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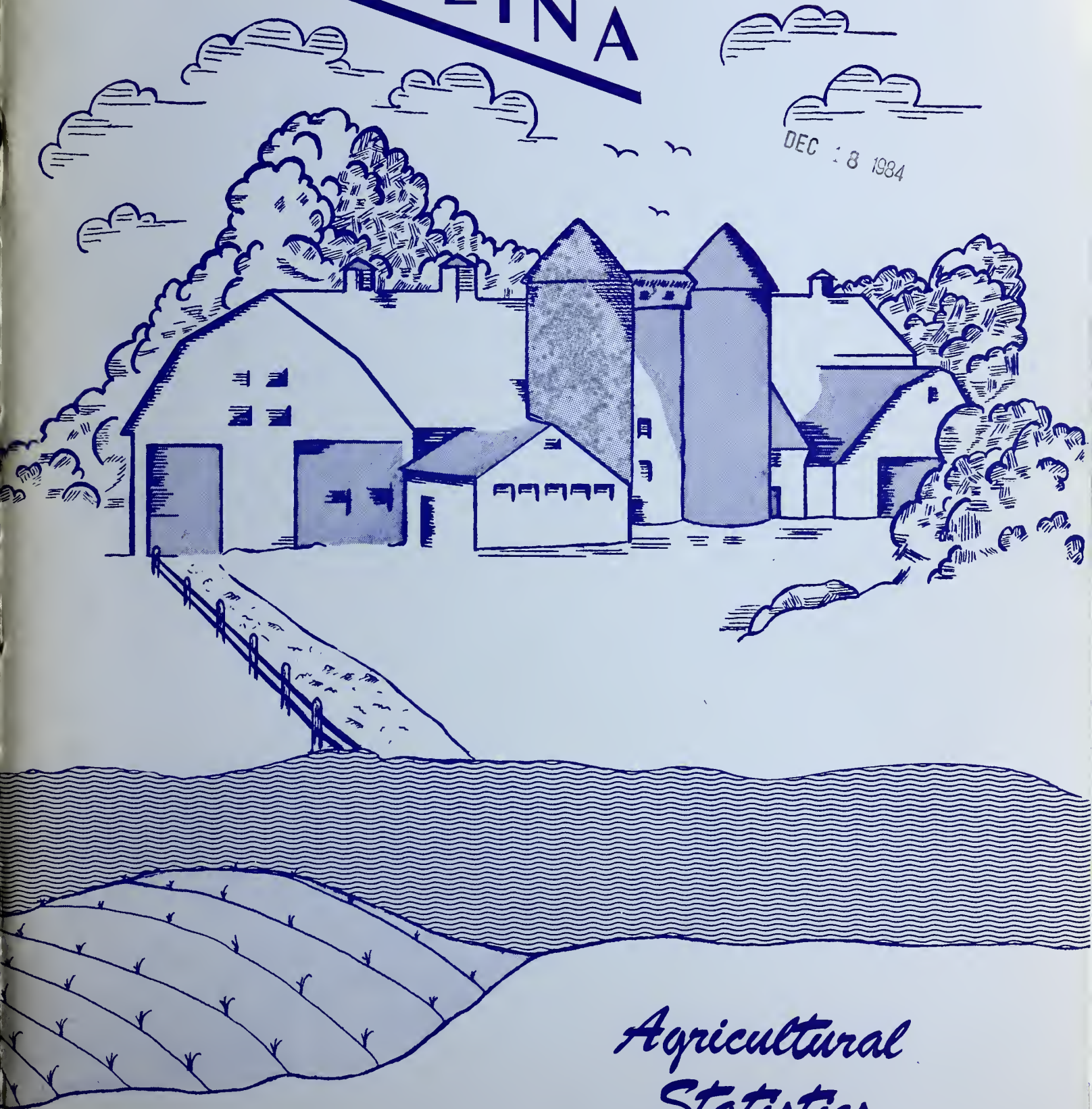

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Dear Data Users:

We are truly living in a machine age and the computer enhances our ability to accomplish many more tasks than was possible just a few years ago. Here in North Carolina we have 85,000 farms. Many of these operations report to us on their crop production, livestock inventories, dairy output, etc. Without the use of automation, we would be hard pressed to summarize these data and come up with meaningful estimates of North Carolina agricultural supply. The computer allows us the flexibility of running various ratios and expansions that previously we didn't have time to compute. Thus, a more thorough analysis can be made and more accurate estimates compiled.

