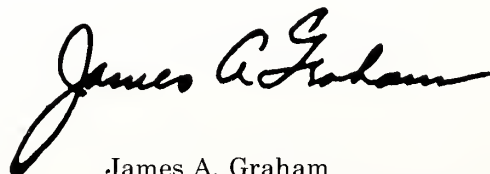

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About The Cover

North Carolina's greenhouse and nursery industry has grown dramatically in recent years, playing an important role in the state's diverse agricultural structure. Over the last ten years the economic contribution of the greenhouse and nursery industry has increased over six fold as North Carolina has become a staging area to grow and distribute plants to East Coast markets. In 1995, North Carolina greenhouse and nursery cash receipts were estimated at \$858 million, ranking fourth in the state behind hogs, broilers, and tobacco. Along with new nurseries relocating and expanding into North Carolina, there are many that have grown from humble beginnings to dynamic enterprises. One such success is McLamb Nursery featured on this year's front cover.

From its beginning on a half acre site just south of McGee's Crossroads in Johnston County, McLamb Nursery, founded by Thurman McLamb in 1966, has grown to a 700 acre wholesale nursery operation employing 40 people. McLamb Nursery began primarily as a landscaping business growing a few plants in containers to support the business. Ten years later, the McLamb's purchased land and began growing field stock. As the nursery grew they became too busy for retail sales and began selling exclusively to wholesale clients. Eventually, as the nursery continued to grow, they phased out of the landscape business. Today, McLamb Nursery propagates 45-50% of their container plants as well as purchasing plants from other nurseries. Seedlings are then container and field grown two to three years until ready for sale. McLamb Nursery serves North Carolina along with clients in six other states on the East Coast including neighboring Virginia, South Carolina and as far north as Connecticut. They deliver plants using two tractor trailer trucks, two open bed trucks, and two shelved box trucks used for container plants. The McLamb's use a variety of equipment and agricultural innovations in order to maintain their nursery operation.

McLamb Nursery is affiliated with the Johnston County Nurserymen's Association, the North Carolina Association of Nurserymen, and the American Association of Nurserymen. Each of these affiliations provide insight into the industry and the growth taking place each year. McLamb Nursery continues to be a family operated business including Thurman McLamb's wife, Marie, and their daughter Annette Hood who supervise the nursery's office. Son-in-law, Charles Hood is the nursery's General Manager. The McLamb's son, James has recently returned from teaching agriculture in Durham county to join the family business while working on his doctorate degree in agriculture at North Carolina State University. Even the McLamb's one year old granddaughter, Hannah Hood enjoys helping out at the office. The nursery industry is an important part of North Carolina agribusiness that the McLamb's are proud to have been a part of for the last thirty years and hope to continue to grow with in the future.

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STATISTICAL REPORTS PROGRAM

NORTH CAROLINA AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS brings together the current and historic statistics concerning agriculture in the State. Where possible, information most often requested by farmers, the general public, and workers in government agencies are included.

Reporting of crop and livestock statistics is a service rendered to farmers and others in the State by the National Agricultural Statistics Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the North Carolina Department of Agriculture.

The collection and dissemination of agricultural statistics had its start in 1863. This is one of the oldest activities of the United States Department of Agriculture. It was recognized that there were many advantages of a joint relationship between the State and Federal Governments in the development of agricultural statistics. Thus, in 1919 the N.C. Department of Agriculture entered into a cooperative agreement with the U.S. Department of Agriculture to provide detailed agricultural statistics. The agreement resulted in the creation of the Agricultural Statistics Division of the North Carolina Department of Agriculture.

The North Carolina Agricultural Statistics Division publishes official statistics on crops, livestock, prices, and various other agricultural items. A list of the most important reports and the approximate dates of release is shown in the table below. The reports marked with an (*) are issued separately. All others are included in the semi-monthly release entitled "Farm Report". The reports are free for respondents providing information used to compile the reports. NORTH CAROLINA 1995 ANNUAL WEATHER AND CLIMATE SUMMARY

On the 6th of January, the State had severe weather due to thunderstorms. Two tornados touched down in the State. A cold front produced freezing rain in parts of the north-central area of the State.

Clouds and precipitation spread into the State on February 9th, ahead of a warm front. The warm front stalled and produced heavy rain on the 10th-11th as a series of low pressure centers traveled eastward along the front. The series of low pressure centers caused periods of heavy rain through the 17th. A cold front was pushed into the State on the 26th and stalled on the 27th.

