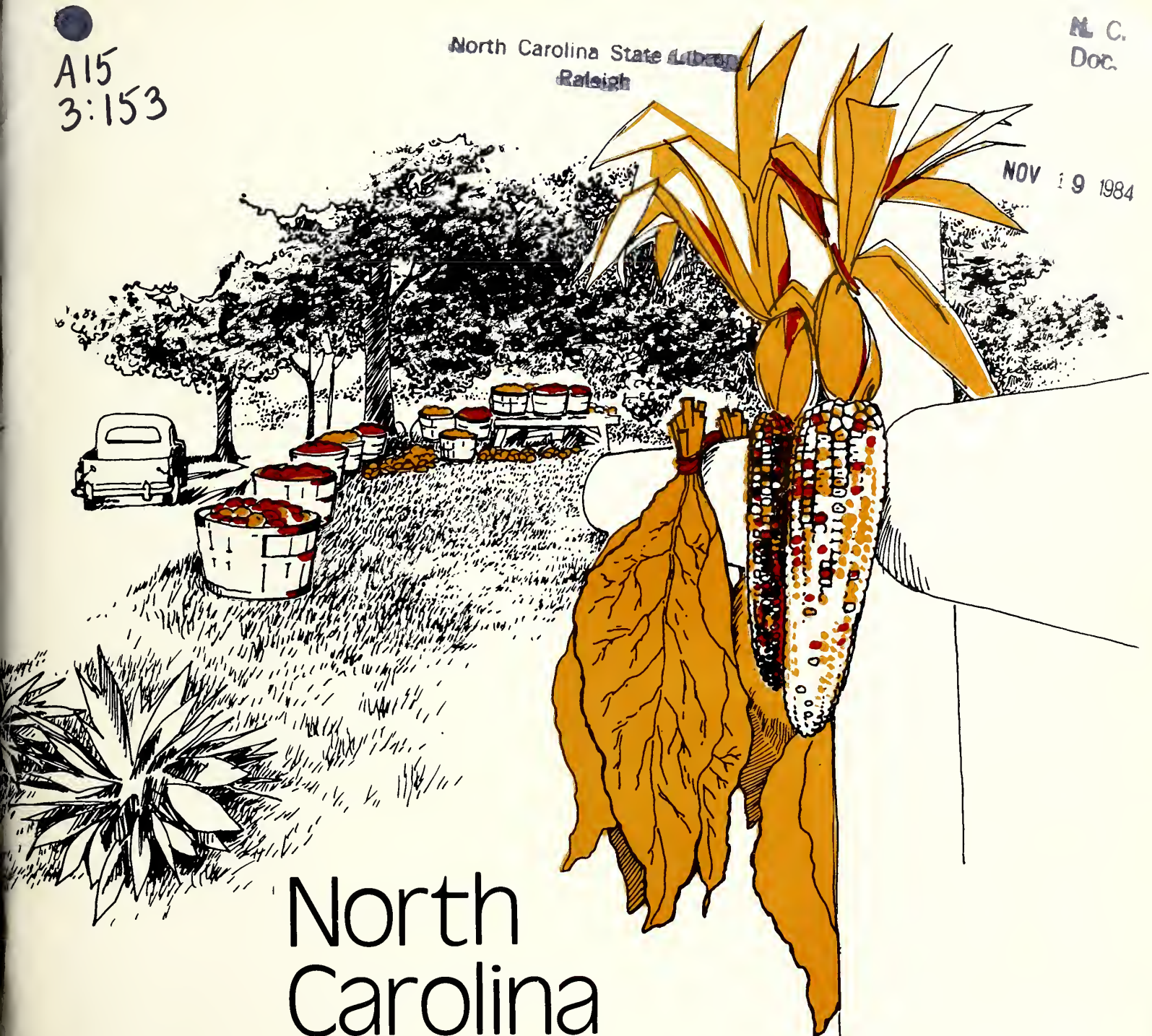

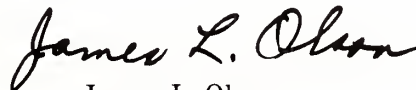

Dear Data Users:

Were you aware that North Carolina ranks first in both flue-cured and all tobacco production, cucumbers for pickles, sweet potatoes, turkeys and receipts from farm forest products? How about fourth in burley tobacco, peanut production and commercial broilers, sixth in eggs, seventh in hogs and apples? This information on agriculture is all recorded in this bulletin covering the very diversified agriculture in this State. The responsibility for measuring North Carolina agricultural production rests with the Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. We are dependent on farmers and ranchers throughout the State who voluntarily answer the many questionnaires we generate. The information provided is the basis for the estimates on production and we are indebted to all who answer our inquiries.

Last year, 1983, was difficult because wet, cold conditions early in the season were followed by drought experienced throughout much of the State. Yields were lowered and livestock and poultry gains curtailed. The vagrancies of weather caused great concern and the news media and agricultural industry scrambled to keep abreast of what was happening. Our phones rang constantly relative to peanut crop conditions, yields on flue-cured tobacco, acreage abandonment for soybeans, etc. It is very important to know what is happening and we are pleased to provide this service to the number one industry in North Carolina.

Again, my sincere appreciation for the many folks who take the time to answer our inquiries. These raw data are the foundation for our estimates and you people are to be credited for making this accurate, unbiased information available.

Special Note

Official crop and livestock estimates are subject to revision when additional information becomes available. One of these sources of data for possible revision is the 1982 U. S. Census of Agriculture which became available earlier this year. State level estimates are revised followed by county level revisions. This bulletin is being published while these revisions are underway, resulting in revised estimates at the **State** level for field crops, hay and potatoes. Estimates for other crops, livestock and poultry will be revised and published at a later date. **County** estimates will be recomputed to the revised levels for all agricultural estimates and published in 1985.

STATISTICAL REPORTS PROGRAM

NORTH CAROLINA AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS brings together the current and historic statistics concerning agriculture in the State. Where possible, types of information most often requested by farmers, the general public, and workers in government agencies are included.

Reporting of crop and livestock statistics is a service rendered to farmers and others in the State by the Statistical Reporting Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the North Carolina Department of Agriculture.

The collection and dissemination of agricultural statistics had its start in 1863. This is one of the oldest activities of the United States Department of Agriculture. It was recognized that there were many advantages of a joint relationship between the State and Federal Governments in the development of agricultural statistics. Thus, in 1919 the N. C. Department of Agriculture entered into a cooperative agreement with the U. S. Department of Agriculture to provide detailed agricultural statistics. The agreement resulted in the creation of the Crop and Livestock Reporting Service Division of the North Carolina Department of Agriculture.

The North Carolina Crop and Livestock Reporting Service publishes official statistics on crops, livestock, prices, and various other agricultural items. A list of the most important reports and the approximate dates of release is shown in the table at the right. Those reports marked with an (*) are issued separately. All others are included in the semi-monthly release entitled "Farm Report". There is a nominal charge for these reports, which are available by writing to:

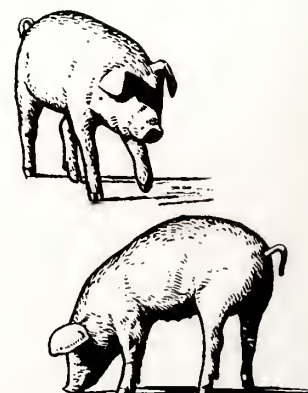

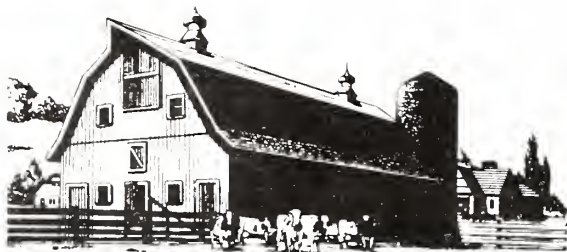

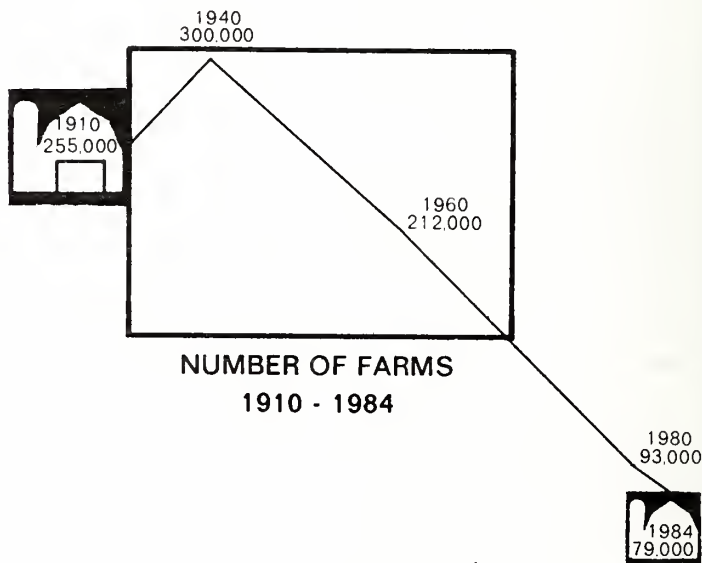

Fewer N.C. Farm Workers, Wage Rates Higher

During the week of July 8-14, 1984, there were 163,000 people working on North Carolina farms, 2% fewer than during the comparable period in 1983. Of this total, 95,000 were hired workers, off 13% from last year; 25,000 were unpaid family workers and 43,000 were farm operators, both up 19%.

The average number of hours worked during the week dipped slightly to 38.4 for farm operators but increased 7% to 39.7 hours for unpaid family workers. The number of

hours worked by hired employees rose only slightly to 26.3 for the week.

Wage rates paid to most categories of North Carolina hired workers rose slightly from 1983 levels. The rates per hour and the respective increases were: field workers, \$3.40, up 4¢; livestock, \$4.19, up 7¢; and other, \$3.70, up 2¢. Of the total hired workers, those paid by the hour received \$3.47 per hour, up 5¢ while those paid by other methods (weekly, monthly, etc.) received an equivalent \$4.26 per hour, up 3¢.

Weather Extremes Hurt Crops

The 1982-83 winter was one of the wettest in recent history. Nearly every station in the State had above normal rainfall for February and March and in some cases it was the most ever recorded. The heavy rains were very damaging in many instances, causing widespread delays to spring farm work and lowland flooding in many places. Days suitable for fieldwork averaged less than two per week during February and March.

Temperatures during February averaged near normal in the western mountains to over two degrees below normal along the coast. March temperatures were near to slightly above normal although some very extreme cold occurred in late March.

Wet weather in April continued to delay fieldwork. Planting of the corn crop was 15% complete as of April 24, compared to average progress of 79% for the date. Record low temperatures on April 20-21 reduced the peach crop to about 25% of a full crop. May temperatures were 1 to 3 degrees below normal across the State. May rainfall ranged from over three inches below normal in parts of the east to several inches above normal across the northern Piedmont. Planting of spring crops was behind normal at the end of May. June temperatures averaged one to three degrees below normal with some fairly cool nights, which delayed crop development. Most locations had adequate rainfall during June, but there were some local dry spots.