It is heartening to see the use being made of computers by agricultural producers. For the past decade, the agricultural industry has been utilizing this tool and now farmers and ranchers are being encouraged to keep better records and make better planning decisions based on information generated from a personal computer. Information from the North Carolina Department of Agriculture can be obtained on a timely basis through the use of these small computers. It is very helpful to know what current market prices are or the latest estimates on hog numbers or soybean production.

Here in the Crop and Livestock Reporting Service Division of NCDA, we have a terminal hooked up to a main frame computer operated by the State. This allows the Department of Agriculture access to a large computer without having to maintain a large scale operation. In addition, we are hooked into a nationwide network that provides current information on agricultural production from the far northwest to the tip of the southeast. These data are available to anyone here in North Carolina who needs current agricultural estimates.

Even with all the sophisticated hardware available, it still comes down to the basic raw data and information provided by agricultural producers that makes accurate estimates possible. So, thanks and appreciation are extended to all the voluntary reporters who contribute to the data provided in this publication. Without their assistance, the computer is of little value. I also want to commend Commissioner James A. Graham. His support and enthusiasm makes this publication a reality.

WEATHER AND CROPS SUMMARY FOR 1982

WEATHER AND CROPS ROUND UP

There is no doubt that 1982 will be remembered by North Carolina farmers. The year began cold and damp, with several severe cold blasts before January ended with some extremely warm days. February and March were fairly mild months, with some real springlike weather and occasional rainy days. Temperatures were at or slightly above normal, causing many fruit trees to be one to two weeks ahead of schedule. However, winter returned in April with several nights of killing frosts and high winds. Record lows were set on three consecutive mornings, causing severe freeze damage to apples and peaches in most areas of the state. Thunderstorm activity began the middle of May and continued through June. Crop development was excellent and conditions remained mostly good throughout the season. Soil moisture was adequate to surplus across the state.

July was a complete reversal from May and June, quite dry in the Piedmont Region, but heavy rains in the Mountains. Normally the warmest month of the year, July 1982 had no extremely hot temperatures. Diseases and insect infestations were low for this time of year and no problems occurred with weed control. Tobacco harvest made good progress and ran slightly ahead of average. Soil moisture supplies during the month remained adequate to surplus.

August weather was generally typical, except for some heavy rainfall in spots and cool periods. Marketing of the tobacco crop got underway and harvest of corn for silage and apples progressed at a normal pace. August ended on a favorable note, with excellent condition for fieldwork, adequate moisture conditions and crops in good condition.

Autumn arrived in North Carolina right on cue as September's weather was dominated by a cool and dry flow. Soil moisture started to drop and by mid-month was rated as mostly short. Some soybeans began showing stress from lack of moisture. Many harvest activities neared completion. Sweet potato harvest gained momentum and about half of the acreage was dug by month's end. Rain fell across the state during the last week of September, bringing moisture to adequate levels.

October lived up to its reputation. It began like August and ended like December. Harvest of peanuts and cotton got underway, as farmers began seeding fall cover crops. Moisture was adequate. Toward month's end, a coastal storm occurred with wind gusts and heavy rainfall. Temperatures were near to slightly above normal in spite of some real extremes. November was a beautiful late fall month. Precipitation was below normal over virtually all of the state, except over the Mountains where rainfall was two inches above normal. All harvest neared completion by the end of the month. December was unseasonably warm with temperatures five to six degrees above normal. As farmers were winding down activities for the year, they were wondering whether winter was going to come.

