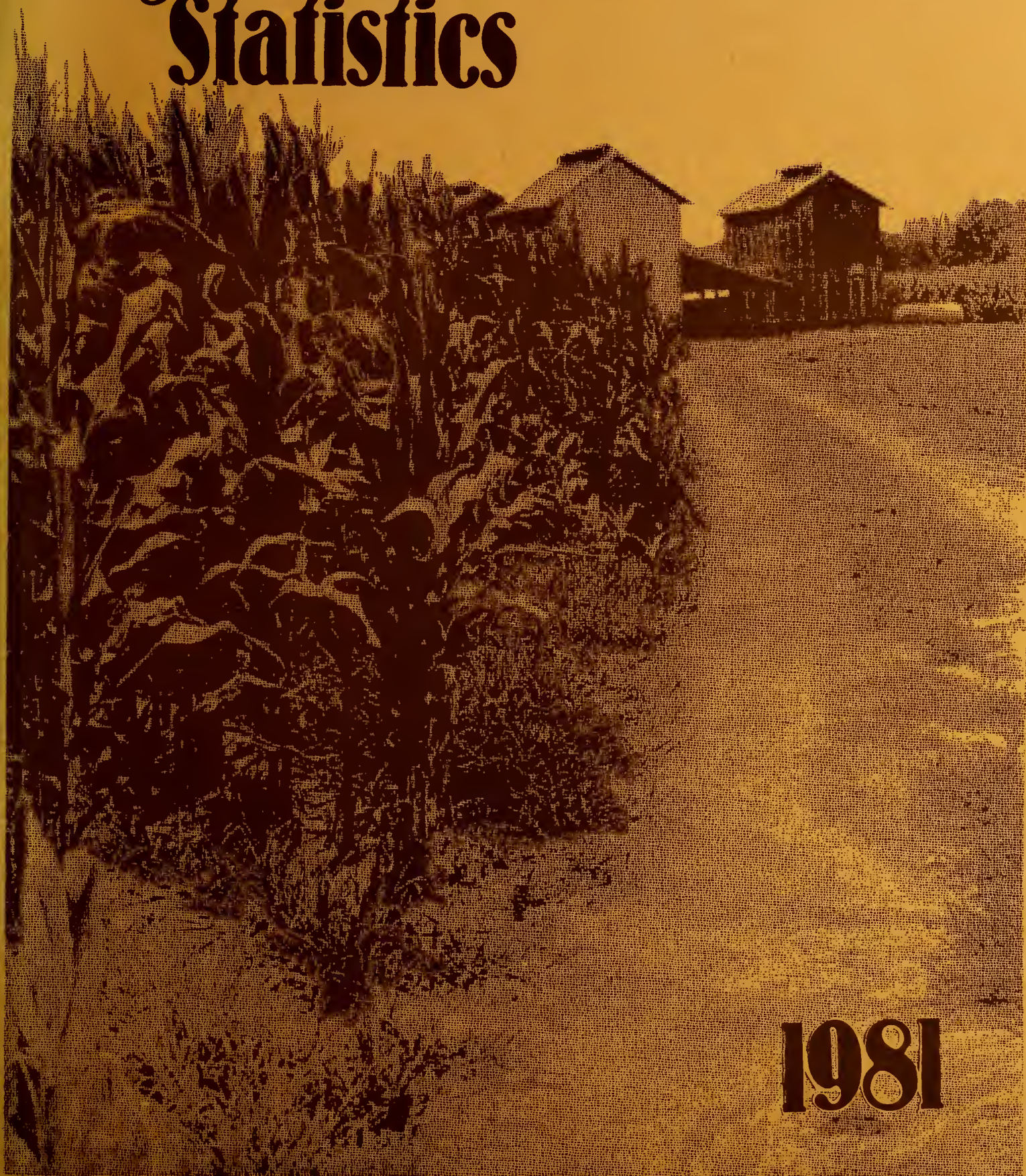

REVIEW OF 1980 SEASON

1980 WEATHER AND CROP ROUND UP

North Carolina farmers generally had ideal conditions in 1980 for planting their spring crops. Moderate rainfall and favorable temperatures aided seed germination throughout the spring. Planting progress was completed on or ahead of schedule for all major crops, with the exception of sweet potatoes. As of June 1, soil moisture was adequate with most crops considered to be in fair to mostly good condition.

