REVIEW OF 1979 SEASON

1979 WEATHER AND CROP ROUND UP

Early in the year, most farm activities were slowed by extreme weather conditions across the state. A major storm on February 18 brought 7 to 17 inches of snow to the state with the Mountain Region receiving the heaviest amounts. A few days later, the melting snow coupled with fresh rains, caused light flooding in some low areas.

In early spring, field work had an excellent start but then was restricted somewhat by surplus soil moisture. The early spring temperatures were above normal, reaching the upper 70's several times in March. These above normal temperatures resulted in conditions very suitable for field work. Land preparation and spring planting progressed rapidly in April. By April 30, farmers had transplanted about 35 percent of their tobacco acreage, almost double the normal amount. Plantings of most crops, including spring and summer vegetables, were on schedule. Exceptions were the peanut and soybean crops which were delayed by excessive rainfall in May. Early June brought more excessive rains as well as some record low temperatures.

The independent truckers strike occurred at the beginning of the vegetable harvest, thus, creating problems for the farmers who were relying on these truckers to get their produce to market. Other problems also evolved in July as fuel supplies tightened, gasoline prices rose and dry weather persisted. Toward the end of July, however, prospects for most crops improved with needed rains. August was a good month for most North Carolina farmers as crops continued to grow well and they were able to make good progress in harvesting tobacco, hay, corn silage, fruits, and vegetables. Most seasonal vegetables were in generous supply.

Tropical storm David passed through the state on September 5 and left behind over 10 inches of rainfall with the Coastal Plains receiving the heaviest amounts. Wind damage was light but some flooding occurred in low lying areas. Harvesting activities, especially for sweet potatoes and peanuts, were slowed by the storm. On the other hand, small grain germination was aided by the precipitation. Harvest of flue-cured tobacco neared completion during the first part of September, a little ahead of normal; however, yields averaged lower than expected due to blue mold damage. The burley tobacco crop was the most severely affected by the disease. During October, corn harvest made good progress while the harvest of cotton, peanuts, sweet potatoes, and apples lagged somewhat behind the normal pace. During November, harvest gained momentum as did seeding of small grains. December was characterized by above normal temperatures. During the month, soil moisture supplies continued adequate, and farmers were able to virtually complete soybean harvest.

FLUE-CURED CROP SMALLER

The 1979 flue-cured tobacco crop in North Carolina is estimated at 612.9 million pounds. This was 26% less than the 1978 production and the lowest since 1943. The short crop resulted from a reduction in harvested acreage as well as a sharp decline in yield from the previous year. The harvested acreage at 327,000 was down 16% from a year ago while yields averaged 1,874 pounds per acre compared to 2,124 pounds recorded in 1978.

The value of the crop at \$855 million was down 23% from the previous year. The season's average price was \$1.395 per pound.

RECORD HIGH SOYBEAN CROP

Soybean production in North Carolina during 1979 reached a record high 45.8 million bushels, up 11% from the previous record of 41.2 million bushels produced in 1978. The sharp increase in harvested acreage more than offset the moderate decline in the yield. The 1979 yield averaged 23.5 bushels per acre compared to 24.5 bushels for 1978; the record high yield is 26.0 bushels per acre recorded in 1969. Harvested acres for 1979 was an all time high at 1,950,000 and also was 16% above the 1978 acreage.

The season's average price was \$6.40 per bushel, a decline of \$.17 from the previous year's price. However, the total value of the crop increased 8% to \$293 million.

CORN PRODUCTION UP

Production of corn for grain in North Carolina totaled 128.4 million bushels in 1979, an increase of 6% from 1978. The yield at 76 bushels per acre was unchanged from a year ago. The acreage harvested for grain this past year, set at 1,690,000 acres, was up 6% from the previous year.

The value of the Tar Heel crop was \$360 million, up 23% from a year earlier. The average price per bushel increased to \$2.80 in 1979 from \$2.40 in 1978.