FLUE-CURED CROP DOWN

The 1982 flue-cured tobacco crop in North Carolina totaled 669.5 million pounds, down 11% from the 1981 production of 756.3 million pounds. Harvested area was 313,000 acres, or 11% below 1981 acreage. Farmers averaged 2,140 pounds per acre, only 5 pounds per acre below the 1981 yield. The record high yielding crop was in 1964 when 2,280 pounds per acre was raised.

The value of the flue-cured crop reached \$1.2 billion, with farmers receiving an average \$1.785 per pound. The 1981 crop was valued at \$1.3 billion and the season average price was \$1.673 per pound.

CORN CROP RECORD HIGH

Production of corn for grain in North Carolina in 1982 was a record high 165 million bushels, surpassing the previous high 150 million bushels grown in 1976. Production in 1982 was 17% above the previous year and 59% above the drought reduced 1980 crop. Area harvested was 1,630,000 acres, down 11% from 1981. The average yield per acre increased dramatically to a record high 101 bushels.

This was 19 bushels above the previous record high set in 1973 and 24 bushels above 1981.

The value of the crop totaled \$403 billion, up 7% from the previous year's crop. The season average price was \$2.45 per bushel, or \$.23 per bushel below the average price received in 1981.

SOYBEAN PRODUCTION RECORD HIGH

Production of soybeans in 1982 reached record high levels for the second consecutive year. Farmers in the Tar Heel State produced 52.5 million bushels, up 14% from the previous high 1981 crop of 46.3 million bushels. While yields remained the same at 25 bushels per acre compared with 1981, harvested acreage increased 14% to a new record high. Acreage for harvest was set at 2,100,000 acres compared with 2,850,000 acres grown in 1981.

The value of production is placed at \$294 million, 4% more than the 1981 value of \$284 million. Farmers received a season average price of \$5.60 per bushel. This is \$.53 below the 1981 average price of \$6.13, because of the excessive soybean supplies.

BURLEY TOBACCO UP

The 1982 burley crop in North Carolina totaled a record high 31.2 million pounds, up 12% from the previous crop. The larger production was a result of an increase in acreage and a record high yield per acre of 2,600 pounds. The acreage harvested at 12,000 acres was up 10% from a year earlier.

The crop was valued at \$54.3 million dollars, 9% more than the 1981 crop. The season average price was \$1.739 per pound compared with \$1.791 for last season.

PEANUTS DOWN 25%

The 1982 peanut crop in North Carolina totaled 415 million pounds, 25% less than the record high crop in 1981. Area harvested was 147,000 acres, 15% less than last year and the lowest acreage harvested since 1922. The yield averaged 2,825 pounds per acre, 405 pounds below the record high average in 1981.

The value of the 1982 crop totaled \$112.5 million, 28% less than the 1981 crop. The season average price per pound averaged \$.271, down slightly from the \$.280 per pound in 1981.

YAM CROP RECORD HIGH

The 1982 North Carolina sweet potato crop totaled a record high 5,740,000 cwt., 23% more than the 4,680,000 cwt. produced in 1981. The yield per acre averaged 140 cwt., 20 cwt. above last year. Harvested acreage was 41,000, up 2,000 acres from a year earlier. The season average price was \$6.50 per cwt., less than half the average of \$14.00 for 1981. Value of production at \$37 million, was 43% lower than the previous year.

APPLES AND PEACHES FREEZE DAMAGED

Commercial apple production in North Carolina dropped to 170 million pounds in 1982 due to freeze damage. This is 55% less than a year earlier and the lowest production since 1966, when 116 million pounds were produced.

The Tar Heel peach crop totaled 2 million pounds, the smallest since 1955 when the crop was completely frozen out. This represents only 5% of the 1981 production. The low production was the result of freezing weather during the spring.