July brought high temperatures and dry conditions to the State. By the third week of July, temperatures soared into the nineties and low one hundreds statewide. The adequate soil moisture of June turned to very short during July, with ratings of 55% very short for the week ending July 24. Crop conditions continued to deteriorate during

August and drought conditions existed. Soil moisture supplies were reported to be 70% very short for the week ending August 21. Most locations had less than half their normal rainfall for August, and in some spots only 15% of normal August precipitation fell. A sizzling 110 degrees was reported at Fayetteville on August 21, the highest temperature ever officially recorded in North Carolina. Tobacco harvest was delayed by the weather and fell 17 points behind average by August 28.

High temperature records were broken and rainfall was generally well below normal during September. Harvest lagged behind normal for most crops. Crop conditions remained in the poor to fair range.

During October most locations averaged near to slightly above normal in temperature. Rainfall continued to be below normal in most areas. Harvest progressed well, with corn catching up to near average during the month. It was very moderate during November, as temperatures averaged near normal statewide. Most noteworthy was the above normal rainfall. Many locations had nearly two inches of surplus moisture. Soybean harvest was slowed during the month and lagged 15 points behind the average on November 27. December also turned out to be a very wet month, with most locations several inches above normal. Sunny days persisted during the first two weeks of the month, then cold air moved into the State. Christmas day was the coldest Christmas on record in the Tar Heel State. For the record, December was colder than normal. Soybean harvest was still behind average during December. Eight percent of the crop was left to be harvested on December 24.

TOTAL FERTILIZER CONSUMPTION DOWN 12%

Fertilizer consumption in North Carolina during the year ended June 30, 1983 totaled 1,478,986 tons, down 12% from the 1981-82 total. Both mixed fertilizer and fertilizer materials were down 12% each. Mixed fertilizer accounted for 65% of the total consumption and direct application materials accounted for the remaining 35%.

The most widely applied mixed fertilizers were 10-10-10, 5-10-30 and 3-9-9 respectively. These three fertilizers accounted for 28% of the total fertilizer mixtures. Nitrogen solutions,

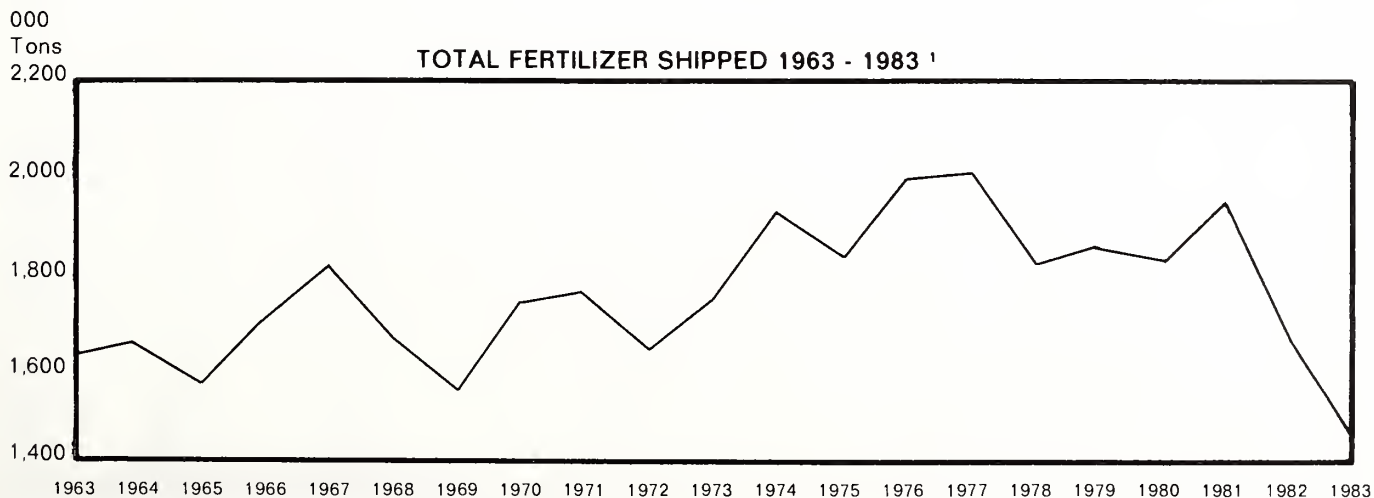
ammonium nitrate and muriate of potash were the three most popular fertilizer materials. This group of materials accounted for 81% of the total materials. Nitrogen solutions alone accounted for 65% of the total materials.

Fertilizer consumption represents all commercial fertilizer tonnage sold or shipped for farm and non-farm use as fertilizer. Materials used in the manufacture of registered mixes or for use in other fertilizer are excluded.

CROPS

Flue-Cured Crop Down Sharply

Production of flue-cured tobacco in North Carolina in 1983 totaled 524.9 million pounds, down 22% from the 1982 production of 669.5 million pounds. Harvested area was 267,000 acres, down 15% from the 1982 acreage and the lowest of record. The yield per acre averaged 1,965 pounds, significantly below the 1982 average yield of 2,140 pounds.

The value of the flue-cured crop reached \$934 million, with farmers receiving an average of \$1.780 per pound. The 1982 crop was valued at \$1.2 billion and the season average price was \$1.785 per pound.

Corn Crop Down 50%

North Carolina corn production for 1983 was slightly less than half the 1982 production at 76.8 million bushels. Acres harvested at 1,280,000 were down 18% from 1982. The average yield per acre was 60 bushels, drastically below the 1982 record high average yield of 99 bushels per acre.

The value of the crop totaled \$292 billion, down 21% from the previous year's crop. The season average price was \$3.80 per bushel, \$1.43 higher than the average price received in 1982.

Soybeans Down

Production of soybeans in the Tar Heel State was 31 million bushels, down 40% from 1982 and 32% below 1981. Harvested area was 1.65 million acres, 21% less than the previous year. Yield per acre averaged 19 bushels, 6 bushels less than both 1982 and 1981.

The value of production is placed at \$248 million, 15% less than the 1982 value of \$293 million. Farmers received a season average price of \$7.90 per bushel, \$2.32 more than that of 1982.

Burley Tobacco Down

The 1983 Burley Crop in North Carolina totaled 22 million pounds, down 29% from the previous year's record high production of 31.2 million pounds. The lower production was the result of a decrease in acreage and yield. Harvested acreage was set at 10,700 acres for 1983 and the average yield per acre was 2,055 pounds, both down 16% from a year ago.

The crop was valued at \$39.3 million, 27% less than the 1982 crop. The season average price was \$1.789 per pound compared with \$1.739 for last season.

Peanuts Down 23%

The 1983 peanut crop in North Carolina totaled 318 million pounds, 24% less than the 1982 crop. Area harvested was 147,000 acres, the same as last year which was the lowest acreage since 1922. The yield averaged 2,165 pounds per acre, 635 pounds below 1982 and 1,065 pounds less than the record high yield of 1981.

The value of the 1983 crop totaled \$78.6 million, down 30% from the 1982 crop. The season average price averaged \$.247, down from 1982 at \$.271 per pound.

Sweet Potatoes Down

Yam production in the Tar Heel State is estimated at 4.4 million cwt., 25% less than the record high production in 1982 of 5.9 million cwt. The yield per acre averaged 120 cwt., 15 cwt. less than the previous year. Harvested acreage was 37,000, down 7,000 acres from 1982. The season average price was \$14.60 per cwt., over twice the average price of 1982. Value of production at \$64.8 million was 57% above the previous year.

Apple Crop Recovery

Commercial apple production in North Carolina at 415 million pounds for 1983 was 144% above the freeze damaged crop of 1982 and 11% above the 1981 production.

Peaches Frozen Again

The Tar Heel peach crop totaled 12 million pounds in 1983. This was 6 times as many as the previous year's crop of only 2 million, also reduced by freeze damage, but less than one-third the size of the 1981 crop.

Cotton Crop Reduced

Cotton growers in North Carolina produced 43,000 bales of cotton in 1983, 58% less than 1982 and 55% less than in 1981. This was the result of both decreased acreage and yield. Harvested acreage was set at 59,000 acres, down 16% from a year ago, while the average yield per acre dropped 50% to 350 bales per acre.

Cotton lint was valued at \$14.6 million, down 52% from 1982. The season's average price at \$.706 per pound was up 15% from the previous year. The value of cottonseed was \$2.6 million in 1983 with a season average price of \$163 per ton.

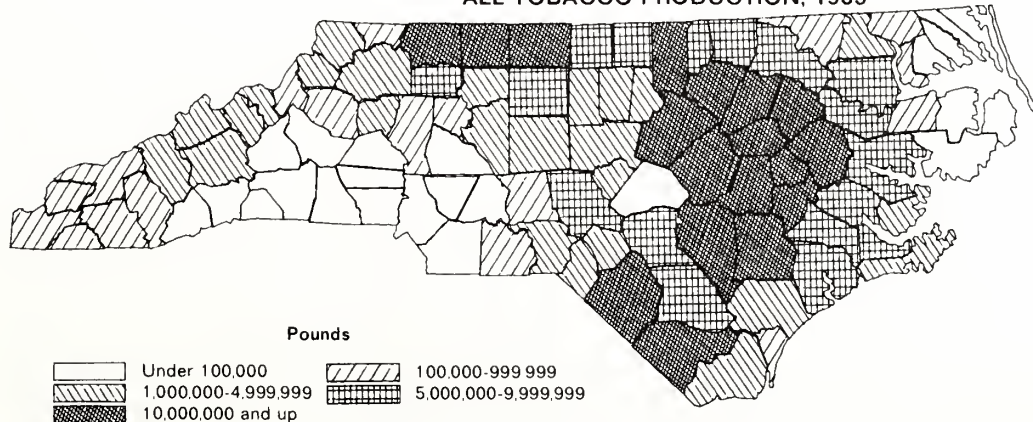

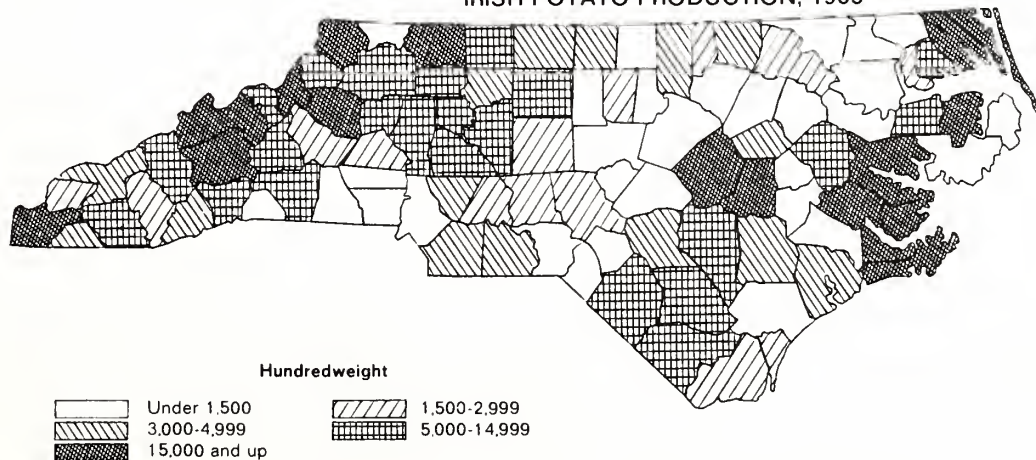

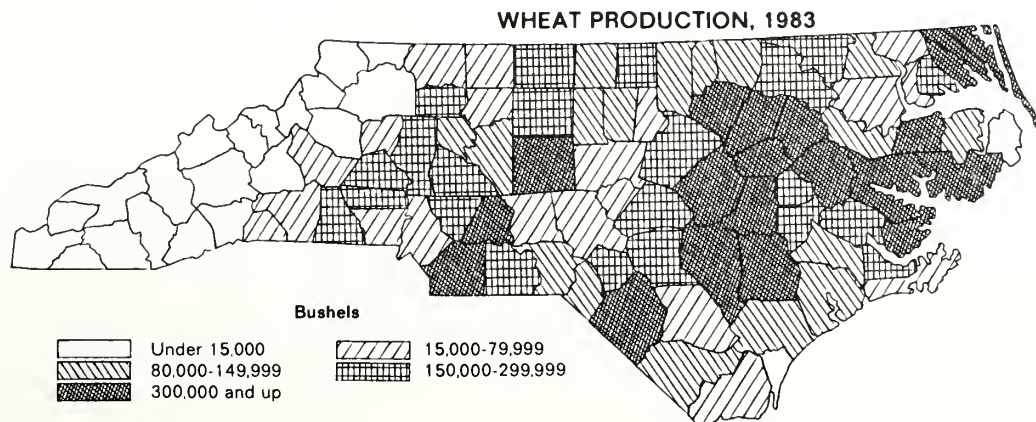

Cash Receipts Increase

Cash receipts from livestock, dairy, and poultry products totaled \$1.7 billion in 1983, up 4% from 1982. All poultry products combined accounted for \$912 million while broilers alone amounted to \$487 million or 29% of the total livestock and poultry cash receipts. Receipts from hogs at \$373 million and 23% of the total were up 6% from the previous year. Wholesale milk cash receipts rose 2% from 1982 to \$245 million. Cash receipts from turkeys totaled \$203 million, 3% more than 1982. Eggs produced during 1983 brought in \$171 million, 1% below the previous year. Cash receipts from cattle and calves decreased to \$107 million, down 25% from 1982.

Broiler Production Record High

Heavier slaughter weights for Tar Heel birds coupled with a small increase in birds produced accounted for a record high 1.8 billion pounds of broilers in 1983, 3% more than last year. North Carolina held on to its number four ranking in broiler production with a total of 420 million birds produced, slightly above 1982.