After June 1, soil moisture supplies began to dwindle and most crops were adversely affected. The only positive result of the dry weather was a reduction in the activation and spread of blue mold disease in the tobacco crop. Even though soil moisture improved somewhat toward the end of June, supplies became mostly short by the middle of July as temperatures averaged 2 to 4 degrees above normal and rainfall was only half of normal. The regions hardest hit by the drought were the Northern Coastal Plains and the Southern Piedmont. For the most part, the state's crops matured ahead of their 1979 progress due to the stress of dry weather and early planting dates.

The month of August began on a negative note with soil moisture remaining mostly short and all crop conditions continuing to decline. Throughout the period, temperatures averaged about 5 degrees above normal and rainfall registered below normal, statewide. Many of the state's major crops began showing signs of reduced yields during the month. The crops most severely affected by the dry conditions were corn, peanuts, and soybeans, with peanut yields being reduced by as much as 23% from the previous year. The state's peach and apple crops had an excellent level of production during 1980, even though the dry weather reduced fruit size somewhat.

Harvest activities for most crops surged ahead of schedule with late summer and fall weather remaining warm and dry. The harvest of sweet potatoes began slightly behind the previous year's progress because of a late planting date and slower plant development. Crop conditions continued to deteriorate throughout September as soil moisture supplies were considered 90% less than adequate by mid-month. Significant rainfall was received the last week of September, improving the soybean crop slightly but doing little for those crops already being harvested.

The month of October brought the state much needed rain with precipitation ranging from 2 to 5 inches, statewide. The harvest of peanuts and cotton remained significantly ahead of average as earlier dry soils had escalated the development of the two crops. November saw a return to more normal temperatures and rainfall as the harvest of most crops neared completion. The month of December was generally characterized by adequate soil moisture and above normal temperatures. Soybean harvest was virtually complete by month's end.

FLUE-CURED CROP LARGER

The 1980 flue-cured tobacco crop in North Carolina is estimated at 744.8 million pounds, up 22% from the 1979 production of 612.9 million pounds. Average yield per acre is estimated at 2,013 pounds, up 156 pounds from last year's low yield. Harvested acreage at 370,000 is up 12% from the 330,000 acres harvested in 1979.

The value of the crop at almost \$1.1 billion was up 27% from the previous year. The season's average price was \$1.463 per pound.

SOYBEAN CROP DOWN SHARPLY

Soybean production in North Carolina during 1980 totaled 35.7 million bushels, down 22% from last year's record crop of 45.8 million bushels. The drought during the summer months was primarily responsible for this year's poor yield. The yield per acre in 1980 averaged 18.5 bushels, 5 bushels below a year earlier and the lowest since 1968. Acreage harvested in 1980 totaled 1,930,000 acres, down 20,000 acres or 1% from 1979.

The total value of the crop at \$280 million was down 5% from 1979. However, the season's average price was actually 22% higher at \$7.85 per bushel.

CORN PRODUCTION DOWN

Production of corn for grain in North Carolina in 1980 totaled 103.8 million bushels, down 19% from the 1979 crop of 128.4 million bushels. The average yield of 60 bushels per acre was down 16 bushels from the previous year because of hot weather and drought. Acreage harvested for grain in 1980 totaled 1,730,000 acres, up 2% from the previous year.

North Carolina's corn crop was valued at \$379 million, actually an increase of 4% from the previous year. The primary reason for this increase was an \$.81 per bushel increase in average price to \$3.65 per bushel.

BURLEY TOBACCO CROP DOUBLES

The 1980 burley tobacco production in North Carolina is estimated at 16.9 million pounds, almost double last year's disease reduced crop of 8.5 million pounds. The average yield per acre is estimated at 1,925 pounds, up 830 pounds from the previous year. Harvested acreage at 8,800 is up 1,000 acres from the 1979 crop year.

The value of production was \$28.1 million, about 134% greater than the value of the 1979 crop.

PEANUT CROP SMALLER

The North Carolina 1980 peanut crop is estimated at 291.3 million pounds, down 23% from last year's production of 378.5 million pounds and the second lowest production since 1961. The drought conditions during the summer months hindered growth and development. The yield in 1980 averaged 1,755 pounds per acre, down 525 pounds from the previous year. Harvested acreage totaled 166,000 acres, same as in 1979.

