield of 2,000 pounds was a record high, while droughty conditions in some sections of the major producing areas in 1963 reduced yield to 1,950 pounds. Still the 1963 yield was the second highest of record.

OATS: Acres of oats harvested in the State during 1963 totaled 169,000. This is the smallest acreage since 1929 when 168,000 acres were harvested. The decrease was mainly due to an extremely cold winter and disease which severely damaged the oats crop. Many fields were complete failures and others turned out very poor yields. Total acres planted for the 1963 crop was 381,000 leaving an astounding 212,000 acres abandoned. The average dropped to 31.0 bushels, a sharp decrease from the 37.5 bushels produced in 1962. Total production in 1963 was 5,239,000 bushels, the lowest output since 1937.

WHEAT: North Carolina farmers in 1963 harvested 235,000 acres of wheat, second low only to the 204,000 acres harvested in 1962. In 1963 producers obtained a yield of 26.5 bushels of wheat per acre, the second highest of record. Although the 1963 yield was 2.5 bushels above the 24.0 bushels produced in 1962 it was 2.5 bushels below the record of 29.0 bushels produced in 1961. Total production amounted to 6,228,000 bushels in 1963 as compared to 4,896,000 bushels in 1962 and 11,368,000 bushels in 1961.

1962 MONTHLY WEATHER CROP SUMMARY

GENERAL: 1962 was another in the series of recent years when most of the extremes of weather tended toward the cold and damp, with very few instances of unusually hot weather and only limited areas affected by serious drought. In general, the early months of the year brought some rigorous wintry weather; spring was sunny and moderately dry, but with numerous local electrical storms; summer began wet and cool, but moved toward normal as the season progressed; fall and early winter brought fair weather and foul, with more of the latter than usual.

Two tropical storms affected the North Carolina coast in 1962; in both cases the effects were mild. Storm Alma took a typical northward path across the extreme eastern part of the State in late August, but never reached destructive force; Hurricane Ella in mid-October remained well offshore, causing some beach erosion and a great deal of cloudy, rainy weather in the coastal areas. Much greater beach damage was caused by two extraordinary winter-type storms. One of these, in early March, caused unusually high and persistent tides and seas, dealing extremely great damage to beaches, highways and buildings along the coast from Hatteras northward. The other storm, in late November and early December, lasted nearly ten days along the North Carolina coast, again causing much beach erosion and some structural damage. Neither of these storms caused much agricultural damage due to the time of year.

Early harvest weather was excellent in 1962, but bad weather set in with the arrival of November and continued through the rest of the year.

JANUARY: New Year's Day set the pattern for the month of January, with cold, cloudy weather throughout the day and night, and snow, sleet or freezing rain falling over much of North Carolina. Snow and sleet fell on several other days scattered throughout the month, with total amounts ranging from an inch on the southern Coast up to twenty inches in portions of the Piedmont and Mountain areas. It was the wettest January in several years, and one among the colder ones. Average temperatures were not quite as low as in January 1961, but some days were colder than any in recent years. There was very little weather suitable for outdoor work.

FEBRUARY: There was a great deal of cloudy weather over North Carolina during February, but neither the cold nor the snow was as severe as in January. In fact, the first half of the month had rather light precipitation in most areas of the State, but the latter half had small amounts of rain almost daily, and there was again little or no weather in which farm work could be done. Temperatures were much more changeable, with some quite warm days mixed in with the winter weather. Average temperatures for the month were well above normal in the Mountains and near or slightly above normal elsewhere.

MARCH: The outstanding feature of this month's weather was the coastal storm

of March 5-7, which was more destructive to the northern coast of North Carolina than any known tropical hurricane has been. In the interior the storm caused heavy cloudiness, northerly winds, and considerable amounts of rain or snow. Thus the early part of March was very cold and snowy, and except for the unprecedented March of 1960 the most wintry in many years. The latter half of the month continued to be rather cold most of the time, and rain fell often enough to keep the ground wet, delaying land preparation and other early farming operations.

APRIL: North Carolina was finally favored with fair weather in April. Sunshine was more plentiful than usual even for the time of year, and rapid drying occurred between showers. These occurred often enough during the first half of the month, but were scarce during the latter half. Total rainfall for April, however, was near normal in most of the State. Stormy weather was at a minimum, and conditions generally favorable for outdoor work to be done. Only a rather rapid change in soil condition from too wet to too dry limited farming activities.

MAY: Dry weather which began in late April continued through most of May, which was an unusually warm, sunny, dry month throughout North Carolina. Such rain as fell was in the form of scattered thunderstorms, which brought with them a great deal of locally destructive weather such as hail, lightning and damaging winds. The combination of high temperatures and the rainfall shortage caused dry soils, impeding farm work which had been delayed by cold and damp weather of earlier months. Thus plantings and transplantings were generally well behind schedule during May.

JUNE: North Carolina weather did another about face in June, which was a cloudy, wet month in most areas. Dry soils were soon replenished, and then became too wet. This did not become serious in most areas, but the Central Coastal section was subjected to torrential rains in connection with an offshore storm on June, 29, and both crops and livestock were destroyed by excessive water in some areas. Summer thunderstorms caused the usual amount of scattered local damage from hail, wind and lightning. Temperatures were generally mild. Outside the storm areas, the well-watered crops made good progress.

JULY: Another coastal storm in early July brought additional downpours to some of the same areas that suffered the heavy rains of late June. Abundant showers throughout July kept this section wet. Portions of fourteen counties were declared disaster areas due to drowning of crops. Over the rest of the State, near normal rainfall maintained a favorable condition for crop growth. Temperatures continued mild for the time of year, and damage from the effects of local summer thunderstorms was not as great as in some years.

AUGUST. Fair weather again became predominant in August, with most of the rain coming from scattered thundershowers.

About an average proportion of these brought local occurrences of hail or strong winds, but there was no widespread storm damage. Tropical storm Alma near the end of the month remained weak and bore no destructive winds, but caused heavy rains along the coast. Elsewhere August rainfall was short, and some areas became droughty. Temperatures were mild, as in the earlier months of the warm season, averaging slightly below normal.

SEPTEMBER: Weather of this month was the quietest of the year in North Carolina, being remarkable mainly for its low temperatures. These averaged lower than nine out of ten Septembers, and new record low temperatures for so early in the fall season occurred at a number of stations. There was no freezing, however, outside the higher Mountain areas. Tropical storms by-passed the State with little effect. Rainfall was a little above normal, and better distributed than usual, but there was sufficient fair weather to permit normal progress in early harvesting of crops.

OCTOBER: This was the driest month since the early 1950s. Large areas of North Carolina had a total of less than an inch or rain, an unusually small amount even for the normally dry month of October. With good soil moisture at the beginning of the month and the growing season ended, however, there was little ill effect from the dry weather. On the contrary, with three-fourths of the daylight hours sunny, harvest weather was excellent. Hurricane Ella remained well offshore, causing only beach erosion. Temperatures averaged above normal, but a late October cold spell brought record-breaking low temperatures for so early in the season.

NOVEMBER: In direct contrast to October, November was wetter than it is in nine out of ten years, with an extremely low proportion of sunny days and the rainfall more than double the normal. Several offshore low pressure storms helped cause the bad weather, the last one being a very persistent storm which continued to batter the coast into early December. Beach erosion was very great, and several houses were destroyed or damaged. Temperatures averaged well below normal, with some of the coldest weather early in the month. There were several light November snows, one reaching to the coast. Harvest activities delayed past October got little encouragement this month.

DECEMBER: The coastal storm which began November 26 continued through December 5, and weather remained unsettled another several days. Then record-breaking cold again hit North Carolina, for the third time this fall. Nearly all Mountain and some Piedmont stations dropped to zero or lower the morning of the 13th. Total precipitation at the various stations was more irregular than usual for a winter month, ranging from less than two inches to nearly ten inches. Snow or sleet fell on several occasions, one being Christmas day. Weather was unsuitable for outdoor work most of December.