The average price of 27.0 cents per pound for broilers rose 13% and yielded a gross income of \$487 million for the State, another record high and 15% above the previous year. Income from broilers is the largest contributor to cash receipts for the livestock and poultry commodity group making up about 29% of the income for this group.

Seventh In Hogs

North Carolina continues its number seven national ranking in hog production with a December 1, 1983 inventory of 2,300,000 head, an annual increase of 7%. Farrowings were up 12% to 483,000 head in 1983 for an average of 7.8 pigs per litter, continuing the gradual increase in pigs saved per farrowing. A crop of 3,767,000 pigs was produced in the State during the year, 446,000 or 13% more than the preceding year.

Hog marketings at 3,446,000 head increased 18% during 1983. Although the average price for hogs dropped 12% to \$46.30 cwt., the increase in marketings resulted in a 6% increase in cash receipts to a record high \$373 million for the State. The value of home consumption at 8.3 million was down 12% from a year earlier.

Milk Production Reaches Record

Milk production in North Carolina during 1983 exceeded 1.7 billion pounds for the first time ever, up 1% from 1982. The average number of milk cows at 133,000 head was up 2% from the previous year while milk output per cow was down slightly at 12,865 pounds.

Cash receipts from sales of milk and cream was also a record high \$245 million, 2% above a year earlier. The total value of milk produced was up 2% to \$253 million. Fluid milk prices rose 1% from 1982 to \$14.80 cwt.

First In Turkeys

North Carolina retained the number one ranking in turkey production during 1983. A record high 28.7 million turkeys were produced in North Carolina during the year, up 6% from the previous year's record high number. Despite receiving 5% lower prices at 39 cents per pound, the 9% increase in meat produced to 519 million pounds caused cash receipts to farmers to rise to a record high \$203 million, 3% above 1982.

Egg Production Stable

The number of eggs produced in North Carolina during 1983 at 3.1 million was practically unchanged from the previous year. The average number of layers on hand was 13.1 million, up slightly from 1982. Egg production per layer at 240 was one egg less than the 1982 average.

Cash receipts from sales during 1983 at \$171 million was down 1% from the previous year. The average price per dozen was 65.4 cents also down 1% from 1982. The State retained its number 8 national ranking in cash receipts from eggs.

Cattle Marketings Drop

Cash receipts from cattle and calves in the State totaled \$107 million, off 25% from 1982. Fewer cattle marketed and average prices of \$44.70 cwt. for cattle and \$55.20 cwt. for calves caused the drop. The value of home consumption of cattle and calves decreased 6% in 1983 to \$12.6 million.

The Tar Heel inventory of cattle and calves as of January 1, 1984 was 1,120,000 head, up 2% from January 1, 1983. Calf marketings decreased 6% to 161,000 head while the number of cattle marketed dropped 27% to 209,000 head. Calf births at 460,000 head was unchanged from 1982.

Sheep Inventory Nears Record Low

The number of sheep and lambs in North Carolina at 7,100 head as of January 1, 1984 was down 7% from a year earlier and only 100 head above 1979's all time low. The lamb crop was 5,400 head, 4% below the previous year.

Marketings of sheep and lamb meat was 2% above 1982, but prices received were lower resulting in an 8% decrease in cash receipts to \$122,000.

MILK COWS: Number on farms, January 1, 1984



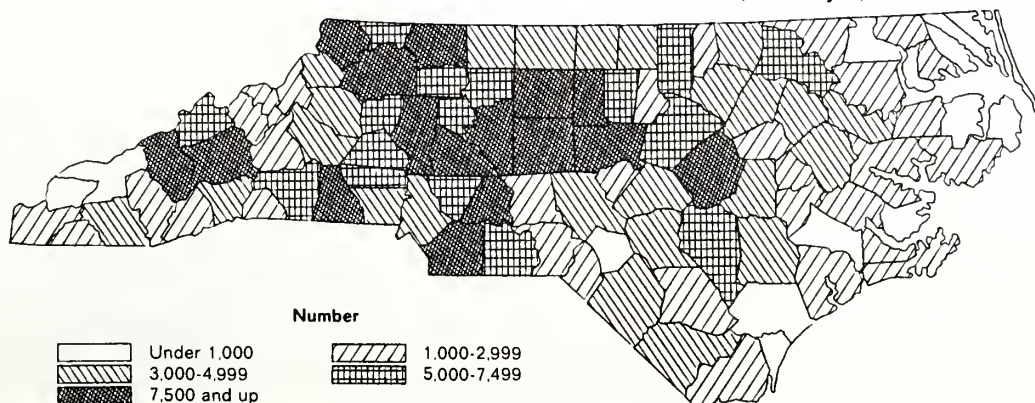

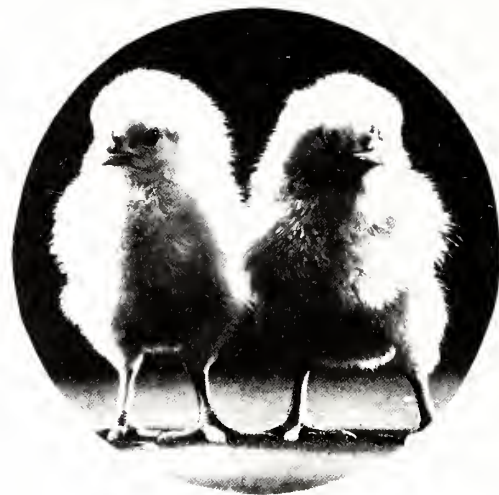