The season's average price was \$.226 per pound, an increase of 11% from 1979. However, due to the reduced production figure, value of the crop was down 15% at \$65.8 million.

APPLE PRODUCTION UP AND PEACHES DOWN

Commercial apple production in North Carolina totaled a record high 410 million pounds in 1980, up 13% from the 1979 production of 362 million pounds. Of the total production, 406 million pounds were utilized compared to 361 million pounds the previous year.

Total production of peaches in 1980 for the Tar Heel State is estimated at 45 million pounds. This is 10% below the 1979 production of 50 million pounds and identical to 1978's production.

COTTON CROP LARGER

Cotton production in North Carolina during 1980 totaled 52,000 bales (480-lbs. net), up 21% from the previous year. The average yield per acre at 381 pounds is down 74 pounds from last year's yield of 455 pounds. Acreage harvested in 1980 totaled 65,000 acres, up 20,000 from 1979.

The value of cotton lint was \$19.8 million, up 49% from the previous year. The season's average price at \$.795 per pound was 23% higher than in 1979. Cottonseed was valued at almost \$2 million in 1980, with a season's average price of \$117 per ton.

YAM PRODUCTION DOWN

North Carolina continued in 1980 as the leading producer of sweet potatoes in the United States, accounting for 39% of the national total. The 1980 production of 4,255,000 cwt. is down 11% from 1979. The yield per acre at 115 cwt. was down 5 cwt. from the previous season. Acreage harvested at 37,000 acres is down 3,000 acres from 1979.

The season's average price at \$10.80 per cwt. was an increase of \$.320 per cwt. over 1979. The total value of the crop was \$45.9 million, up 26% from the previous year.

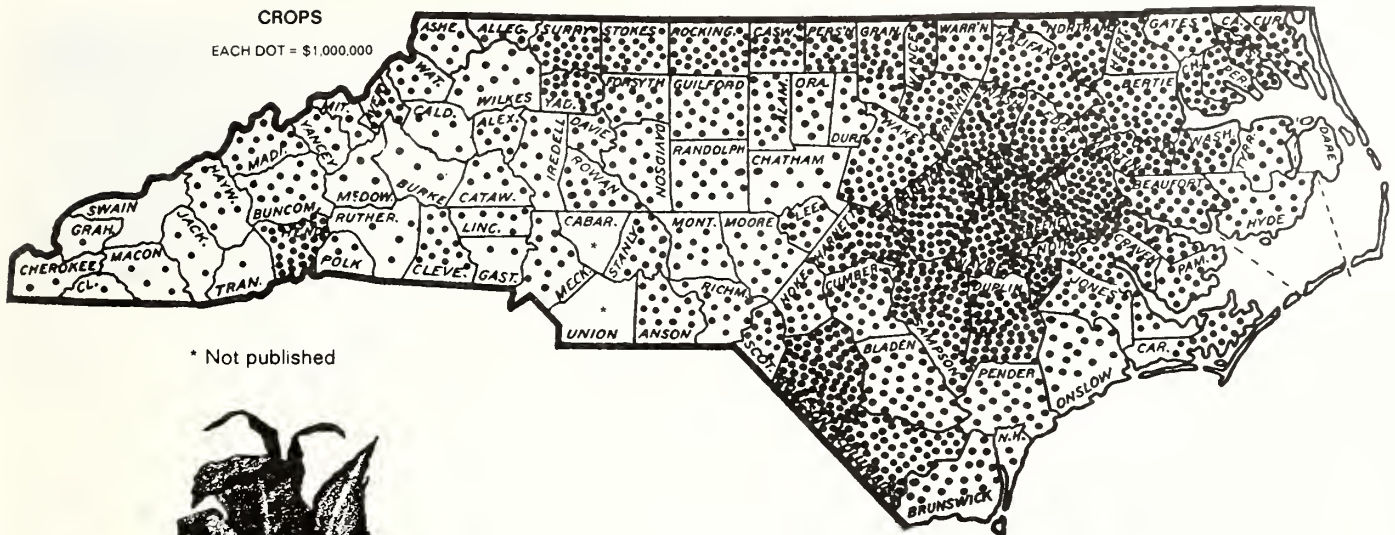

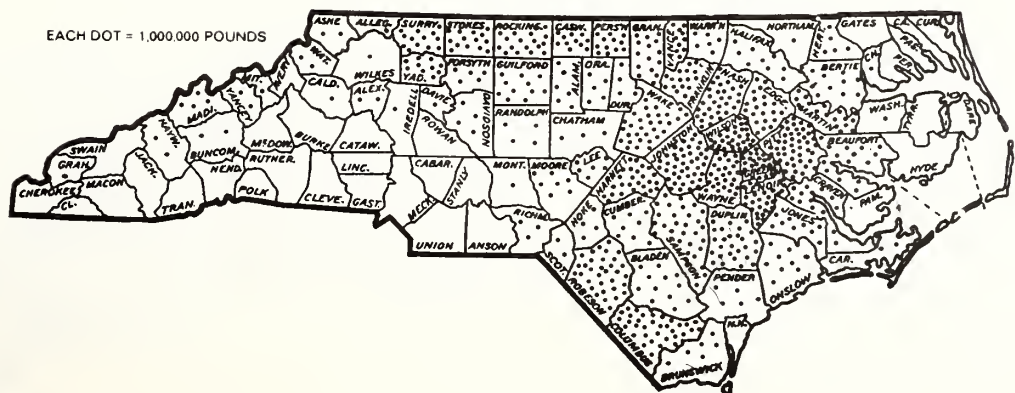
DISTRIBUTION OF CASH RECEIPTS FROM FARM MARKETING, 1979

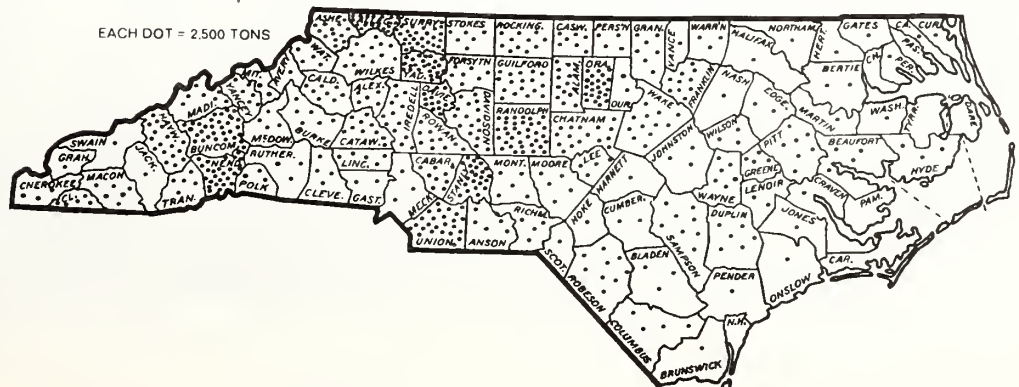

LIVESTOCK, DAIRY & POULTRY

REVIEW OF 1980

TOTAL INCOME UP

Income from livestock, dairy and poultry products totaled approximately \$1.5 billion in 1980, a 5% increase from 1979. All poultry products combined made up approximately \$780 million while income for broilers alone amounted to \$408 million or 27% of the total. Cash receipts from hogs at \$317 million was up 6% from the previous year. This represents 21% of the total. Milk income at \$221 million rose 15% from 1979. Income from cattle and calves dropped to \$108 million, down 18% from the previous year. Cattle and calves accounted for 7% of total cash receipts.

FOURTH IN BROILERS

North Carolina held on to its number four ranking in broilers in 1980 with a total of 400 million birds produced, an increase of 6%. Meat produced increased 4% to 1.6 billion pounds.

The average price per pound for broilers rose 2% to 25.5 cents. This gave a gross income of \$408 million for the state, a 6% increase from the previous year.

Income from broilers is the largest contributor to cash receipts for the livestock and poultry commodity group making up about 27% of the income for this group.

HOG PRODUCTION DROPS

The December 1, 1980 inventory of hogs and pigs on North Carolina farms showed an annual decrease of 7% to 2,460,000 head. The state continues to rank seventh nationally in total hog numbers. Farrowings were down 1% to 557,000 in 1980 for an average of 7.28 pigs per litter, about one tenth of a pig higher than the 1979 average. A crop of 4,057,000 pigs was produced in the state, only 12,000 pigs more than the preceding year.

Hog marketing at 3,872,000 head showed a 14% increase. Increased marketing, along with an 11% decrease in the average price at \$37.60 cwt., gave a 6% increase in cash receipts to \$317 million for the state. The value of home consumption was 14.1 million for the state.

MILK PRODUCTION UP

Total milk production at 1.6 billion pounds was up 4% from 1979. The number of milk cows increased 2% to 134,000 head for the state. Milk output per cow at 12,172 pounds increased 3% from the previous year.

Cash receipts from sales of milk and cream totaled \$221 million, up 15% from a year earlier. The total value of milk produced was up 15% to \$231 million. Fluid milk prices rose 10% from 1979 to \$14.15 cwt.

EGG PRODUCTION UP

The number of eggs produced in North Carolina during 1980 at 3.2 billion was up 1% from last year. The average number of layers on hand was 13.2 million, down slightly from 1979. However, eggs per layer increased 1% from 1979 to the level of 240 eggs.

Cash receipts in the state was 1% higher in 1980 at \$174 million, while the price of eggs per dozen increased less than 1% to 66.3¢. The state remained number 6 nationally in cash receipts from eggs.

NUMBER TWO IN TURKEYS

The state's 3% increase in total number of turkeys raised kept its number two position in the national ranking. Despite the increase to 23.8 million birds produced, the average weight per bird dropped causing total production to be virtually unchanged at 397 million pounds. Liveweight price at 40¢ was down 1¢ per pound resulting in gross income being 3% less at \$159 million.

CATTLE INCOME DROPS

Cash receipts from cattle and calves in the state dropped 18% in 1980 to a total of \$108 million. Fewer cattle marketed coupled with reduced average prices of \$51.40 cwt. for cattle and \$66.70 cwt. for calves caused the large decrease. The value of home consumption of cattle and calves dropped 4% in 1980 to \$21.5 million.

The inventory of cattle and calves on Tarheel farms as of January 1, 1981 was 1.2 million head, up 7% from January 1, 1980. Calf births showed a 4% increase during the year at 490,000 head. Calf marketing dropped 6% to 165,000 head, while total cattle and calf marketing dropped 3% to 350,000 head.

SHEEP NUMBERS UNCHANGED

The number of sheep and lambs in North Carolina at 7,500 head as of January 1, 1981 was unchanged from a year earlier. The lamb crop was up 5% at 6,400 head for the year.

An increase in marketing of sheep was partially offset by a decrease in prices; however, a 3% decrease in cash receipts for the year to \$150,000 was noted.

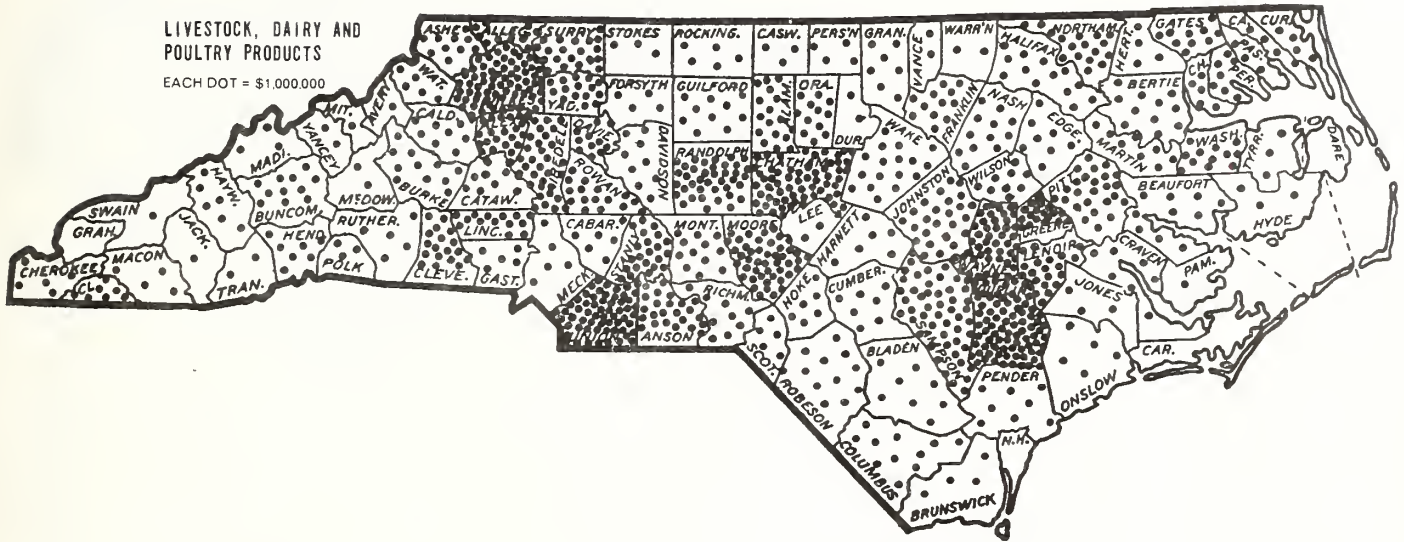

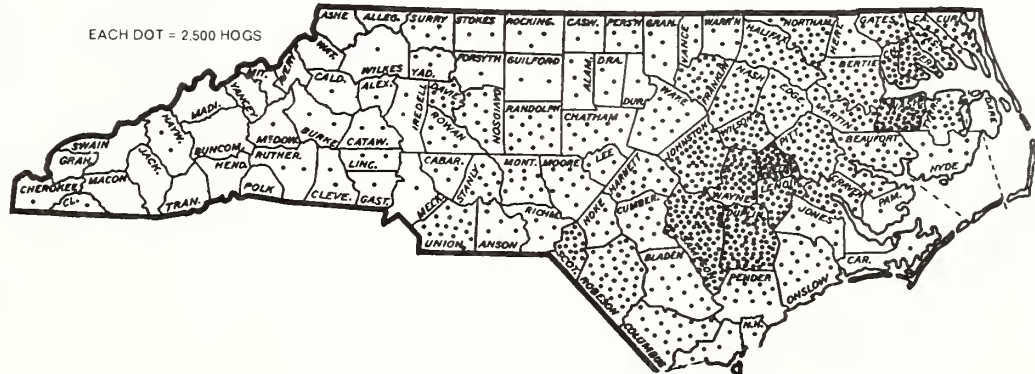

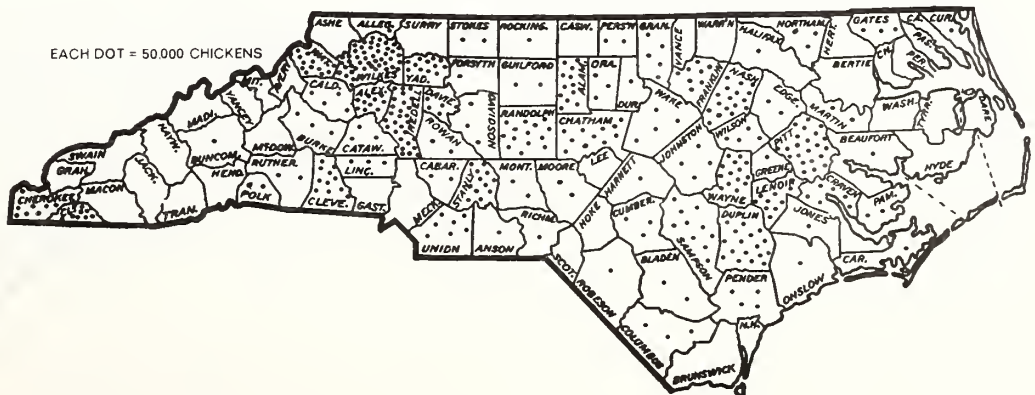

ALL CHICKENS: Production, 1980

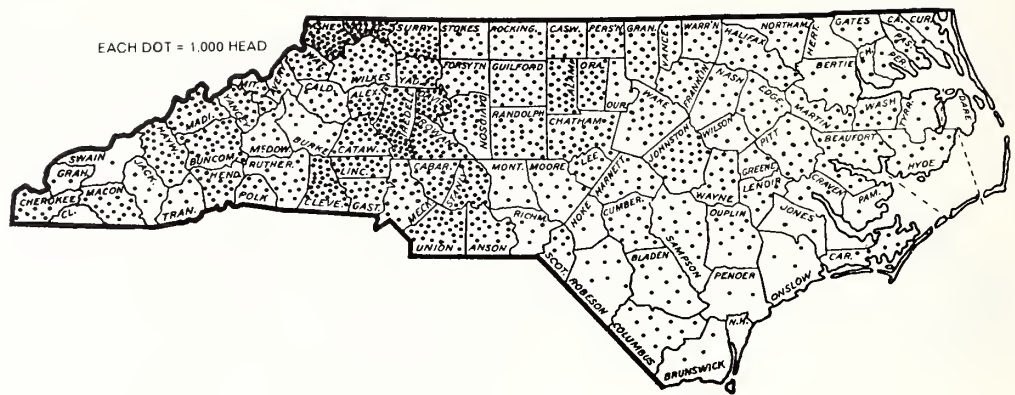

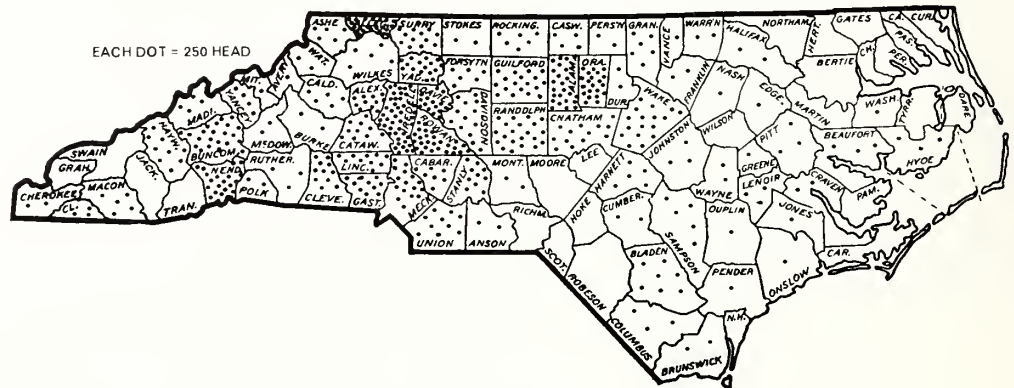

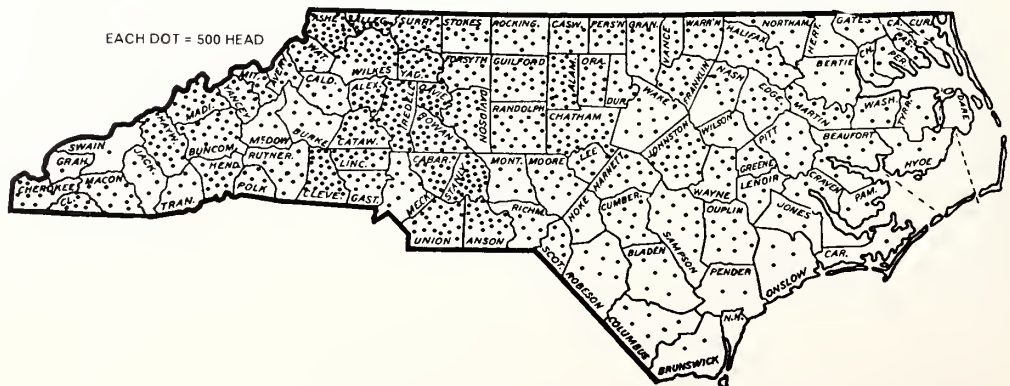
MILK COWS AND HEIFERS THAT HAVE CALVED: Number On Farms, January 1, 1981

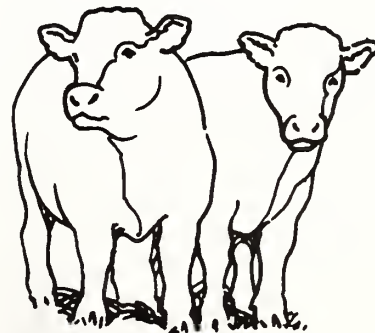

STATISTICAL REPORTS PROGRAM

NORTH CAROLINA AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS brings together the current and historic statistics concerning agriculture in the State. Where possible, types of information most often requested by farmers, the general public, and workers in government agencies are included.

Reporting of crop and livestock statistics is a service rendered to farmers and others in the State by the Statistical Reporting Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the North Carolina Department of Agriculture.

The collection and dissemination of agricultural statistics had its start in 1863. This is one of the oldest activities of the United States Department of Agriculture. It was recognized that there were many advantages of a joint relationship between the State and Federal Governments in the development of agricultural statistics. Thus, in 1919 the N. C. Department of Agriculture entered into a cooperative agreement with the U. S. Department of Agriculture to provide detailed agricultural statistics. The agreement resulted in the creation of the Crop and Livestock Reporting Service Division of the North Carolina Department of Agriculture.

The North Carolina Crop and Livestock Reporting Service publishes official statistics on crops, livestock, prices, and various other agricultural items. A list of the more important reports and the approximate dates of release is shown in the table at right. These reports may be obtained without charge by writing to Agricultural Statistician, P. O. Box 27767, Raleigh, North Carolina 27611.

In addition, semi-monthly releases entitled "Farm Report" are published to meet the needs of persons requiring information on a regular basis.

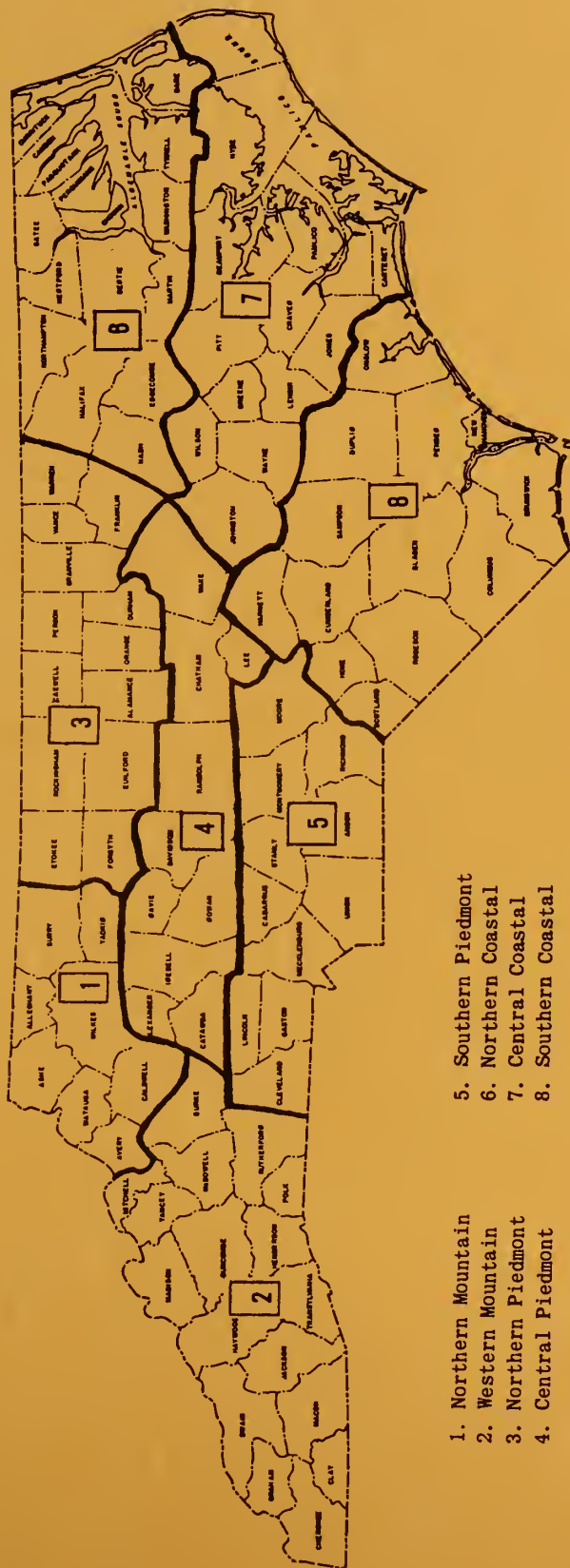