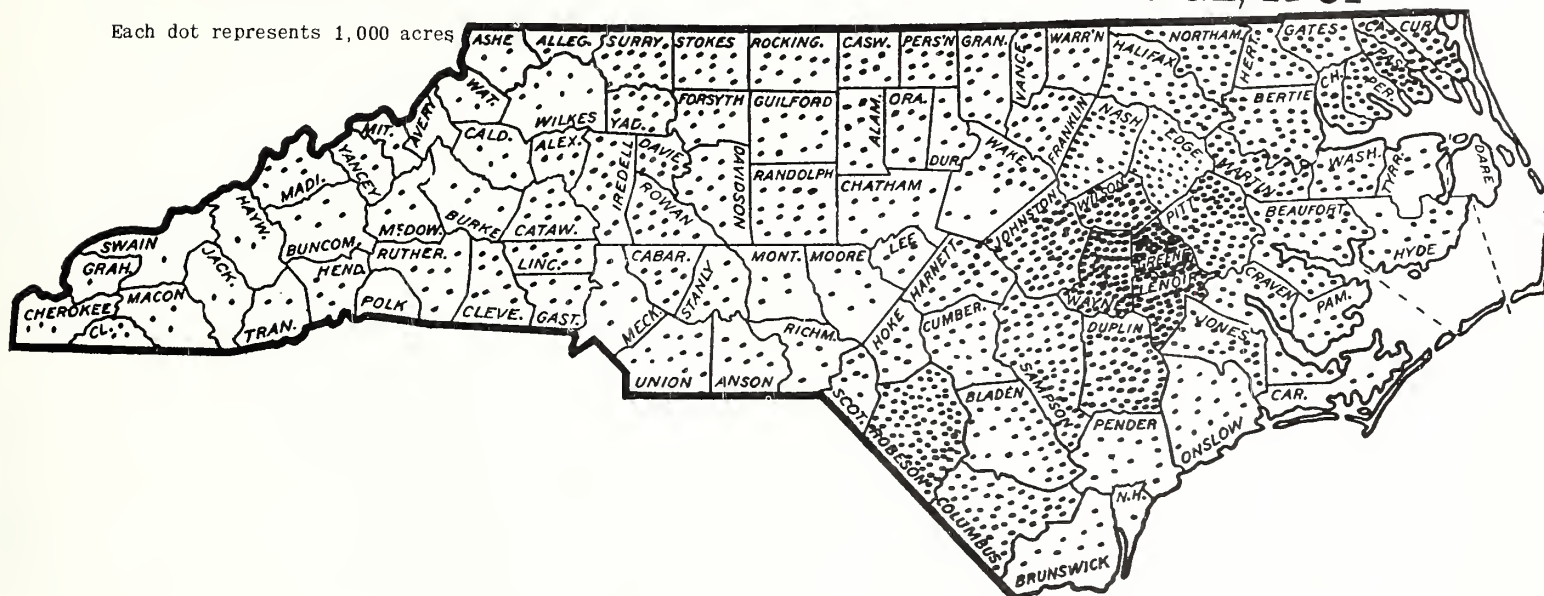

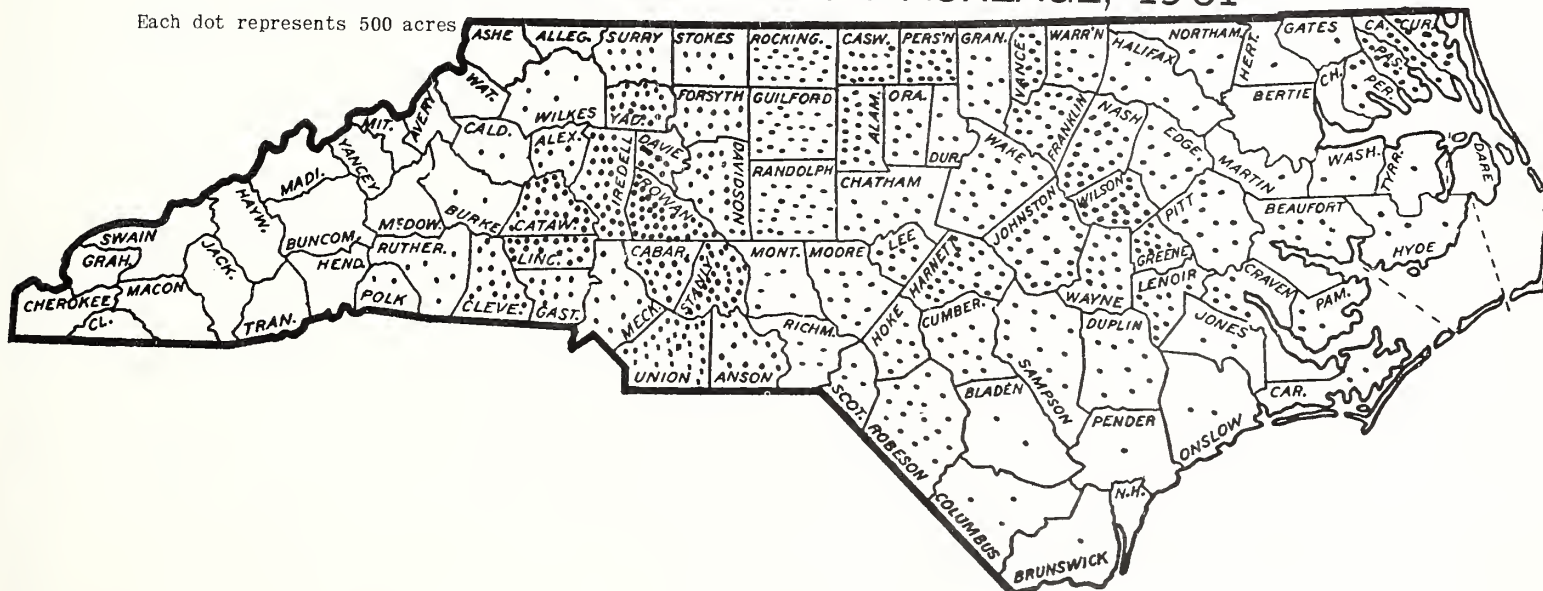
NORTH CAROLINA CORN FOR GRAIN ACREAGE, 1961