COTTON CROP LARGEST SINCE 1974

Cotton growers in North Carolina produced 102,000 bales of cotton in 1982, the largest crop since 1974's production of 133,000 bales. The 1982 production was 7% above 1981 and 96% above the drought reduced 1980 crop. While acreage declined from 1981, the average yield per acre reached a record high 699 pounds per acre. The 1981 average yield of 558 pounds per acre was the previous record. Area for harvest totaled 70,000 acres, 15% less than in 1981.

Cotton lint was valued at \$30.4 million, up 14% from 1981. The season's average price at \$.620 per pound was up 6% from the previous year. The value of cottonseed was approximately \$2.0 million in 1982 with a season average price of \$.58 per ton.

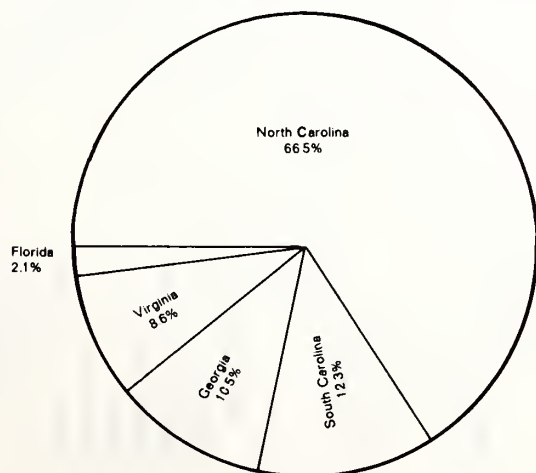

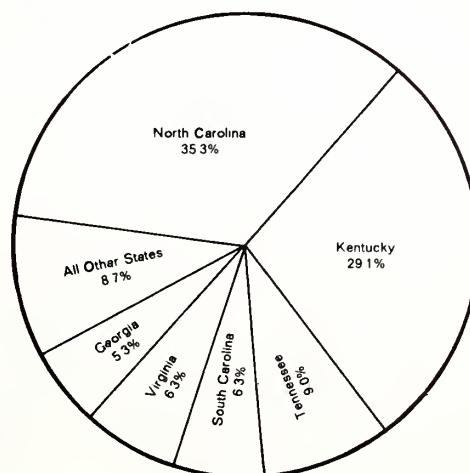

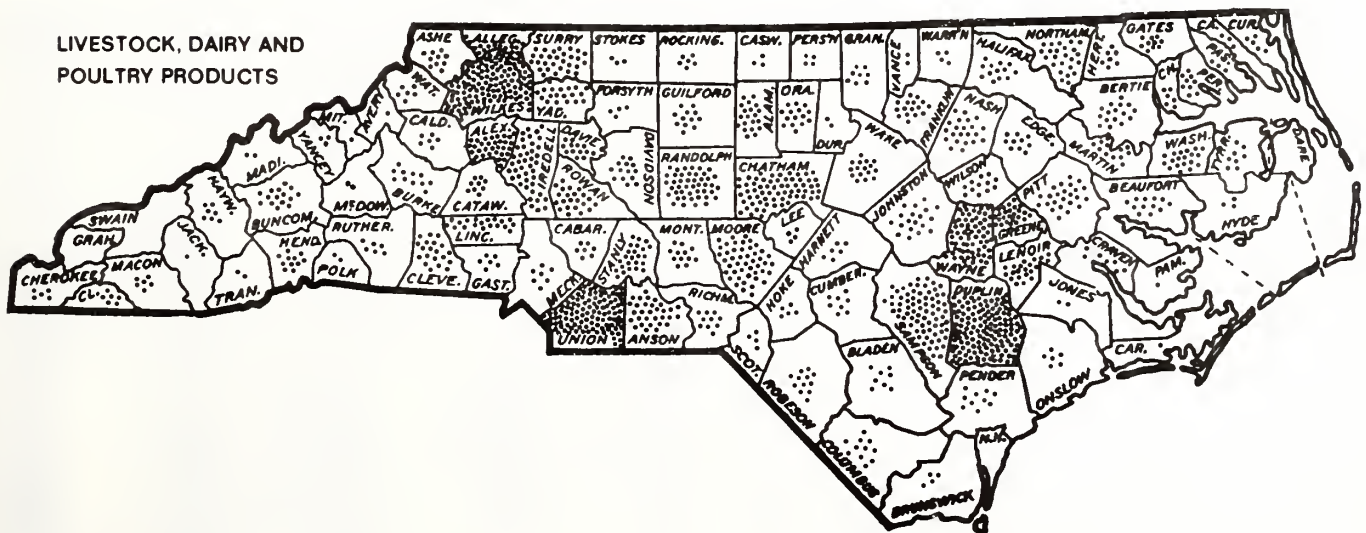

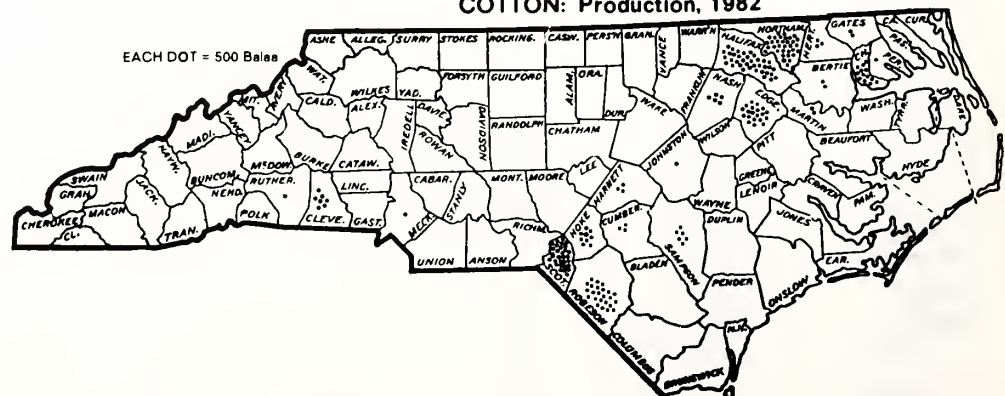

LIVESTOCK, DAIRY & POULTRY

REVIEW OF 1982

CASH RECEIPTS DOWN

Cash receipts from livestock, dairy and poultry products totaled \$1.6 billion in 1982, down 1% from 1981. All poultry products combined accounted for \$829 million while cash receipts from broilers alone amounted to \$422 million or 27% of the total. Cash receipts from hogs at \$365 million and 23% of the total was up 2% from the previous year. Wholesale milk cash receipts at \$240 million rose 3% from 1981. Cash receipts from turkeys rose 10% to a total of \$196 million. Eggs produced during 1982 brought in \$168 million - 3% below 1981. Cash receipts from cattle and calves increased to \$141 million, up 12% from the previous year.

FOURTH IN BROILERS

North Carolina held on to its number four ranking in broiler production in 1982 with a total of 419 million birds produced, a decrease of 1%. Despite the drop in birds produced, meat production rose 1% to 1.8 billion pounds from last year's record high numbers.

The average price of 24.0 cents per pound for broilers dropped 11% and yielded a gross income of \$422 million for the state, down 10% from the previous year.

Income from broilers is the largest contributor to cash receipts for the livestock and poultry commodity group making up about 27% of the income for this group.

HOG NUMBERS INCREASE

The December 1, 1982 inventory of hogs and pigs on North Carolina farms showed an annual increase of 9% to 2,150,000 head. The state continues to rank seventh nationally in total hog numbers. Farrowings were down 5% to 432,000 in 1982 for an average of 7.69 pigs per litter, about one tenth of a pig higher than the 1981 average. A crop of 3,321,000 pigs was produced in the state, 115,000 or 3% fewer than the preceding year.