BURLEY TOBACCO DOWN SHARPLY

The 1979 burley tobacco crop in North Carolina is estimated at 8.51 million pounds, down 59% from 1978 and the smallest crop since 1942. Damages from excess moisture and from blue mold were the primary reasons for the short crop. The average yield per acre is estimated at 1,135 pounds, less than half the average of 2,415 pounds from the 1978 crop. Harvested acreage at 7,500 was down 1200 acres from a year earlier.

The value of production was \$12.0 million, about 55 percent less than the value for the 1978 crop.

PEANUT CROP SMALLER

Peanut production in North Carolina for 1979 is estimated at 378.5 million pounds, 19% less than the previous year's production. The decline was due to the sharp drop in yields which fell to an average of 2,280 pounds per acre. In 1978 farmers had record high yields averaging 2,825 pounds per acre. Harvested acres at 166,000 were unchanged from a year ago.

The value of the peanut crop was \$77.2 million, down 25% from the previous year's record high. The season's average price was \$.204 per pound.

WHEAT PRODUCTION UP SHARPLY

North Carolina wheat production totaled 7,560,000 bushels during 1979, a 27 percent increase from a year ago. Harvested acres totaled 210,000 which compares to 180,000 acres for 1978. The average yield per acre was estimated at 36 bushels, up 3 bushels from the previous year.

The value of the wheat crop is placed at \$28 million, a sharp increase of 65% from the 1978 value. The season's average price at \$3.70 per bushel showed an increase of \$.85 from the previous year's average.

LARGER APPLE AND PEACH CROPS

The apple crop in North Carolina totaled 350 million pounds in 1979, up from the 1978 production of 324 million pounds.

Peach production also showed an increase over the previous year with 50 million pounds produced, 11% above the 1978 production and 43% above that for 1977.

COTTON PRODUCTION DECLINES

Cotton production in North Carolina during 1979 totaled 43,000 bales (480-lbs. net), down 4% from the previous year. The average yield at 455 pounds per acre compares to the record high of 515 pounds produced in 1978. Harvested acreage totaled 45,000 acres, up 3,000 from a year earlier.

The value of cotton lint was \$13.4 million, down 5% from the previous year. The season's average price at \$.647 per pound was down slightly from the 1978 price of \$.654. The value of cottonseed was \$1.9 million in 1979; the average price for cottonseed was \$124 per ton.

N. C. LEADING PRODUCER OF YAMS

In 1979 North Carolina continued as the leading producer of sweet potatoes in the United States, accounting for 34% of the national total. Harvested acreage for 1979 at 41,000 was up 11% from a year ago. Yield per acre, however, was down 20 cwt. from last season to 120 cwt. Total production was 4,920,000 cwt. for 1979, a decline of 5% from the previous year.

The season's average price was estimated at \$7.59 per cwt., down sharply from the \$9.57 average in 1978. The total value of the crop at \$37 million was down 25 percent from the prior year.

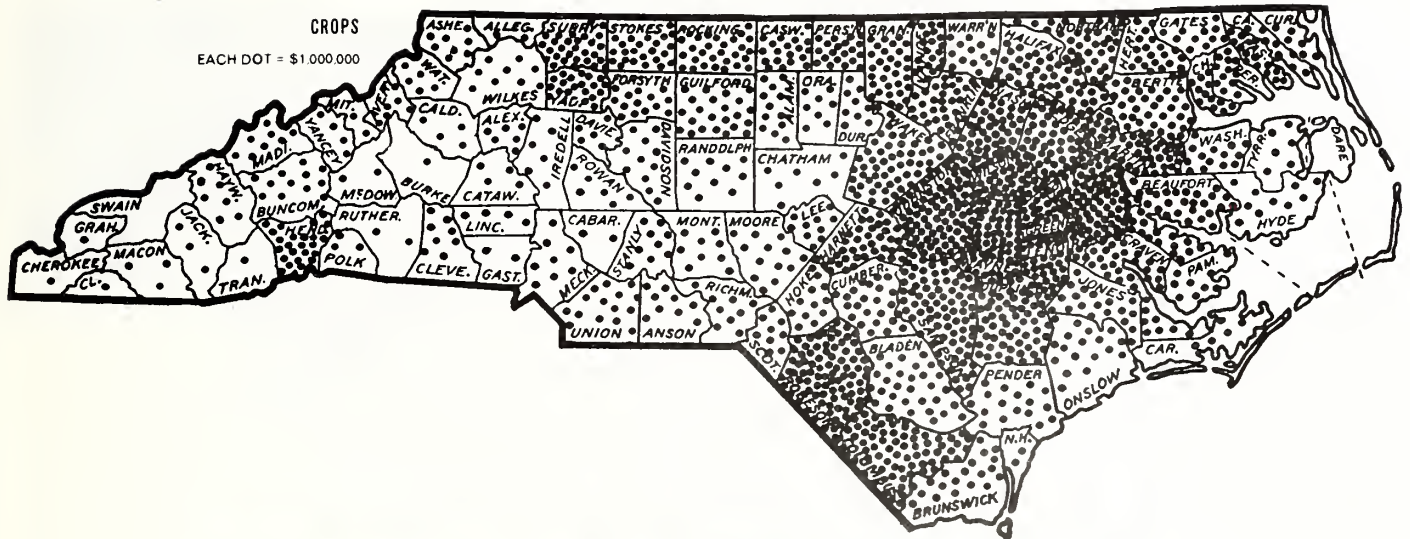
CROPS: Record Highs and Lows Through 1979

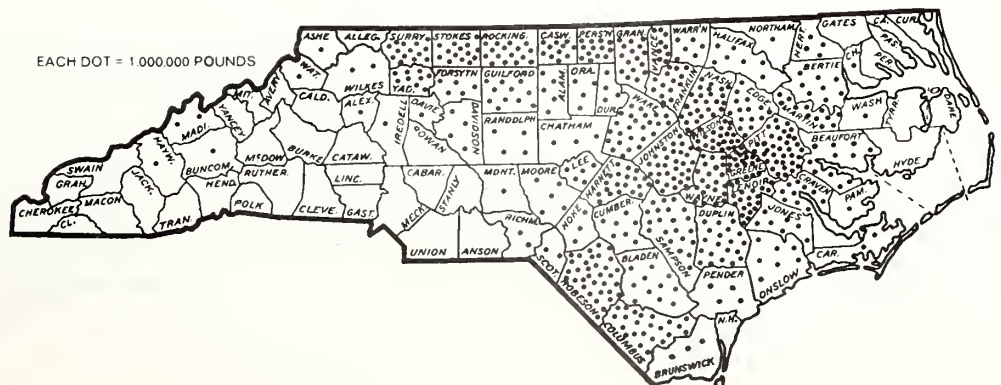
DISTRIBUTION OF CASH RECEIPTS FROM FARM MARKETINGS, 1978

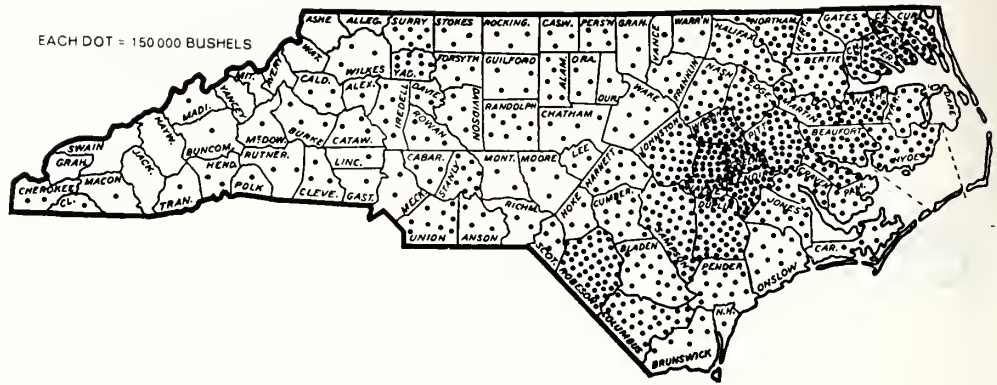

REVIEW OF 1979

TOTAL INCOME DOWN

Income from livestock, dairy and poultry products totaled approximately \$1.4 billion in 1979, a 10% increase from 1978. All poultry products combined made up approximately \$722 million while income for broilers alone amounted to \$386 million or 28% of the total. Cash receipts from hogs held steady at \$301 million, the same as the previous year. This is 22% of the total. Milk income rose 12%. Income from cattle and calves continued to rise to \$169 million, up sharply from 1978. Cattle and calves accounted for 12% of total cash receipts.

EGG PRODUCTION UP

The number of eggs produced in North Carolina during 1979 was up 2% to 3.2 billion eggs. The average number of layers on hand was 13.3 million, up 4% from 1978. However, eggs per layer decreased 2% from 1978 to the level of 238 eggs.

Cash receipts in the state was 10% higher in 1979 at \$173 million while the price of eggs per dozen increased 7% to 66.1¢. With this increase the state still dropped by one position to number 6 nationally in cash receipts from eggs.

INCREASE IN HOG PRODUCTION CONTINUES

The December 1, 1979 inventory of hogs and pigs on North Carolina farms showed an annual increase of 11% to 2,600,000 head. The state continues to rank seventh nationally in total hog numbers. Farrowing were up 20% to 559,000 in 1979 for an average of 7.17 pigs per litter, a slightly higher average than in 1978. A crop of 4,010,000 pigs was produced in the state, 20% more than the preceding year.

Hog marketing showed a 15% increase of 3,398,000 head. Increased marketing, along with a 9% decrease in the average price at \$42.30 cwt., gave a slight drop in cash receipts to \$301 million for the state. The value of home consumption was 19 million, down 17% from 1978.

NUMBER TWO IN TURKEYS

The state's 23% increase in total number of turkeys is moving it closer to the number one spot in the national ranking, held by Minnesota. The number produced totaled slightly more than 23 million birds while the pounds of meat produced rose 23% to 397 million pounds. Live weight price at 41¢, down 5% lead to a gross income of \$163 million.

MILK PRODUCTION HELD STEADY

Total milk production remained at 1.6 billion pounds in 1979, the same as 1978. The number of milk cows decreased 1% at 141,000 head for the state. Milk output per cow increased slightly from the previous year to 11,099 pounds.

Cash receipts from sales of milk and cream totaled \$192 million, up 12% from a year earlier. The total value of milk produced was up 12% to \$201 million. Fluid milk prices rose 11% from 1978 to \$12.70 cwt.

FOURTH IN BROILER

North Carolina held on to its number four ranking in broilers in 1979 with a total of 377 million birds produced, an increase of 7%. Pounds of meat produced also increased 9% to 1.5 billion.

The average price per pound for broilers dropped 3% to 25.0¢. This gave a gross income of \$386 million for the state, a 5% increase from the previous year.

Income from broilers is the largest contributor to cash receipts for the livestock and poultry commodity group. In recent years, it has made up 28% of the total income for this group.

INCOME FROM CATTLE CONTINUES TO RISE

Cash receipts from cattle and calves in the state continues to rise at 45% in 1979 to a total of \$169 million. Average prices of \$57.20 cwt. for cattle and \$82.10 cwt. for calves contributed to this increase. The value of cattle and calves consumed on the farm rose 18% in 1979 to \$7.9 million.

The inventory of cattle and calves on Tarheel farms as of January 1, 1980 was 1.1 million head, the same as a year earlier. Calf births showed a 4% decrease during the year at 470,000 head. Calf marketings dropped 5% to 195,000 while total cattle and calf marketings dropped 8% to 412,000 head.

SHEEP NUMBER INCREASES

The number of sheep and lambs in North Carolina increased to 7,500 head as of January 1, 1980 from the level of 7,000 a year earlier. The lamb crop was down 5% at 6,100 head for the year.

A decrease in marketings of sheep was partially offset by an increase in prices; however, a 20% decrease in cash receipts for the year to \$147,000 was noted.

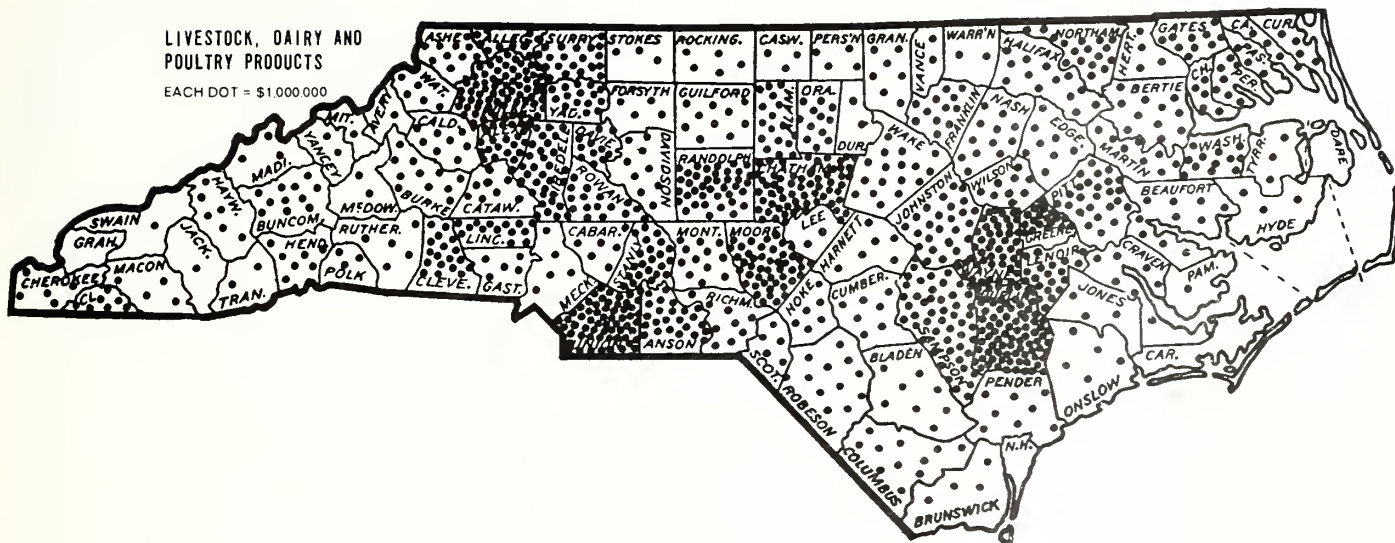

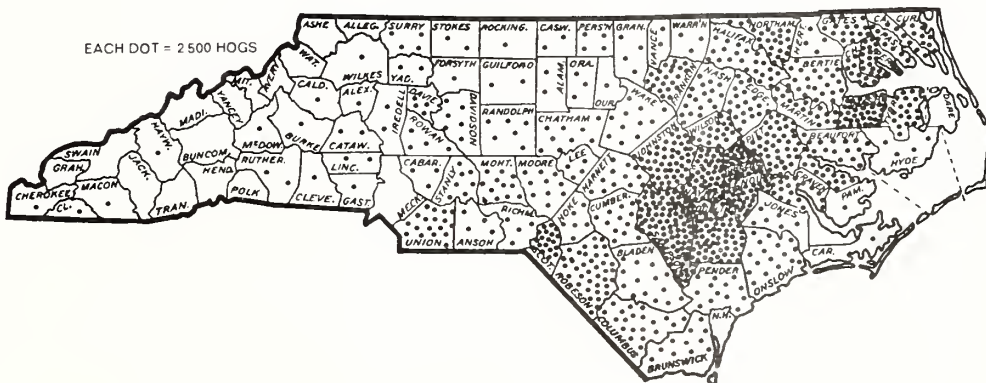

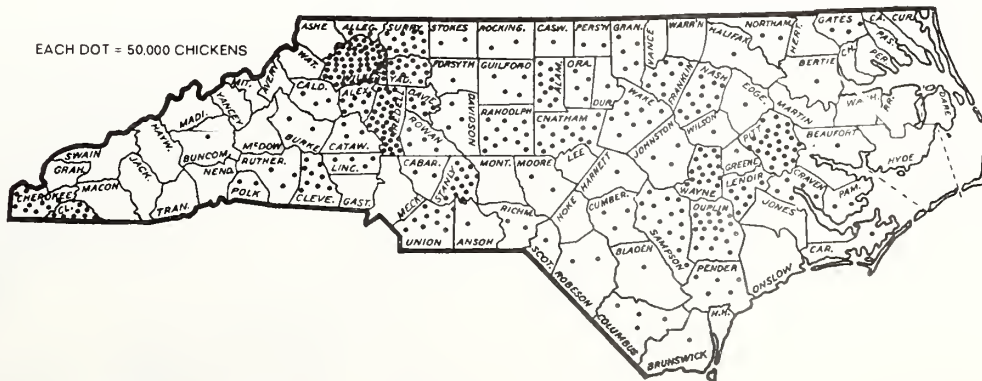

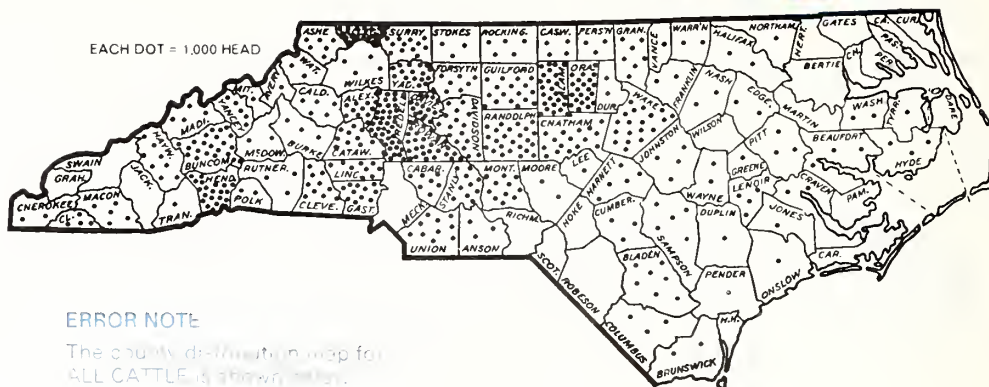

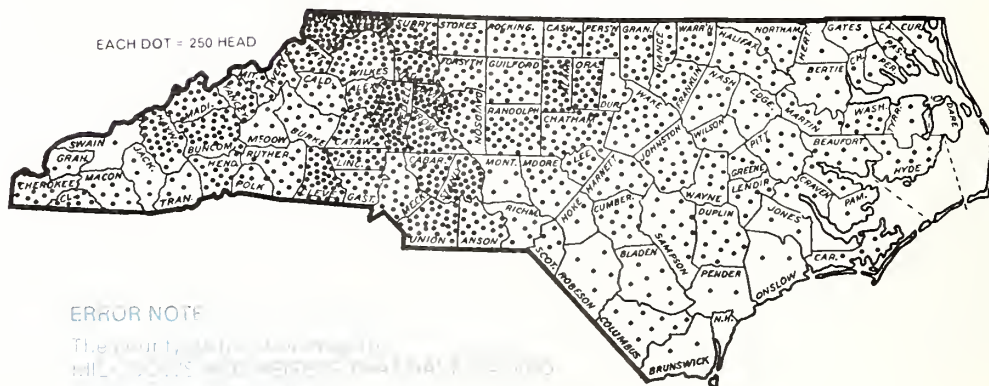

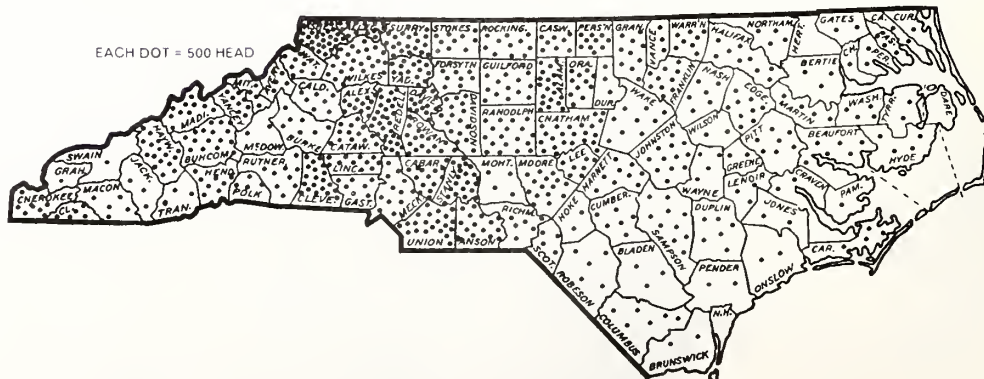

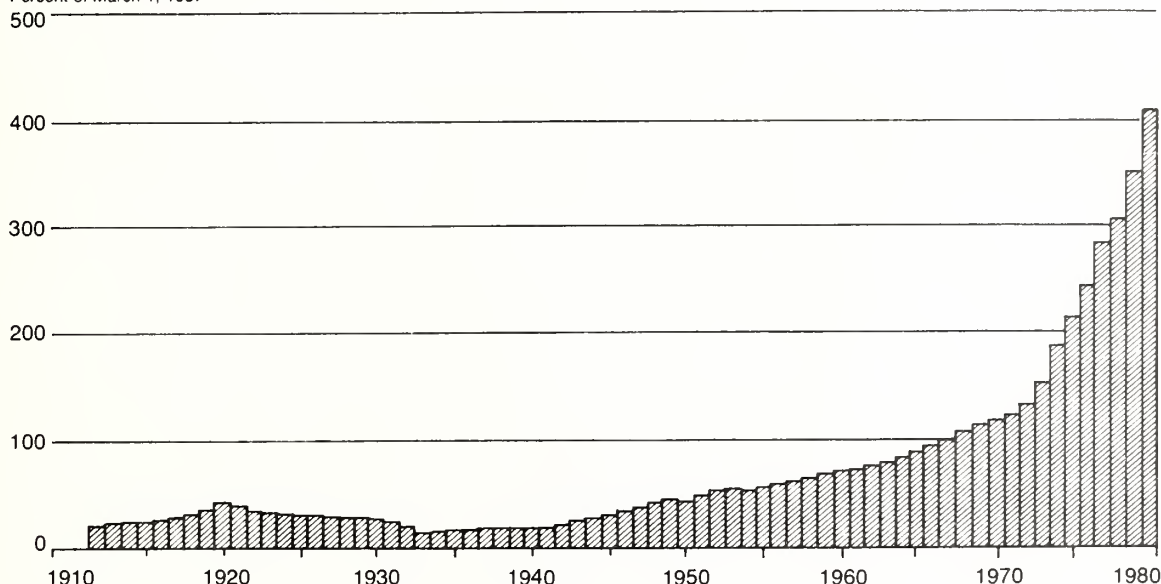

STATISTICAL REPORTS PROGRAM

NORTH CAROLINA AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS brings together the current and historic statistics concerning agriculture in the State. Where possible, types of information most often requested by farmers, the general public, and workers in government agencies are included.

Reporting of crop and livestock statistics is a service rendered to farmers and others in the State by the Economics, Statistics, and Cooperatives Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the North Carolina Department of Agriculture.

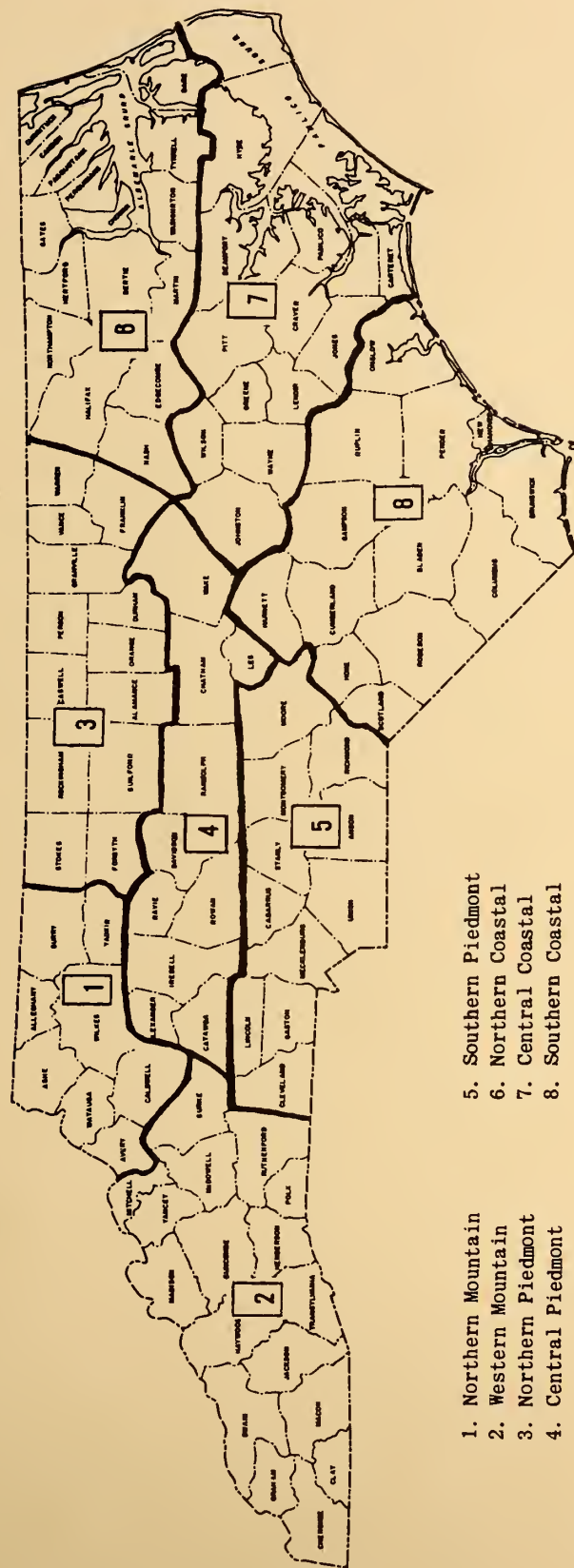
The collection and dissemination of agricultural statistics had its start in 1863. This is one of the oldest activities of the United States Department of Agriculture. It was recognized that there were many advantages of a joint relationship between the State and Federal Governments in the development of agricultural statistics. Thus, in 1919 the N. C. Department of Agriculture entered into a cooperative agreement with the U. S. Department of Agriculture to provide detailed agricultural statistics. The agreement resulted in the creation of the Crop and Livestock Reporting Service Division of the North Carolina Department of Agriculture.

The North Carolina Crop and Livestock Reporting Service publishes official statistics on crops, livestock, prices, and various other agricultural items. A list of the more important reports and the approximate dates of release is shown in the table at right. These reports may be obtained without charge by writing to Agricultural Statistician, P. O. Box 27767, Raleigh, North Carolina 27611.

In addition, semi-monthly releases entitled "Farm Report" are published to meet the needs of persons requiring information on a regular basis.