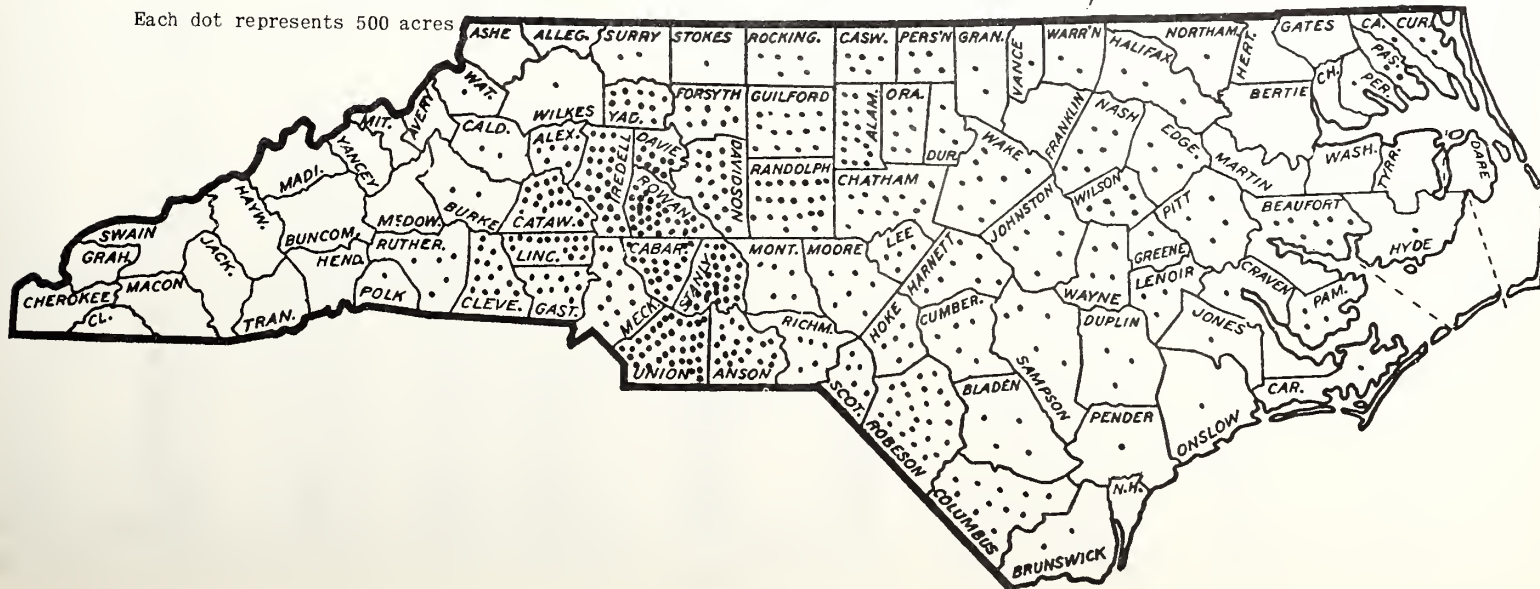
NORTH CAROLINA WHEAT ACREAGE, 1961

Each dot represents 500 acres



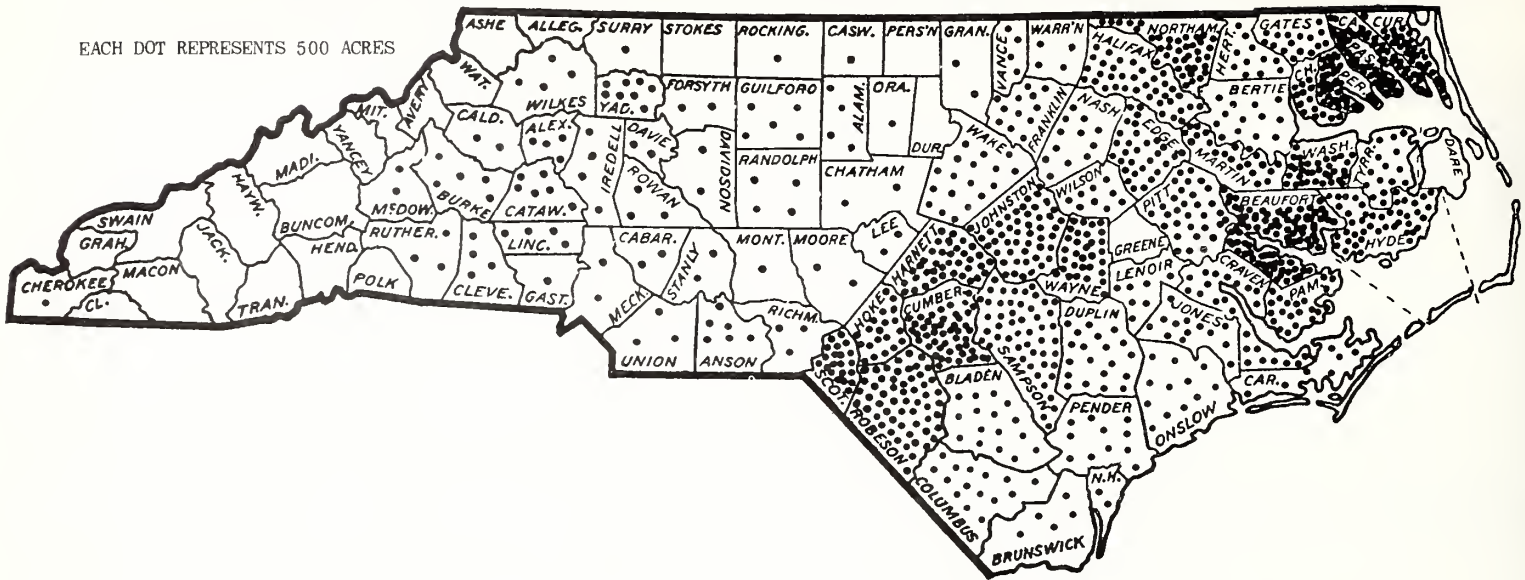
NORTH CAROLINA OATS ACREAGE, 1961

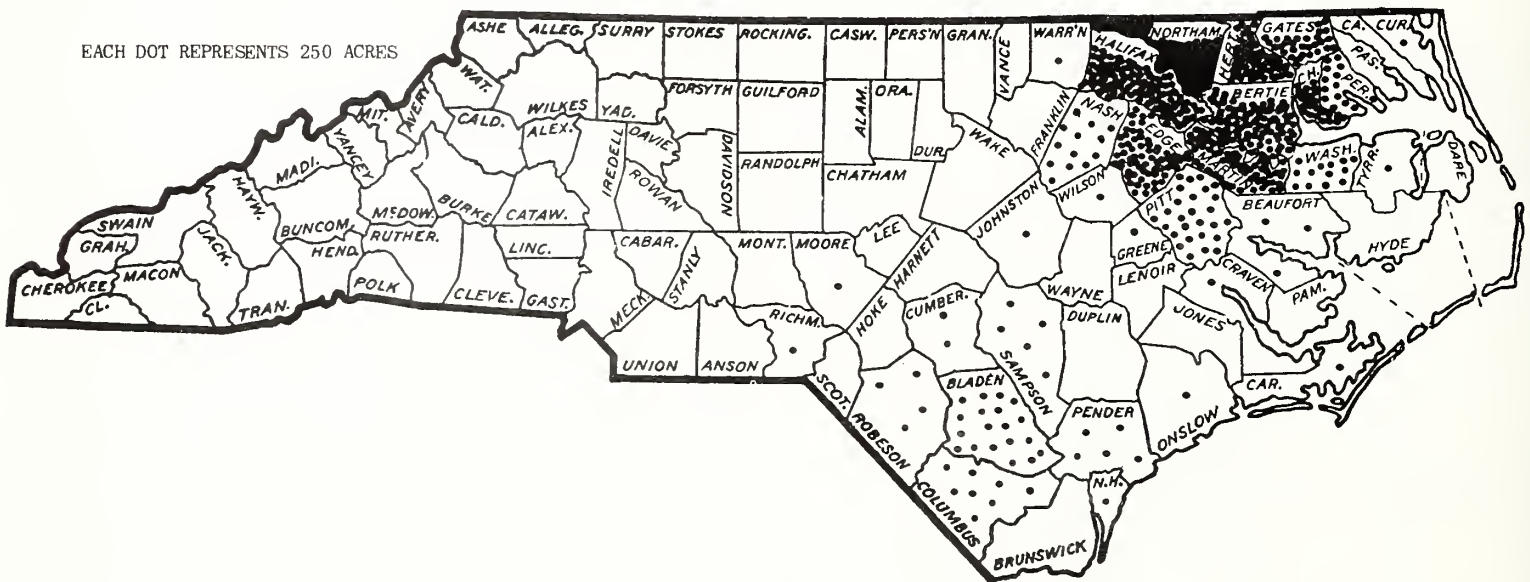
N. C. SOYBEANS FOR BEANS ACREAGE, 1961

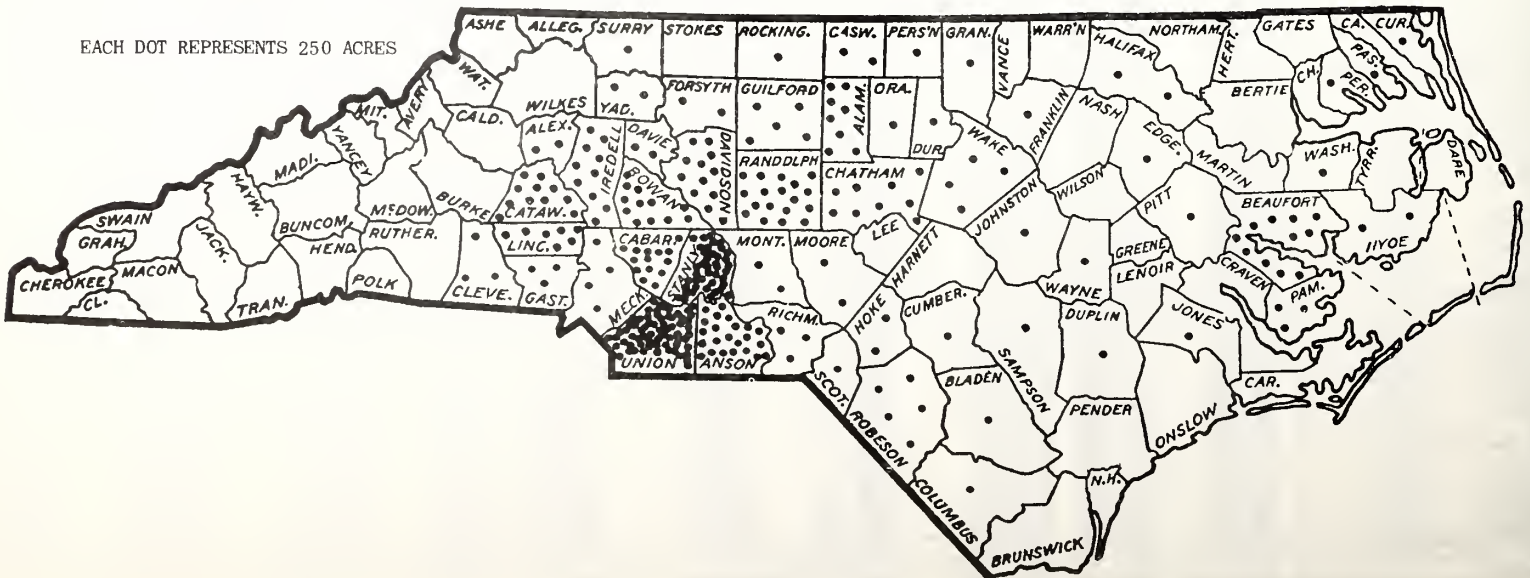
NORTH CAROLINA PEANUT ACREAGE, 1961

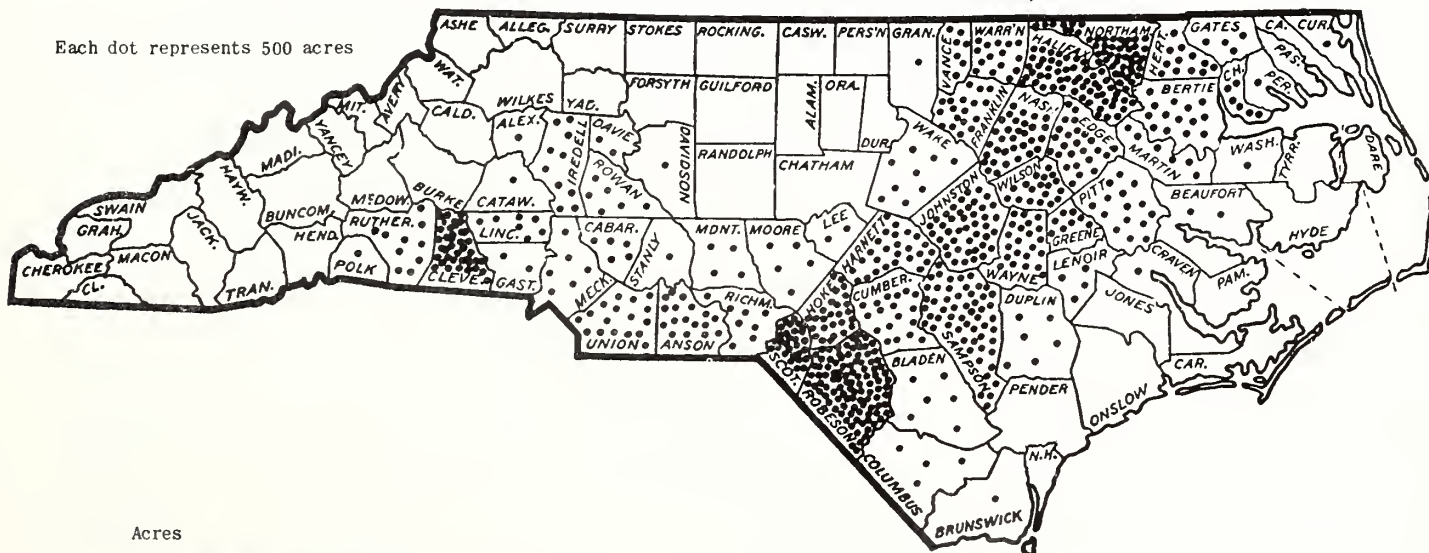

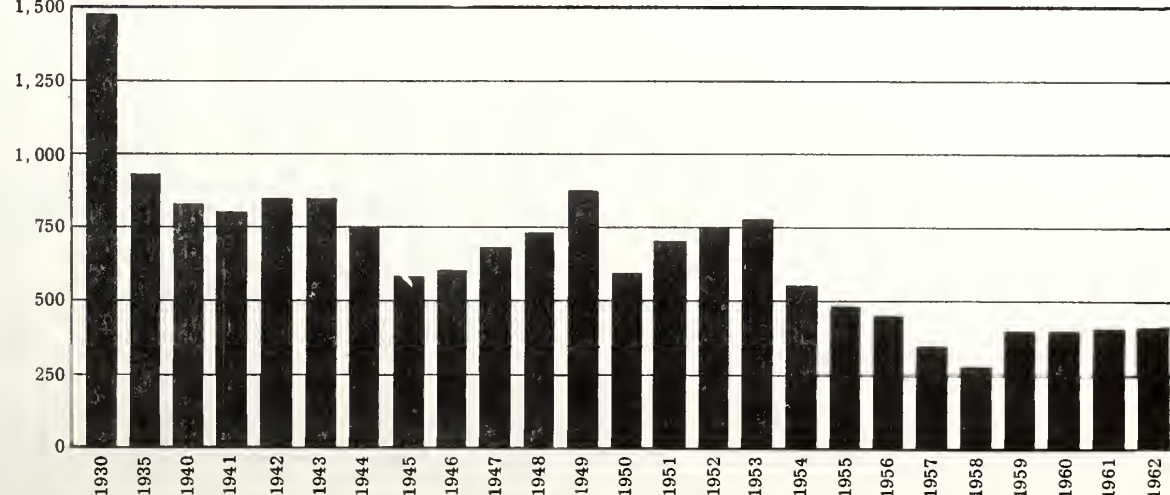

NORTH CAROLINA COTTON ACREAGE, 1961

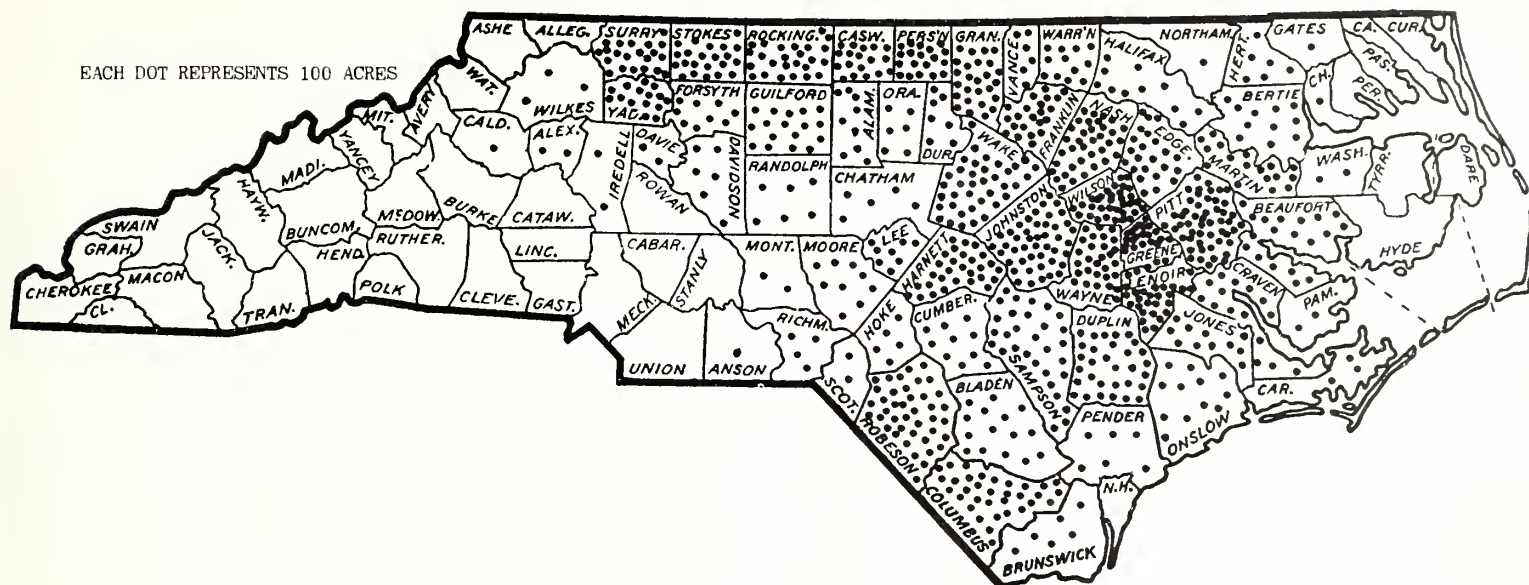

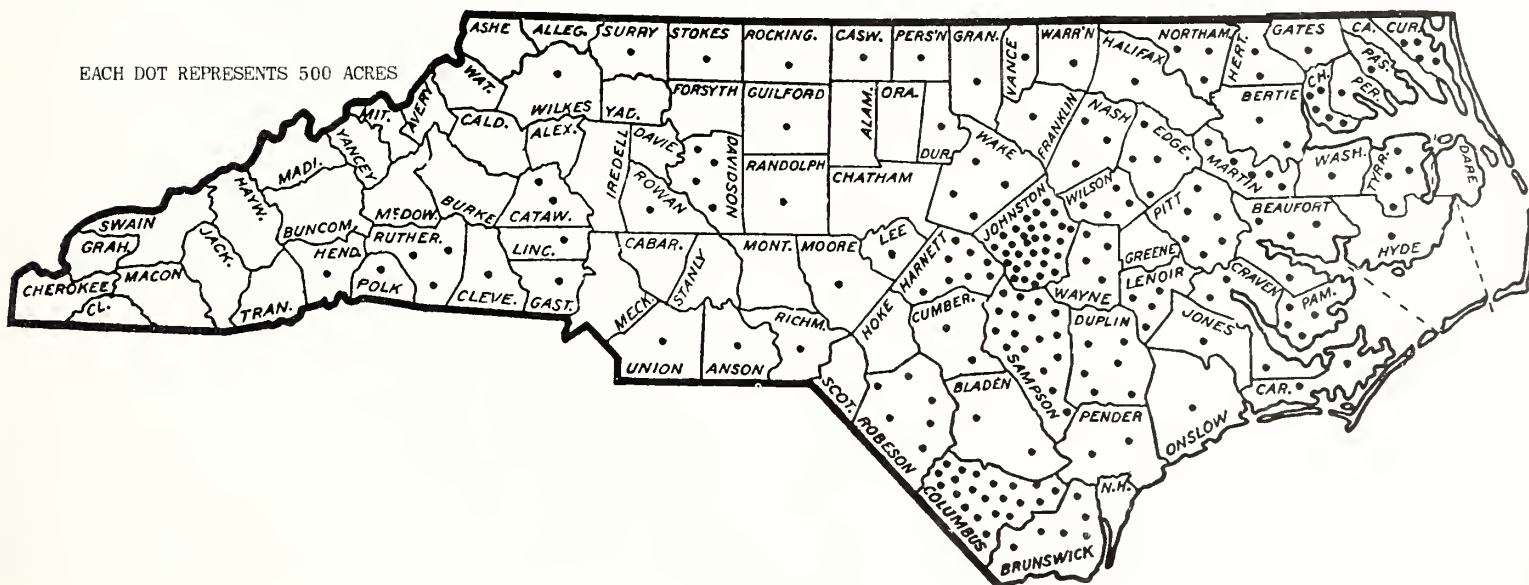
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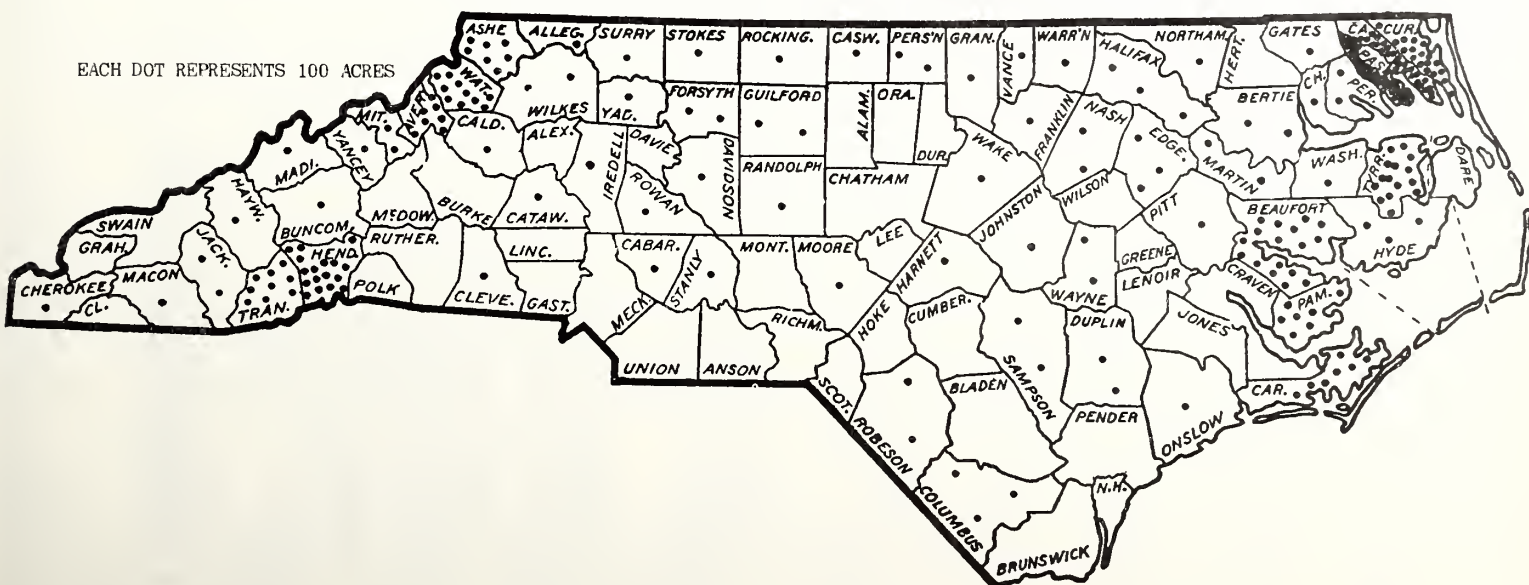
NORTH CAROLINA FLUE-CURED TOBACCO ACREAGE, 1961

NORTH CAROLINA LIVESTOCK

Livestock production is an important source of income for producers in North Carolina. Restrictions of crops under various reduction programs have given added stimulus to the growth and progress of this industry. In 1952 gross receipts from livestock and livestock products made up only 26.6 percent of the total, exclusive of government payments. Gross receipts as used here consist of cash receipts from sales plus the value of products used on farms where produced. Comparable receipts for livestock in 1962 amounted to 31.0 percent of the total.

Cash receipts from sales of livestock and livestock products have also shown a strong up-trend. In 1952 these receipts accounted for only 21 percent of the total while ten years later in 1962 they amounted to 30 percent. The 1962 livestock cash receipts of \$344,846,000 were the highest for the State of record. From 1952 to 1962 these receipts increased by 70 percent, while the receipts for crops increased by only 9 percent. Government payments, which for the most part are not receipts for production, have been purposely omitted from these comparisons.

Livestock production in the State is becoming more and more commercialized. A rapid decrease in farm numbers and a massive flux of population from rural to urban areas have reduced home consumption of products grown on the farm. Home consumption absorbed 32 percent of the gross livestock receipts in 1952 but by 1962 the proportion used at home dropped to 10 percent, leaving 90 percent to move into commercial channels.

Cattle and Calves

There were 970,000 cattle and calves on North Carolina farms as of January 1, 1963 - the same as a year earlier but one percent more than the 1961 inventory. The 1963 number was also the same as estimated for 1958 and 1960. It was exceeded in each of the five years from 1953 through 1957, but since then it has hovered around 900,000 head.

Beef cattle and calves on farms January 1, 1963, amounted to 467,000 head, the largest number for the State of record and three percent more than the inventory for 1962. During the decade from 1954 to 1963 the beef cattle industry expanded rapidly with inventories showing an increase in seven out of the 10 years. Rapid gains have been made in the production of beef for market. In 1953 marketings of beef amounted to 120,115,000 pounds (liveweight). The quantity marketed in 1962 totaled an estimated 196,180,000 pounds for a gain of 63 percent. Through improved breeding programs and better management practices producers are turning out larger quantities of quality beef. Greater amounts, therefore, are going into commercial channels, as substantiated by records on commercial slaughter. In 1953 a reported 107,563,000 pounds (liveweight) of cattle and calves went into commercial slaughter. In 1962 comparable slaughter amounted to 156,248,000 pounds or an increase of 45 percent. The record 1962 slaughter outstripped that of the previous year by four percent. Cash receipts for sales of cattle and calves amounted to \$18,012,000 in 1953 and to \$36,253,000 in 1962, or a little over double.

Cows and heifers two years old and older kept for milk on farms January 1, 1963, were estimated at 278,000 head, two percent fewer than the number on hand a year earlier. Milk cow numbers have been declining rapidly in recent years, having dropped almost one-third over a period of 10 years. The trend has been towards fewer herds with a larger number of highly productive cows per herd. Numbers of young milk animals kept on farms for replacements have also been reduced, falling from about 190,000 to around 160,000 since 1953.

Milk Production

Milk production per cow during 1962 rose to 6,130 pounds, the highest average for the State of record and 155 pounds more than the previous high produced in 1961. With an average of 256,000 milk cows on farms during the year, production amounted to 1,569 million pounds. This output was 116 million pounds less than the all time high production of 1,685 million in 1957. The 1957 production, however, required the output of 312,000 cows or 22 percent more to produce only seven percent more milk. The 1957 average per cow was 5,400 pounds or 730 pounds less than the 1962 average. The State's milk production is being concentrated more and more among larger producers who go out for highly efficient operations. "Family milk cows" are rapidly disappearing from the scene and are giving way to retail milk routes which are being extended farther into rural areas. Since a large portion of the milk formerly produced by family cows was fed to livestock, the larger and more efficient producers are actually supplying more milk for human consumption even though estimated total production is less. Sales of milk by producers in 1953 amounted to 910 million pounds, bringing in cash receipts of \$54,847,000. The 1962 sales amounted to 1,251 million pounds and receipts of \$70,041,000 - 37.5 percent larger sales and 27.7 percent more money.

Hogs

Hog production in North Carolina has followed no particular pattern but has moved up and down over the years in response to prevailing hog

prices as affected by National production and the competition of other commodities. Trends in recent years have been toward the production of more meat with smaller first of year inventories. The largest number of hogs on farms in the State, reported as of January 1, 1916, was 1,675,000 and the smallest number recorded was 830,000 for January 1, 1930. Sharp increases occurred from 1955 through 1960 when another peak of 1,520,000 was reached. By 1962 the number had dropped to 1,279,000 and for January 1 of 1963 there was an estimated inventory of 1,343,000.

Hog production in the State has become more specialized. Under greater commercialization producers have fewer marketable hogs in their first-of-year inventories which are now made up largely of breeding stock held for raising hogs through the remainder of the year. Even with considerably smaller January 1 numbers, the 1962 State pig crop of 2,088,000 head was the third largest of record. Swine growers have maintained this high level of production through improved breeding stock and better management practices. Thus, they have appreciably increased the average size of litters saved. An average of 7.3 pigs saved per litter during 1962 was a record high showing 9 percent increase in litter size for the State over the past 10 years.

Greater efficiency in production is enabling producers to "top out" hogs at an earlier age which has helped to bring about a noticeable increase in the number of hogs marketed. In 1953 the liveweight marketed amounted to 181,401,000 pounds. In 1962 the poundage marketed totaled 306,240,000 pounds or an increase of 69 percent over the ten-year period. Cash receipts from marketings amounted to \$43,837,000 in 1953 and to \$51,500,000 in 1962. With fewer people living on farms the consumption of pork on farms where produced has been greatly reduced. The value of home consumption of pork amounting to \$25,034,000 in 1953 fell to \$13,984,000 in 1962.

Sheep and Lambs

Production of sheep on North Carolina farms has been reduced to a position of minor importance. Back in the 1880's the number of sheep on farms amounted to over a half million. The numbers dropped off rapidly to a low of 35,000 in 1949. In 1951 there was a revival of interest in sheep raising and the numbers increased steadily to 55,000 on farms in 1959 and 1960. In 1962 the number fell to 50,000 and took a further drop to 43,000 as of January 1, 1963.

The 1962 lamb crop was estimated at 43,000 head, the same as the crop of 1961. Wool shorn in 1962 totaled 277,000 pounds or 11,000 pounds short of the 1961 yield. Cash receipts for sale of sheep and lambs for meat amounted to \$389,000 in 1953 and to \$500,000 in 1962. Adding the receipts for sale of wool the cash receipts totaled \$513,000 in 1953 and \$655,000 in 1962.

Poultry

Chickens on farms (excluding commercial broilers) January 1, 1963, were estimated at 14,772,000. This was the largest inventory of record being slightly above the previous high count for January 1, 1944.

Farm chickens raised have been sharply reduced since a peak of 29.1 million was reached in 1943. Reductions have occurred in over one-half of the years which have followed. The number raised in 1963, estimated to amount to 15,281,000, is just a little over half the number raised in 1943.

Sharp reductions in the number of farm chickens raised have given way to the fantastic growth of North Carolina's broiler industry. Broiler production in the State was in its infancy in the early 1930's. In 1943 when the production of farm chickens was at its peak, broilers produced amounted to 13.5 million, less than half of the farm chickens raised. Broiler production in 1962 totaled 203,126,000 or 15 times the production for 1943. With this astronomical growth of the broiler industry cash receipts from all poultry and eggs, amounting to \$185 million in 1962, are second only to those from tobacco, the State's leading money producer.

Production of turkeys in North Carolina has also made rapid strides. In 1953 turkeys raised amounted to 1,110,000. The estimated crop of 2,737,000 for 1963 is almost two and a half times the 1953 output. Cash farm income from turkeys which was \$6,369,000 in 1953 reached \$9,847,000 in 1962 for an increase of 55 percent. These income figures on turkeys include the value of home consumption by producers which amounts to less than one percent of production.

Eggs

Production of eggs in North Carolina reached a record 2,304 million in 1962, or about a nine percent increase over the 2,115 million produced the year before. Not only has the number of layers on farms increased but also has their rate of lay. In 1953 the average number of layers kept on farms was 8,277,000, and in 1962 the number had increased to 10,338,000. In 1953 an average of 163 eggs was laid per hen and in 1962 the average was 213 or an increase of 31 percent. Cash receipts from sale of eggs amounted to \$46,663,000 in 1953 and to \$70,620,000 in 1962 for a gain of 51 percent.

LIVESTOCK ON FARMS, JANUARY 1, 1957-1963

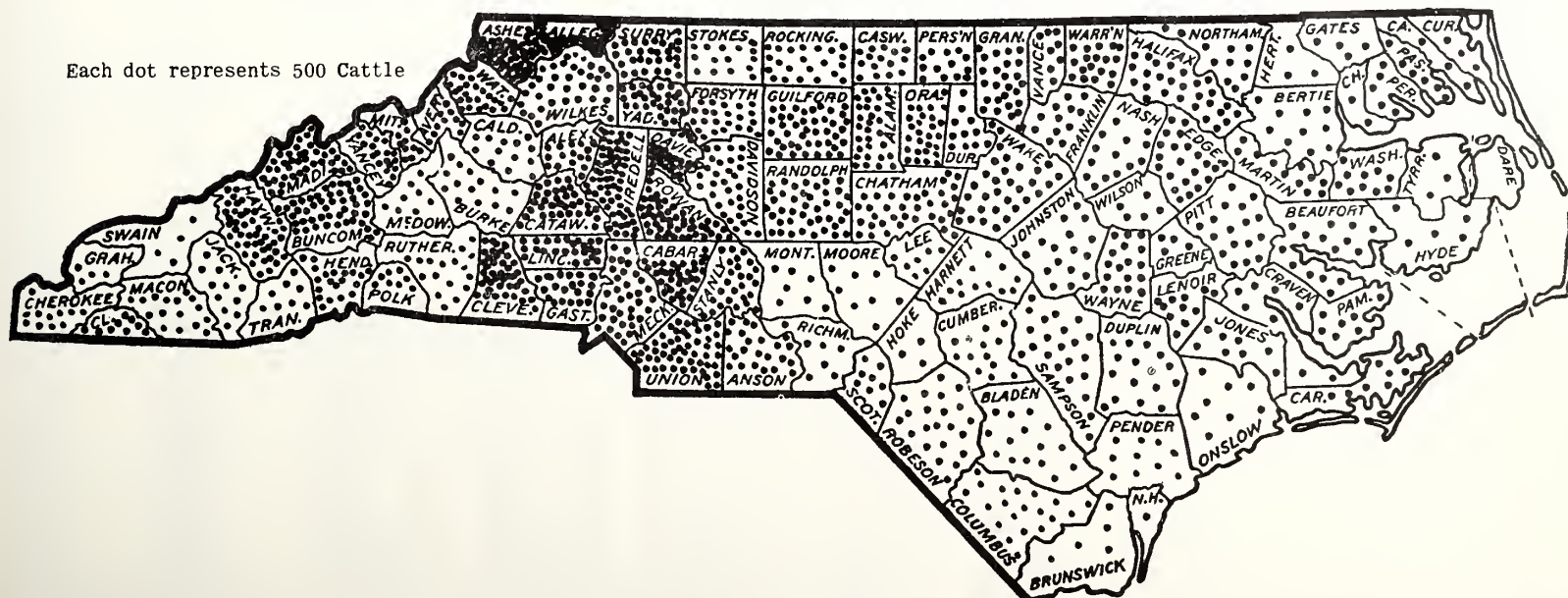

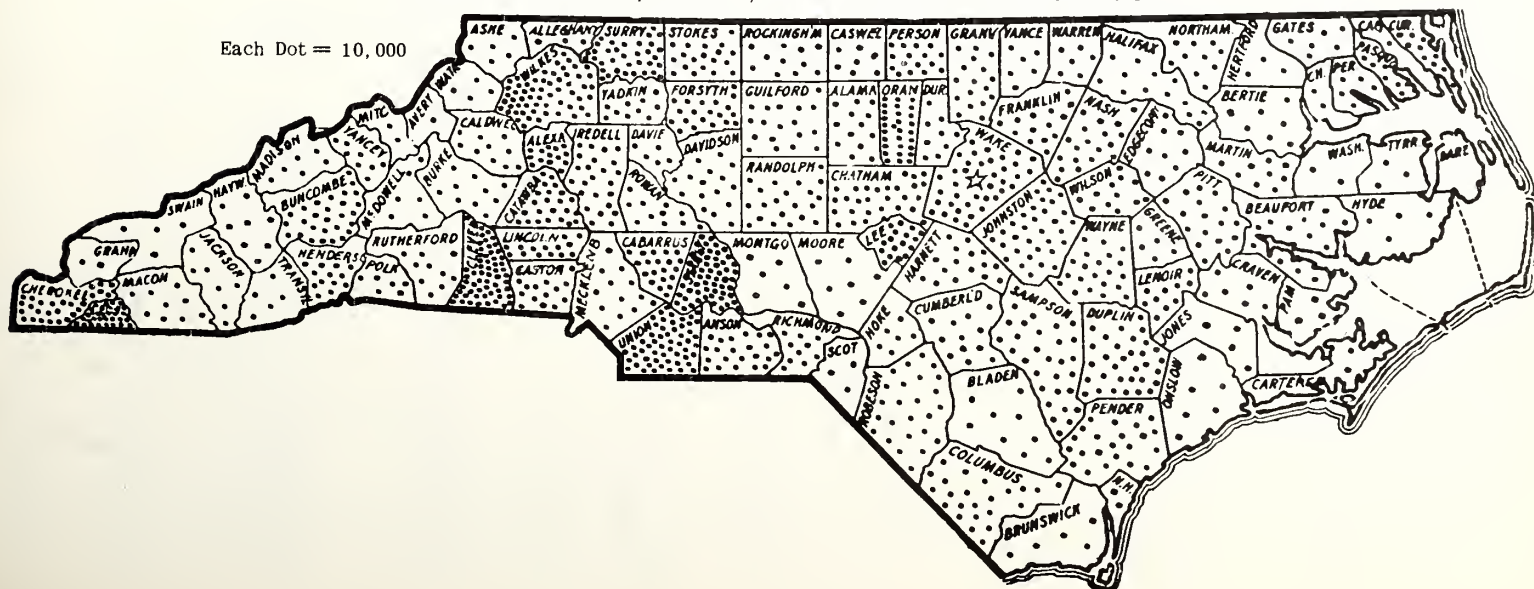

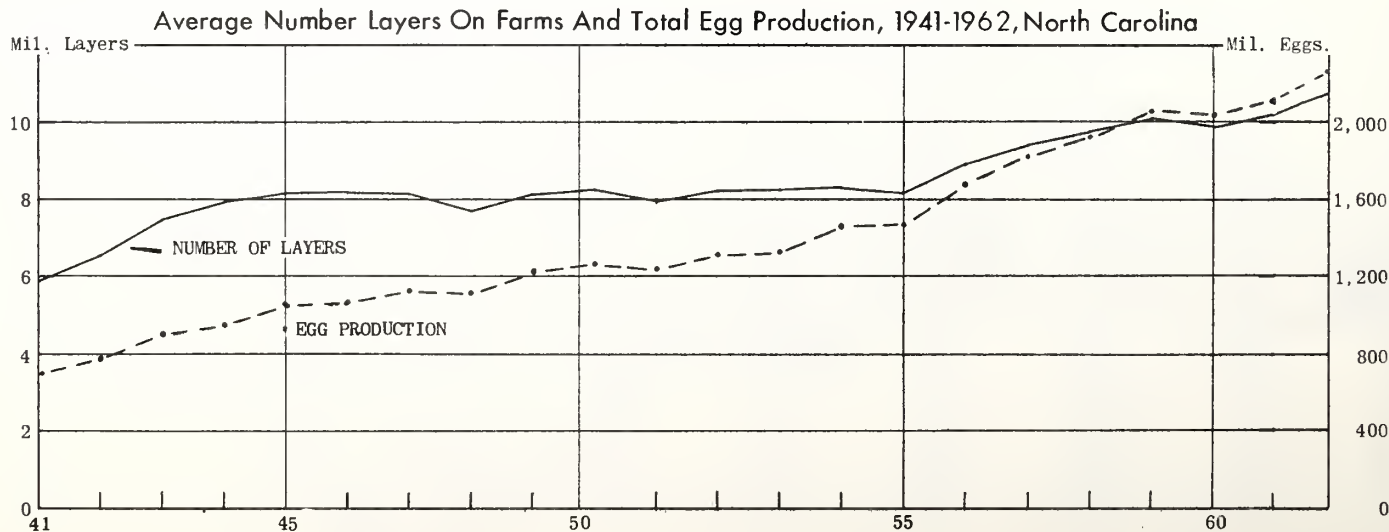

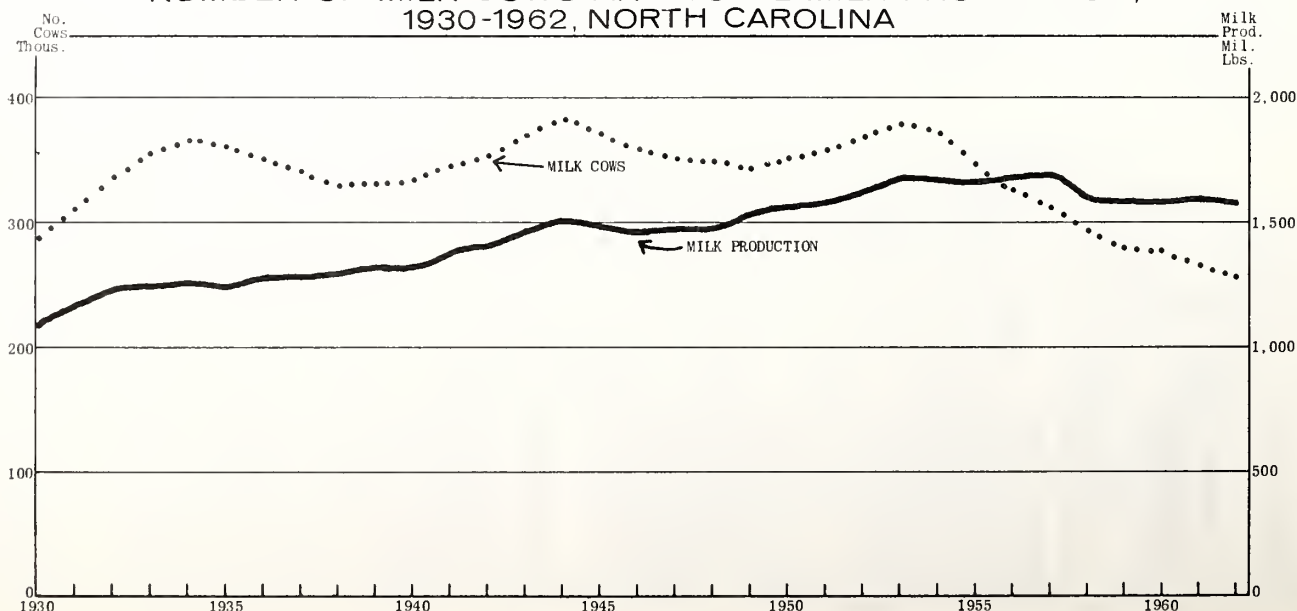

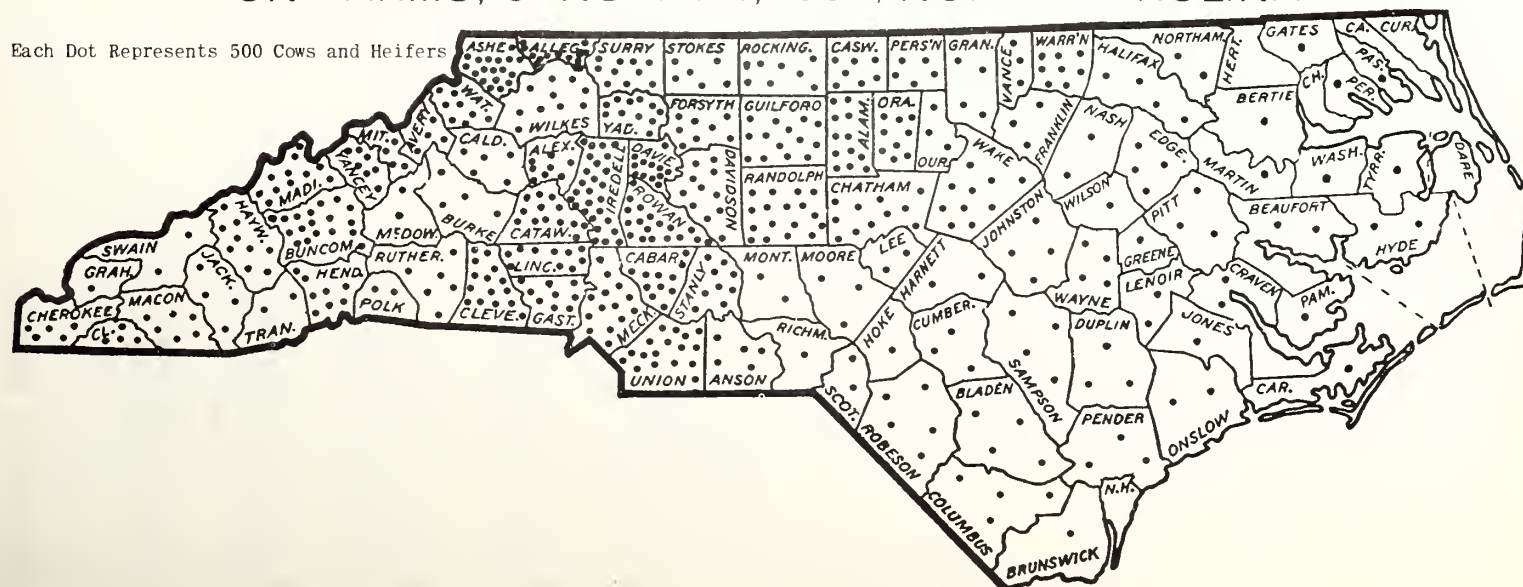

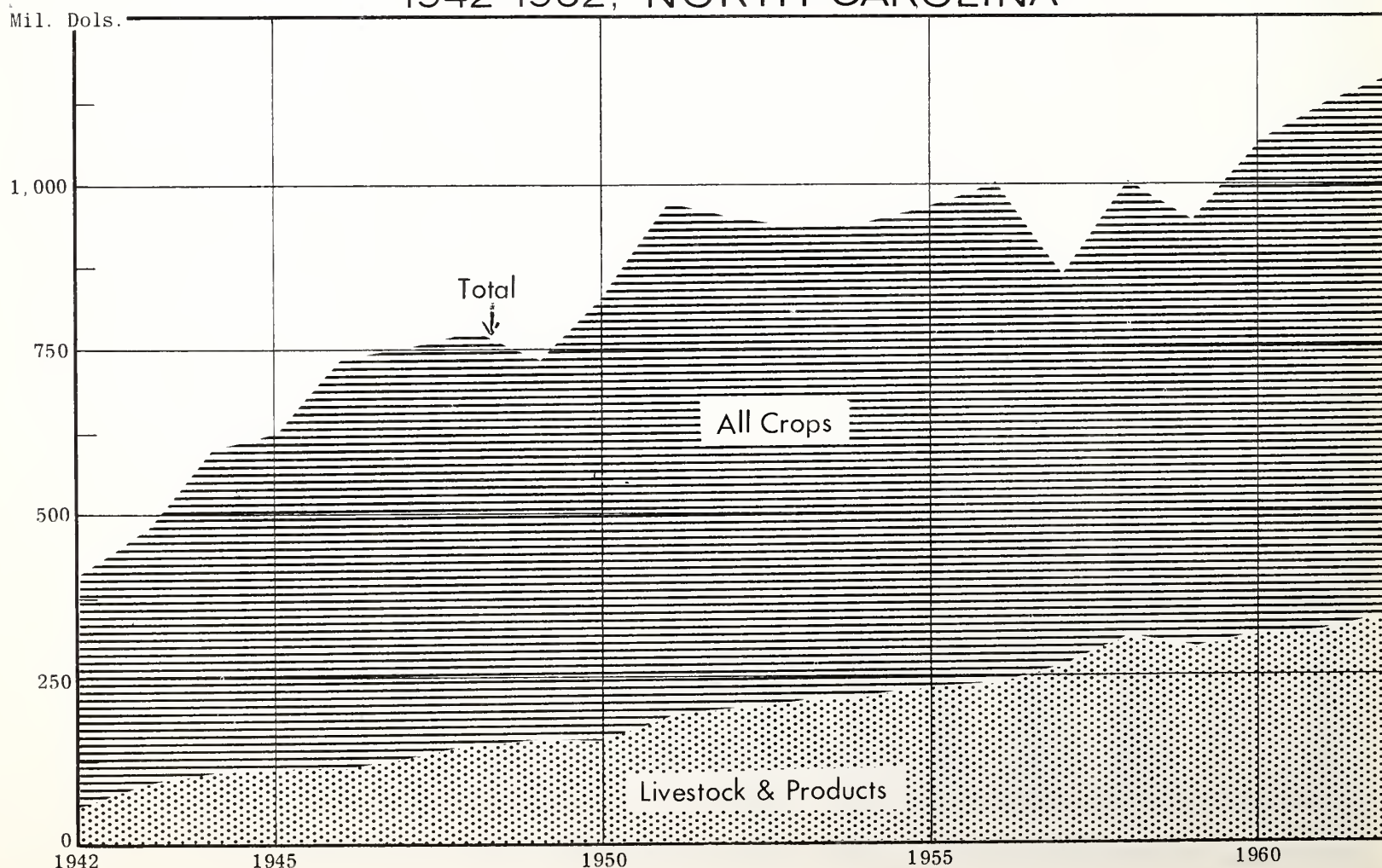

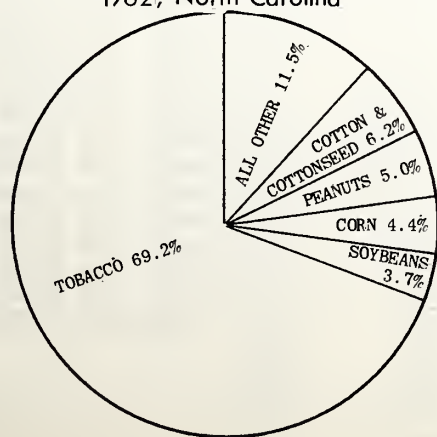

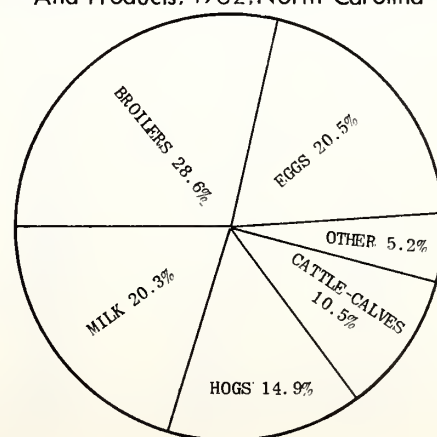

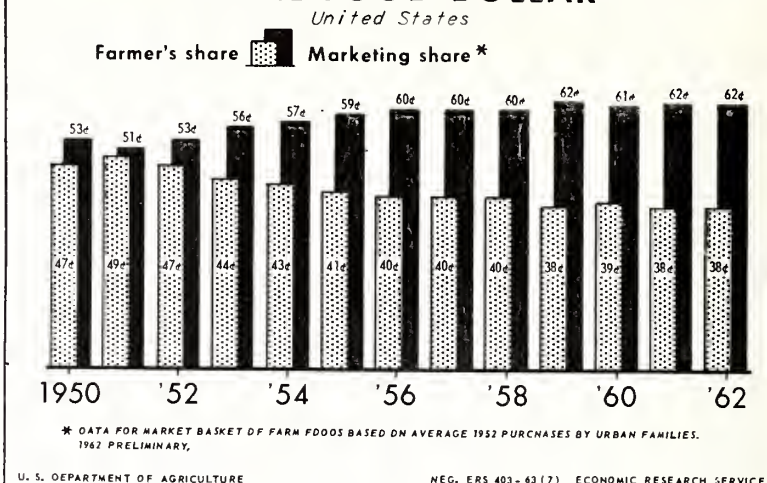

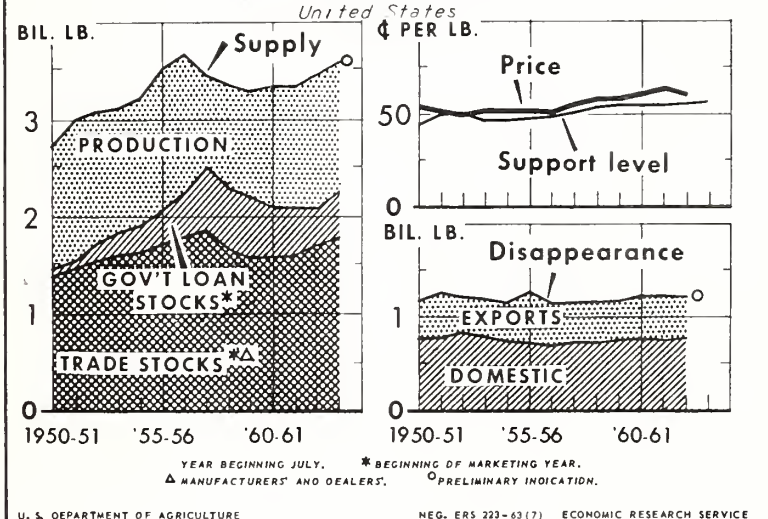
FARMER'S SHARE OF CONSUMER'S RETAIL FOOD DOLLAR

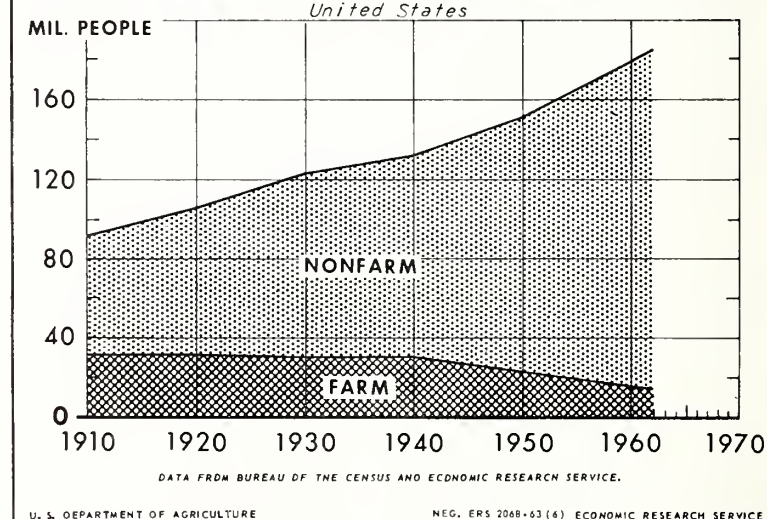
FLUE-CURED TOBACCO

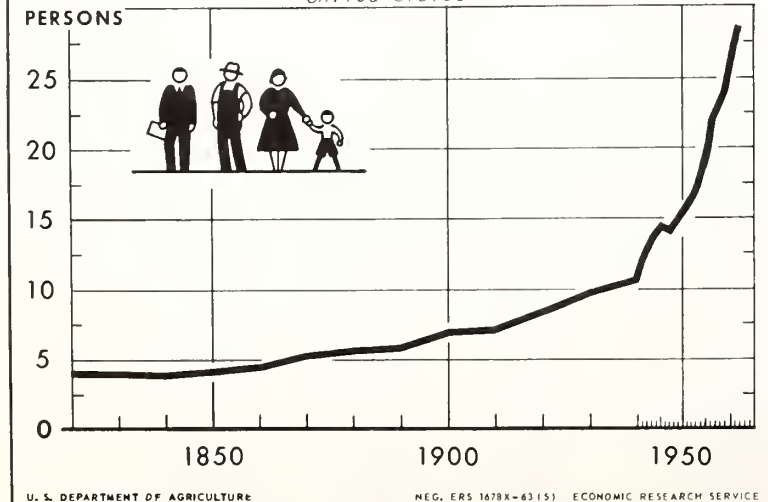
FARM AND NONFARM POPULATION

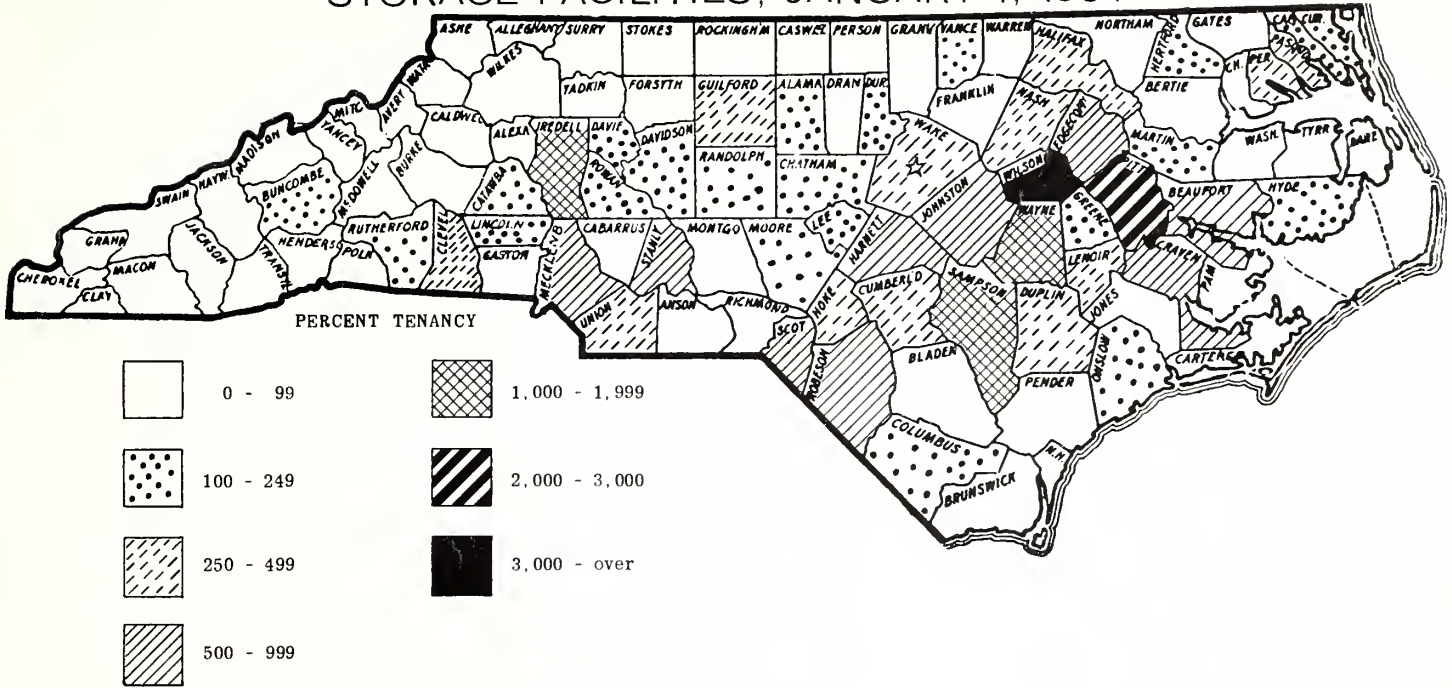

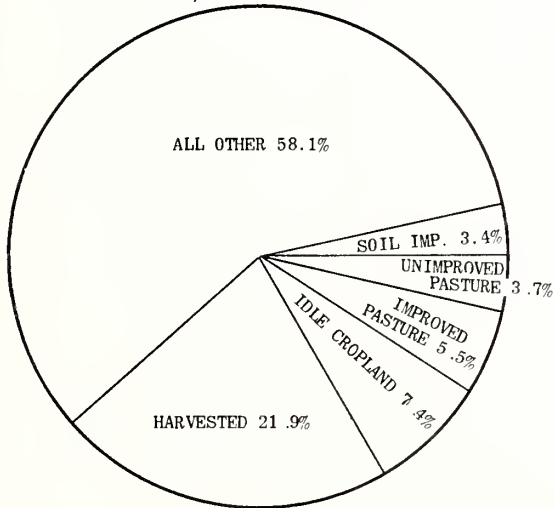

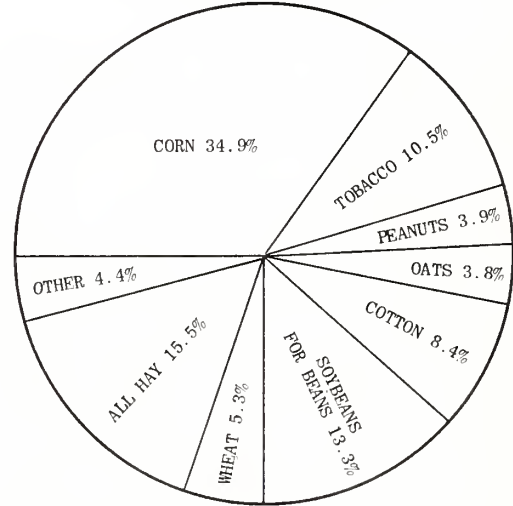
CAPACITY OF COMMERCIAL GRAIN STORAGE FACILITIES, JANUARY 1, 1964



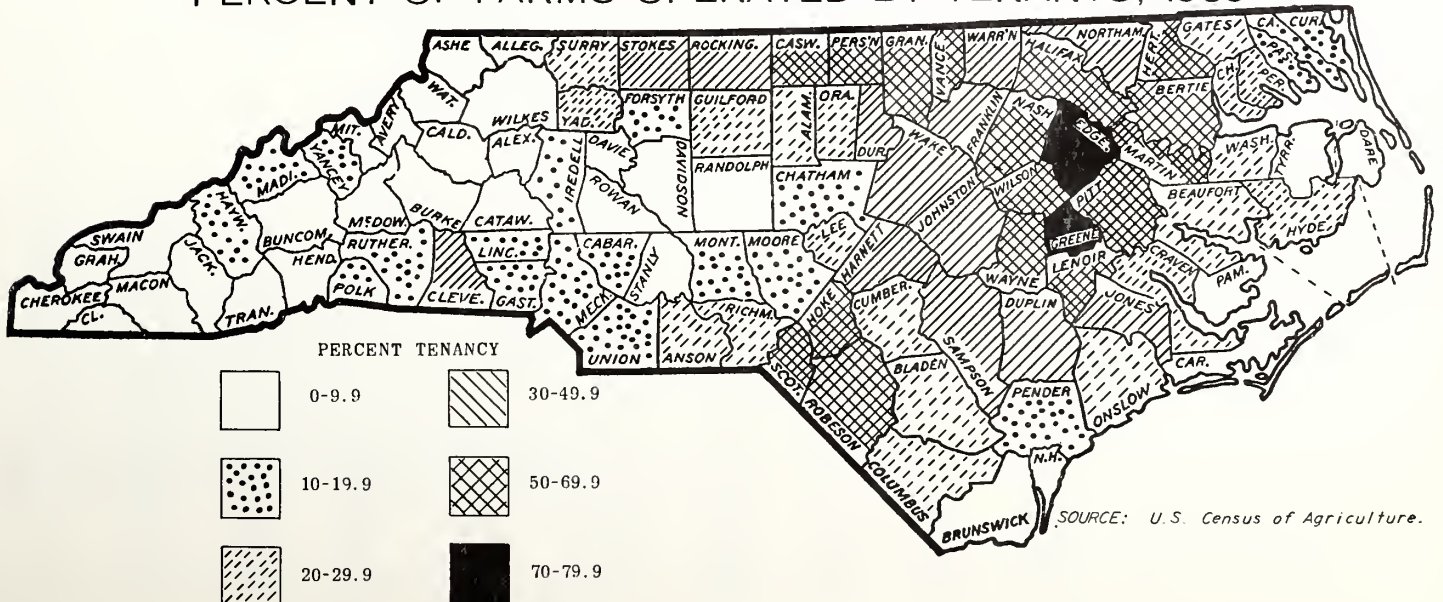
Utilization Of Farm Land, 1962, North Carolina