Hog marketings at 3,031,000 head decreased 17% during 1982. Although marketings were down, the 20% increase in the average price at \$52.70 cwt, resulted in a 2% increase in cash receipts to \$365 million for the state. The value of home consumption at 9.5 million was down 28% from a year earlier.

MILK PRODUCTION UP

Milk production in North Carolina during 1982 totaled 1.7 billion pounds, up 2% from 1981. The number of milk cows at 131,000 head was down 2% from last year. Milk output per cow at 12,870 pounds increased 4% from the previous year.

Cash receipts from sales of milk and cream totaled \$240 million, up less than 1% from a year earlier. The total value of milk produced was down 1% to \$248 million. Fluid milk prices dropped 2% from 1981 to \$14.70 cwt.

FIRST IN TURKEYS

North Carolina remained the number one turkey producing state during 1982. A record high 27.0 million turkeys were produced in North Carolina during the year, up 1% from the previous year's record high number. The total pounds of meat produced, at 478 million increased 2% from last year. Live weight average price per pound was 41.0 cents, up 8% and yielded a gross income of \$196 million, up 10% from 1981.

EGG PRODUCTION DOWN

The number of eggs produced in North Carolina during 1982 at 3.1 million was down less than 1% from the previous year. The average number of layers on hand was 12.7 million, down 2% from 1981. Egg production per layer increased 1% from the previous year to the level of 241 eggs.

Cash receipts from sales during 1982 at \$168 million was down 3% from the previous year. The average price per dozen was 66.3 cents, down 2% from 1981. The state retained its number 8 national ranking in cash receipts from eggs.

CATTLE MARKETING INCREASE

Cash receipts from cattle and calves in the state increased 12% in 1982 to a total of \$141 million. A larger number of cattle marketed and average prices received of \$46.00 cwt. for cattle and \$53.10 cwt. for calves caused the increase. The value of home consumption of cattle and calves dropped 13% in 1982 to \$13 million.

The inventory of cattle and calves on Tar Heel farms as of January 1, 1983 was 1.1 million head, down 5% from January 1, 1982. Calf births showed a 4% decline during the year at 460,000 head. Calf marketing decreased 8% to 171,000 head while cattle marketing increased 16% to 286,000 head.

SHEEP AND LAMBS INCOME UP

Marketing of sheep and lamb meat was 8% above the previous year which resulted in an 8% increase in cash receipts for the year to \$132,000.

The number of sheep and lambs in North Carolina at 7,600 head as of January 1, 1983 was down 1% from a year earlier. The lamb crop was unchanged at 5,600 head for the year.

STATISTICAL REPORTS PROGRAM

NORTH CAROLINA AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS brings together the current and historic statistics concerning agriculture in the State. Where possible, types of information most often requested by farmers, the general public, and workers in government agencies are included.

Reporting of crop and livestock statistics is a service rendered to farmers and others in the State by the Statistical Reporting Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the North Carolina Department of Agriculture.

The collection and dissemination of agricultural statistics had its start in 1863. This is one of the oldest activities of the United States Department of Agriculture. It was recognized that there were many advantages of a joint relationship between the State and Federal Governments in the development of agricultural statistics. Thus, in 1919 the N. C. Department of Agriculture entered into a cooperative agreement with the U. S. Department of Agriculture to provide detailed agricultural statistics. The agreement resulted in the creation of the Crop and Livestock Reporting Service Division of the North Carolina Department of Agriculture.

The North Carolina Crop and Livestock Reporting Service publishes official statistics on crops, livestock, prices, and various other agricultural items. A list of the most important reports and the approximate dates of release is shown in the table at the right. Those reports not marked with an (*) are included in the semi-monthly release entitled "Farm Report". There is a nominal charge for these reports, which are available by writing to:
