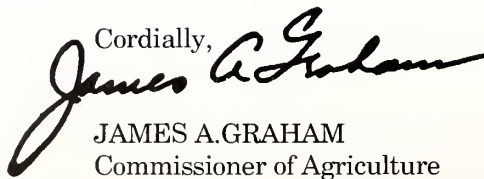

STATISTICAL REPORTS PROGRAM

NORTH CAROLINA AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS brings together the current and historic statistics concerning agriculture in the State. Where possible, types of information most often requested by farmers, the general public, and workers in government agencies are included.

Reporting of crop and livestock statistics is a service rendered to farmers and others in the State by the National Agricultural Statistics Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the North Carolina Department of Agriculture.

The collection and dissemination of agricultural statistics had its start in 1863. This is one of the oldest activities of the United States Department of Agriculture. It was recognized that there were many advantages of a joint relationship between the State and Federal Governments in the development of agricultural statistics. Thus, in 1919 the N.C. Department of Agriculture entered into a cooperative agreement with the U.S. Department of Agriculture to provide detailed agricultural statistics. The agreement resulted in the creation of the Agricultural Statistics Division of the North Carolina Department of Agriculture.

The North Carolina Agricultural Statistics Division publishes official statistics on crops, livestock, prices, and various other agricultural items. A list of the most important reports and the approximate dates of release is shown in the table below. Those reports marked with an (*) are issued separately. All others are included in the semi-monthly release entitled "Farm Report". There is a nominal charge for these reports, which are available by writing to:

A WET SEASON IN 1992

North Carolina experienced the second wettest year of the past decade. Harvest was slowed by wet field conditions. As a result, production was down for most field crops.

January began warmer than normal with heavy precipitation. Strong winds prompted gale wind warning and flood watches along the coast. An approaching storm system ushered cloud cover and showers on the 9th. A cold front associated with the storm system generated severe thunderstorms on the 10th. Small hail was reported at Raleigh-Durham. A vigorous cold front on the 24th ushered in strong northerly winds and cold air.

February 6th and 7th began with strong winds that produced flooding and overwash of coastal roads along the Outer Banks. A period of unsettled weather was experienced from the 11th-14th which was primarily caused by a series of low pressure circulations that produced scattered showers and thunderstorms.

March brought above and below average precipitation without any particular pattern. A wedge of cool air moved along the eastern side of the Appalachian on the 4th, bringing cooler readings. Severe storms on the 7th brought hail and a tornado. A cold front on the 9th and 10th brought severe thunderstorms. A low pressure area and associated cold front brought numerous severe thunderstorms on the 19th. High winds also accompanied the storms, causing numerous trees to be blown over. Cold air moved in on the 20th, inducing light sleet and snowfall.

April recorded more than one inch below normal rainfall in various sections of the state. Wilmington recorded 31°F on the 3rd, breaking the previous record of 32°F in 1907. A fast moving low pressure area and associated cold front on the 4th, generated strong winds. Raleigh recorded 29°F temperature, breaking the earlier record of 31°F in 1972. An approaching low pressure area spawned heavy thunderstorms on the 16th. Pea-size to marble-size hail was reported at Hickory and Burlington.

May listed the 3rd coldest temperature reading on record for the month. A cold front on the 4th-5th generated showers and thunderstorms. On the 6th-9th incredible snow fall occurred in the mountains with a final total of 24 to 60 inches of snow on the ground. Another cold front on the 18th-19th brought heavy rain and severe weather. High winds were reported with dime-size hail in the eastern part of the state.

June brought severe thunderstorms on the 4th producing tornadoes near Shelby and Charlotte. On the 20th-22nd golf-ball size hail fell near Carthage and Spiveys Corner. An approaching cold front brought widespread showers on the 26th. Fort Bragg recorded 4.15 inches of rain while Rocky Mount logged 2.21 inches of rain and golf-ball size hail.

July became entrenched with a major heat wave from the 9th through 16th, as a large high pressure area pumped in hot dry air. Heat index values soared into the 105°F-115°F range across various parts of the state. Weak, subtropical high pressure built from the 24th through the 26th bringing high winds to part of the state.

August 11th-16th brought unsettled weather. Heavy rains fell during the first half of this period, with Raleigh receiving 3.50 inches of rain on the 12th. A tornado touched down near Elizabeth City on the 15th. A cold front entered the state on the 19th, reenforcing the rainy conditions. Flooding occurred in the eastern part of the state.

September began with low-level moisture and a cold front which moved in, stalled and brought dense fog and rainy weather. Warm, moist conditions influenced the state on the 22nd. High temperatures were in the upper 80s or low 90s at most locations. Tropical storm Danielle developed off the coast, about 150 miles southeast of Cape Hatteras.

October came in with high pressure which produced clear skies and cool temperatures. Asheville dipped to 37°F on the first, breaking the record of 39°F in 1967. Dreary conditions prevailed on the 5th, as winds of 25-35 mph pelted the coast, producing waves of 15 feet at Duck Coe Pier. A large area of high pressure influenced the state from the 19th-21st, bringing clear skies and cold temperatures.

November 9th-11th began with an intense low pressure which brought tornadoes, heavy rain and blizzard conditions. On the 25th another cold front brought rain and snow to the higher elevations of the state. Up to 2 inches of snow fell in Watauga county.

December 4th-6th a second cold front moved across the state. A tornado touched down at Fort Bragg, Dunn and Goldsboro. On the 23rd Wilmington recorded a high of 81°F, tying the record set in 1900.

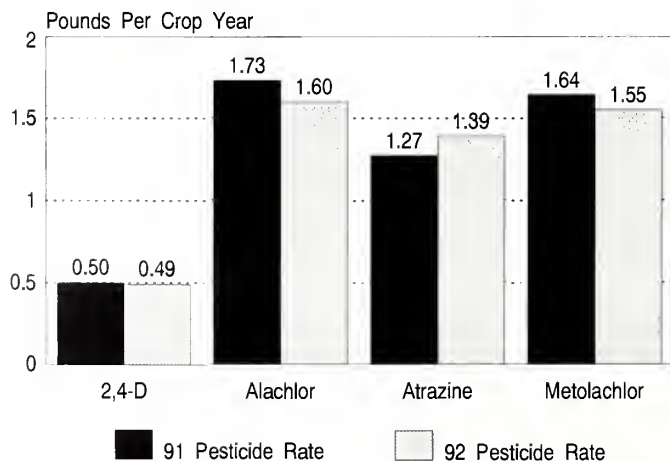

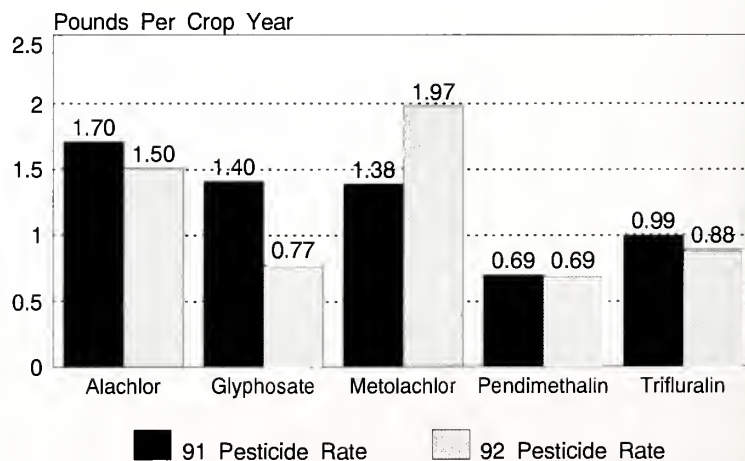
Corn Pesticide Rates

Comparison of 1991 and 1992



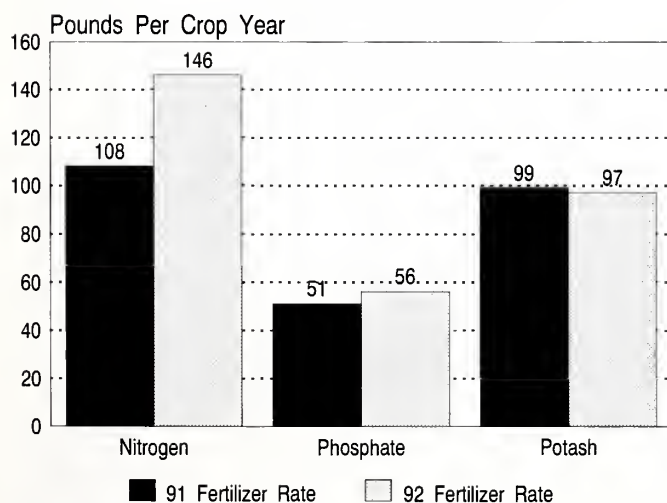

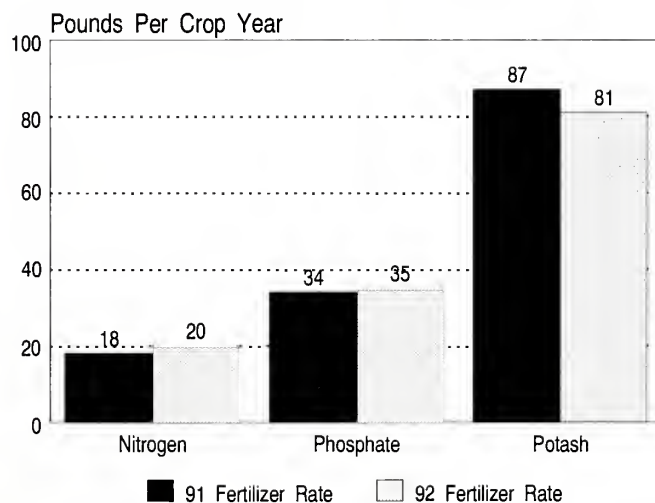
Corn Fertilizer Rates

Restricted Use Pesticides

The National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) conducted surveys in 1990 and 1991 to obtain on-farm usage of all pesticides, both restricted and general on field crops, vegetables, and fruits and nuts. Growers were personally interviewed to obtain information on chemical applications. All chemical applications were collected on a crop year basis.

1992 North Carolina Crops Summary

Flue-Cured Tobacco Production Down 4%

Flue-cured tobacco production in North Carolina totaled 591.6 million pounds in 1992, 4% less than 1991. The decline in production is attributed to a decrease in yield and acreage. Growers harvested 261 thousand acres, 5,000 less than 1991. Yield per acre averaged 2,267 pounds, 51 pounds below last year.

Value of the flue-cured crop totaled \$1.03 billion, \$41 million less than the previous crop and is the third consecutive year that the value has exceeded \$1 billion. Farmers received an average price of \$173.50 per cwt., \$0.50 above last year.

Burley Tobacco Production Up 2%

Burley tobacco production in the State for 1992 at 18.3 million pounds, was up 2% from a year earlier. There were 9,200 acres harvested last year, up 2% from 1991. Growers averaged 1,990 pounds per acre, down 10 pounds per acre from last year's yield.

The 1992 crop was valued at \$32.2 million, up slightly from the previous year's value of \$31.9 million. The average market price received was \$175.90 per cwt. compared with \$177.20 for sales from 1991.

Peanut Production Down 12%

Peanut farmers harvested 407 million pounds in 1992, down 12% from the previous year. Yield per acre averaged 2,660 pounds per acre on 153,000 acres compared to 2,850 per acre on 162,000 acres for 1991.

Value of production totaled \$126 million, down slightly from the 1991 value of \$127 million. The average market price for 1992 was 31.0 cents per pound, up 3.60 cents from 1991.

Corn Production Highest Since 1985

The State's production of corn for grain in 1992 totaled 98.8 million bushels, 16% above the 1991 production of 85.5 million bushels and the highest since 1985 when 128.4 million bushels were produced. Tar Heel farmers harvested 1.04 million acres of corn last year. This was 90,000 more acres than were harvested in 1991. Average yield, at 95 bushels per acre, increased 5 bushels from 1991.

The value of the crop totaled \$217 million, down 3% from a year earlier. The average price of \$2.20 per bushel was \$0.43 below the previous year's price of \$2.63.

Sweetpotato Production Up 4%

Sweetpotato production in 1992 totaled 4.20 million cwt., 4% above the 1991 crop of 4.05 million. Area harvested, at 35,000 acres is 5,000 more than a year earlier. Yield per acre averaged 120 cwt., down 15 cwt. from 1991.

Although prices were down, the value of the sweetpotato crop was \$40.5 million, unchanged from the 1991 crop. Prices at \$9.65 per cwt. were down \$0.35 per cwt. from 1991.

Soybean Yield Down From Record High

North Carolina's 1992 soybean yield was 27.0 bushels per acre, down 2.5 bushels per acre from the record 29.5 bushels per acre set last year. Overall production for the State was 36.5 million bushels, down 6% from 1991. Acres harvested, at 1.35 million acres, were 3% more than 1991.

The value of production was placed at \$196.8 million, 8% less than the 1991 value of \$214.9 million. The average market price for the year was \$5.40 per bushel compared with \$5.56 a year earlier.

Cotton Production Down 27%

The State's cotton growers produced 468,000 bales in 1992, 27% less than a year earlier. Acreage harvested was 377,000 acres, 18% below 1991. The average yield at 596 pounds per acre dropped 76 pounds below the 1991 average.

Value of cotton lint was \$129 million for 1992, 29% below the record value of \$182 million set last year. Price per pound averaged 57.4 cents compared with 59.3 cents the previous season.

The value of cottonseed was up from \$12.1 million in 1991 to \$15.7 million this year. The average market price for the year rose from \$53.00 to \$92.00 per ton.

Apple Production Down 8%

The 1992 apple crop in North Carolina totaled 240 million pounds, down 8% from 1991.

The crop's value dropped to \$17.9 million, down 23% from 1991. Price per pound averaged 7.5 cents compared with 8.9 cents in 1991.

Irish Potato Production Up 19%

Irish potato production in the State totaled 3.61 million cwt. in 1992, 19% more than produced a year earlier. Area harvested, at 18,700, was up 2% from 1991. Yield averaged 193 cwt. per acre, 28 cwt. above the previous season.

Value of production, at \$15.8 million, was 31% below 1991 because of low prices. Average price per cwt. was \$4.35, down from 1991's average of \$7.50.

Wheat Production Up 45%

The 1992 wheat crop in North Carolina totaled 27.8 bushels, up 45% from 1991. Area for harvest, at 555,000 acres, was up 16% from a year ago. Yield per acre averaged 50 bushels, up 10 bushels per acre from last year's average.

Value of production totaled \$54.7 million, 19% less than the previous year. The marketing year average price was \$3.25 compared with \$2.85 in 1991.

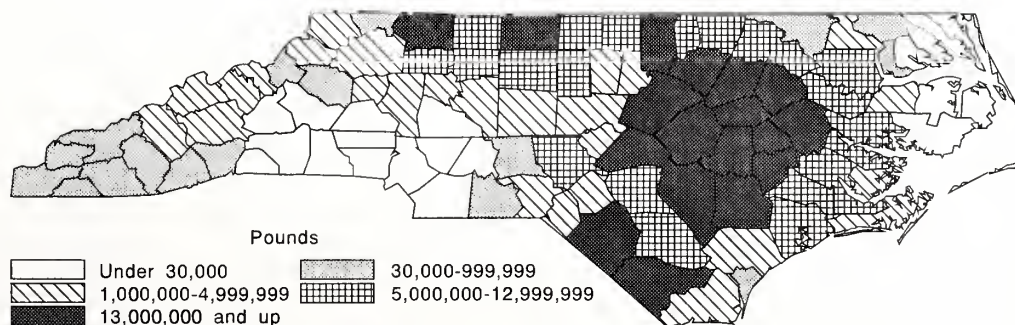

North Carolina Livestock Summary

Livestock, Dairy and Poultry Receipts Up

Cash receipts from all livestock, dairy, and poultry products rose 7% from 1991 to \$2.8 billion in 1992. Gains were recorded for all livestock items except eggs, other poultry, honey and catfish. Cash receipts for all poultry products totaled \$1.6 billion, 6% above 1991. Broilers, at \$856 million, accounted for 31% of the total livestock, dairy, and poultry cash receipts. Hog receipts, at \$730 million, accounted for 26% of the total, and were up 10% from the previous year. Milk cash receipts increased 5% from 1991 to \$215 million. Cash receipts from turkeys sold totaled \$475 million, 10% more than 1991. Eggs produced during 1992 brought \$180 million, 10% below the previous year. Receipts from cattle and calves increased 6% from 1991 to \$188 million in 1992. Aquaculture rose 8% from 1991 to \$6.7 million because of the 15% jump in trout sales.

Broiler Receipts Up

Broiler production in North Carolina reached a record high 2.9 billion pounds in 1992. This is up 6% from last year's record high 2.7 billion pounds. North Carolina held on to its number four ranking in broiler production with a total of 559 million birds produced.

The average price of 30.0 cents per pound for broilers increased 1.0 cent and yielded a gross income of \$856 million for the state, 10% above last year. Income from broilers is the largest contributor to cash receipts for the livestock, dairy and poultry commodity group, making up about 31% of the income for this group.

Hog Production Surges

North Carolina pork production reached a record 1.8 billion pounds in 1992, 23% above last year's record. December 1, 1992 hog and pig inventory of 4.5 million was also a record high, 23% above the previous year. A crop of 7.7 million pigs was produced in the state during the year, another record high and 20% above the 6.4 million in 1991. The average litter size dropped slightly to 8.51 pigs in 1992 compared to 8.57 pigs the previous year.

Hog marketings for the year increased 22% to 7.0 million head. The average price for hogs decreased \$5.50 to \$41.70 per cwt. Despite the lower price, increased production caused a 10% gain in cash receipts to \$730 million for the state. The value of home consumption slipped 18% to 2.9 million.

Turkeys Record High

North Carolina retained the number one ranking in turkey production during 1992 with a record high total of 1,321 million pounds produced, up 13% from the 1,166 million pounds the previous year. The number of turkeys raised increased 7% from 1991 to 62 million. Despite a 1 cent drop in price per pound to 36 cents, the increased production caused cash receipts to rise 10% from 1991 to \$475 million.

Milk Receipts Up

Cash receipts for sales of milk and cream produced in North Carolina increased 5% from 1991 and totaled \$215 million. The value of milk produced was up 5% to \$221 million. Fluid milk prices went up 7% to \$14.60 per hundredweight in 1992.

Milk production decreased slightly in 1992 to 1.51 billion pounds compared with 1.53 billion pounds in 1991. The average number of milk cows at 97 thousand head was 2% less than the average in 1991. Output per cow in 1992, at 15,577 pounds, was up 153 pounds.

Egg Receipts Down

The value of egg production in North Carolina decreased 10% in 1992 to \$180 million. Price per dozen declined 9% to 71.4 cents while the number of eggs produced declined slightly and totaled 3.0 billion. The state ranks eighth nationally in the value of egg production.

Cattle Inventory Up

Inventory of cattle and calves in North Carolina as of January 1, 1993 was 1.05 million head, up 5% from January 1, 1992. Cattle marketings increased 13% to 220 thousand head and calf marketings increased 14% to 194 thousand head. Calf births rose 9% and totaled 490 thousand head.

Cash receipts from cattle and calves in the state totaled \$188 million, up 6% from 1991. A 14% increase in marketings was responsible for the upswing in cash receipts, offsetting a 6% and 10% decrease in cattle and calf prices respectively. The value of home consumption fell slightly in 1992 to \$9.8 million.

Sheep Cash Receipts Up

North Carolina sheep and lamb cash receipts rose 53% in 1992, climbing to \$438 thousand. This large increase was due primarily to an increase in prices. Sheep prices rose \$7.70 per cwt. to \$23.00 and lambs brought \$58.00 per cwt. compared to \$48.20 in 1991. Marketings, at 761 thousand pounds, rose 7% over 1991. Sheep and lamb numbers reached 20,800 head as of January 1, 1993, an increase of 16% above a year ago. The 1992 lamb crop bounced to 16,600 head, an increase of 20%.

Trout Sales Up

Trout growers in North Carolina sold a total of 4.1 million pounds of trout (foodsize, stockers, and fingerlings) valued at \$5.3 million during the 12 month period beginning September 1, 1991 and ending August 31, 1992. Previous year sales totaled 3.7 million pounds valued at \$4.6 million. The number of commercial producers in 1992 was 68, unchanged from 1991.

Catfish Sales Down

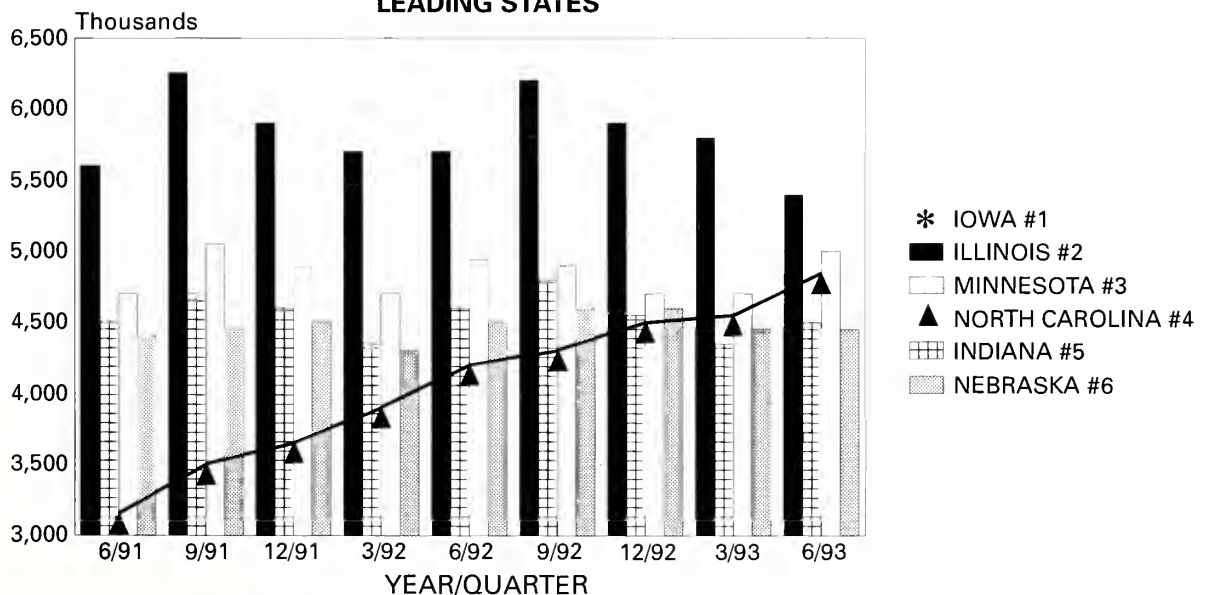
The 45 commercial catfish growers in North Carolina had sales of \$1.4 million in 1992, down 13% from the \$1.6 million the previous year. The water surface area used for catfish production on January 1, 1993 totaled 1,200 acres, 100 acres less than July 1, 1992.

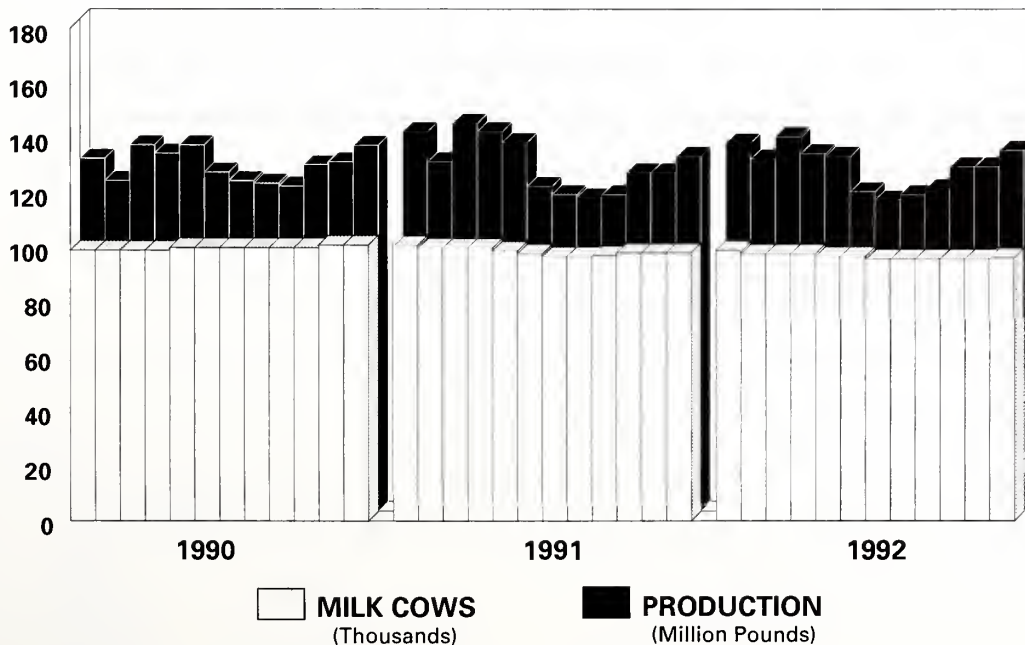

CATFISH

The value of catfish sales in North Carolina totaled \$1.43 million during 1992, down 13% from 1991. North Carolina's 45 commercial catfish producers had sales of 2.13 million pounds compared to 2.26 last year. Sales of foodsize catfish accounted for 92% of total sales, with stockers, fingerlings, and fry accounting for 8%. Eighty five percent of the foodsize fish were sold to processors. On January 1, 1993, water surface acres growing catfish totaled 1,200 compared to 1,300 on July 1, 1992. Inventory of fingerling size and larger fish on hand January 1 totaled 5.7 million fish, down 36% from January 1, 1992.

Catfish growers in the **15 selected States** had sales of \$316 million during 1992. These sales were up 11% from the 1991 total sales of \$285 million. Sales of stockers totaled \$5.13 million, up 40% from the \$3.66 million in sales during 1991. Sales of fingerlings and fry totaled \$9.83 million, down 36% from the \$15.3 million in sales during 1991. Sales of all foodsize fish totaled \$300 million, up 14% from last year's total of \$264 million. Direct sales to processors accounted for 93% of the total sales of foodsize fish. The total number of operations on January 1, 1993, in the 15 selected States was 1,527, down 12% from the July 1, 1992, total of 1,729.

TROUT

North Carolina's 68 commercial trout producers had sales of 4.06 million pounds valued at \$5.28 million for the period September 1, 1991 — August 31, 1992. This compares with \$4.6 million the previous year. Sales of foodsize trout accounted for 96% of total sales, with stockers and fingerlings accounting for 4%. Total losses of trout for the year totaled 186 thousand pounds.

Trout growers in **15 selected States** had a total value of fish and egg sales of \$67.0 million during the 12-month period. This was a decrease of 4% from the \$70.0 million in sales during the same period a year earlier. Growers sold a total of 59.8 million pounds of trout valued at \$61.2 million this year. Foodsize trout sales accounted for 94% of the total pounds sold. In addition, 453 million trout eggs were sold, valued at \$5.83 million, up 47% from the previous year.

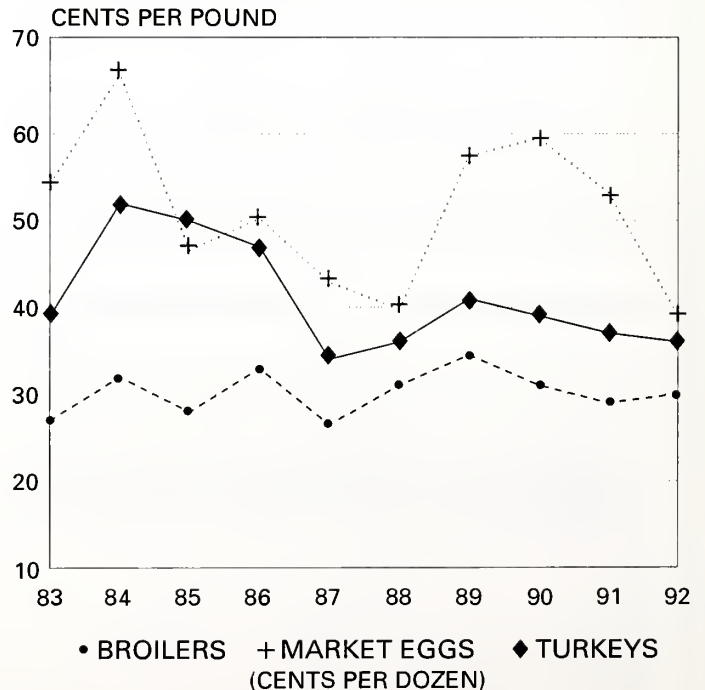

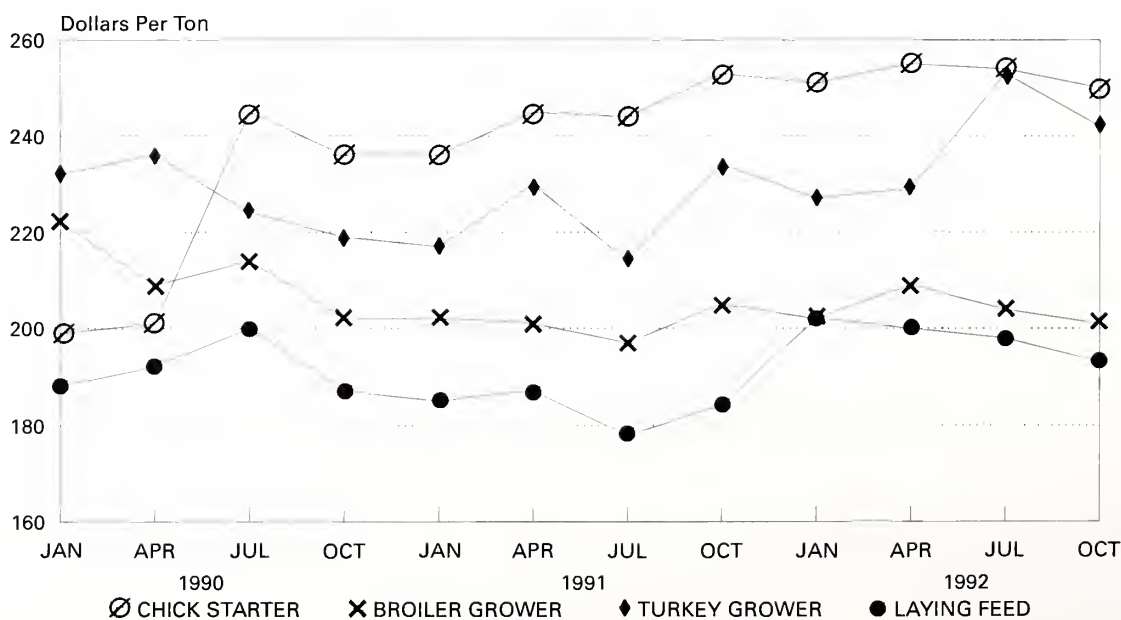

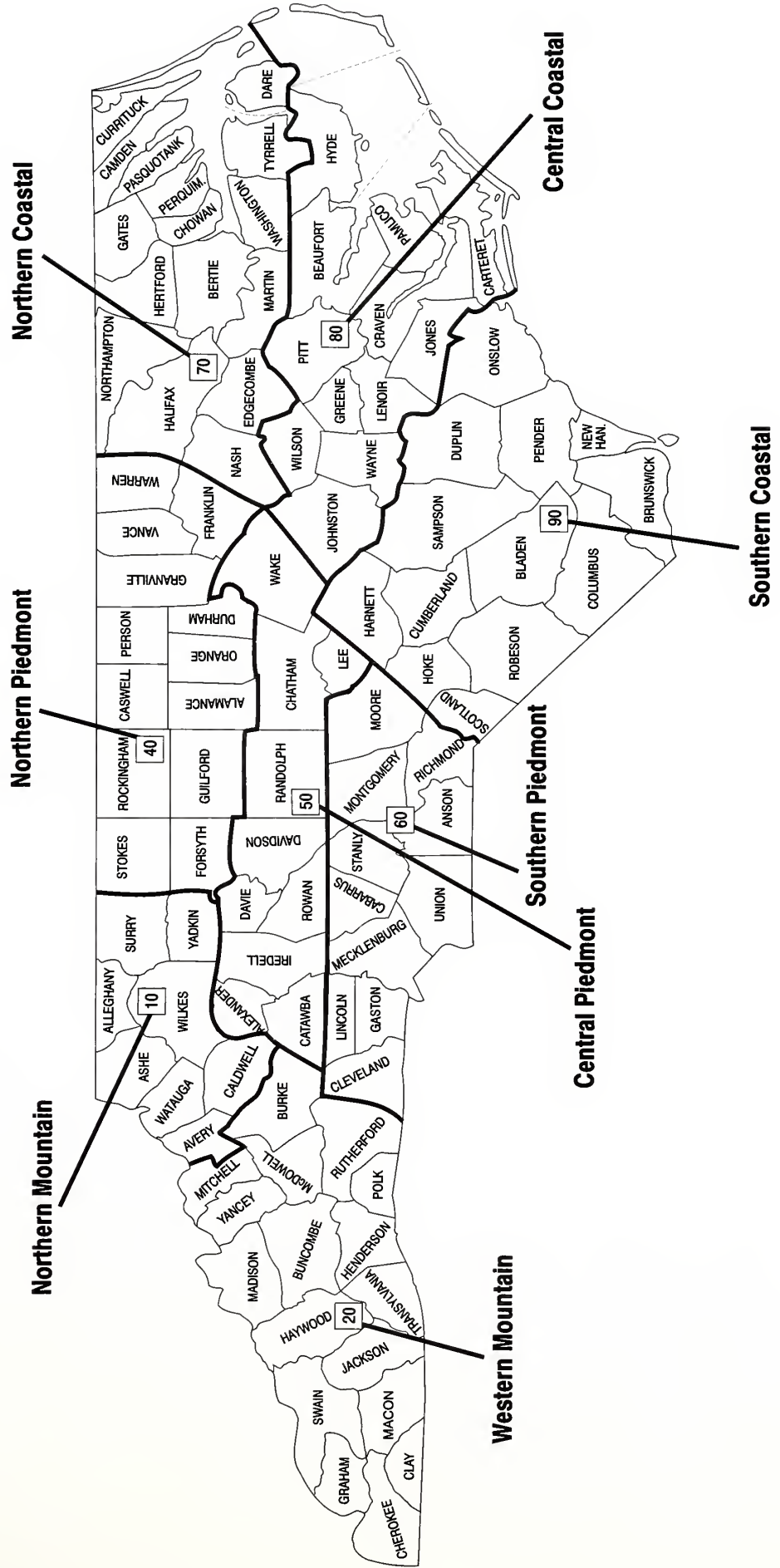