A ridge of high pressure on the 3rd of March spread light rain throughout the State. On the 11th another high pressure center entered the State and moved offshore on the 13th. A cold front pushed into the State on the 23rd, resulting in more light rain.

Mostly light rain was reported over the eastern part of the State on the 2nd of April. On the 19th several high temperature records were tied or broken. Large hail was reported mainly on the eastern parts of the State on the 24th.

On the 2nd of May moderate to heavy rain fell over parts of the State. A high pressure center crossed the eastern part of the State and moved out to sea on the 4th. Severe weather was triggered across the State between the 14th and 16th. Scattered showers and thunderstorms brought generally light rain to parts of the State on the 30th.

A weak warm front dissipated over the State on the 1st of June. A frontal system pushed into the State on the 9th and 10th causing an increase in showers and thunderstorms. A front and low pressure trough increased thunderstorm coverage on the 28th and 29th.

On the 1st of July a cold front stalled across the southeastern part of the State. A low pressure trough developed over the northeastern part of the State on the 11th. A cold front stretched across the eastern part of the State late on the 19th. On the 22nd, low pressure covered the State.

A cold front pushed through the State on August 7th. Hurricane Felix threatened the coast on the 16th, but the storm stopped moving toward the west when it was about 140 miles east of Cape Hatteras. A cold front traveled into the State on the 22nd and stalled. A low pressure system divided into two centers off the coast on the 29th. The southernmost low traveled toward the southwest.

Low pressure troughs covered portions of the State causing scattered showers and thunderstorms on the 1st of September. A weak cold front was propelled southward to the State by a strong high pressure system on the 15th. On the 18th, the advancing cold front dissipated.

On the 6th of October a slow-moving cold front, which was a remnant of tropical storm Opal, stalled off the State's coast. A low pressure trough continued to produce rain on the 12th. A high pressure center on the 22nd brought sunny skies and mild temperatures. As a high center approached the coast on the 30th, moisture began to invade the region.

High temperatures reached the 40s in the western part of the State on the 3rd of November. On the 5th, conditions were very cold with lows ranging from 20s and 30s. A very active squall line produced some severe thunderstorms and a few tornadoes on the 7th. Most damage was from high winds. Clouds and rain spread around the State on the 23rd, with rain ending on the 25th.

On December 1st, a high pressure system centered over the State. An associated dry cold front dipped southward on the 2nd and dissipated on the 3rd. On the morning of the 30th, a surface trough developed off the coast and rain was reported.

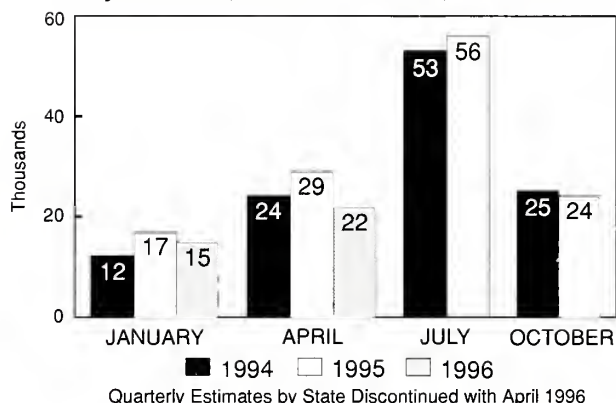

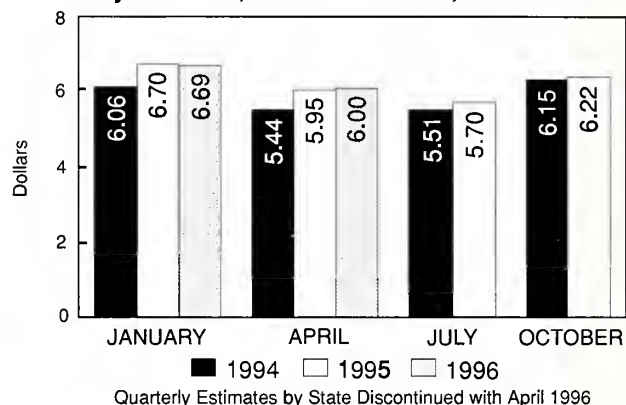

1995 North Carolina Crops Summary

Tobacco Yields Lowest Since 1979

North Carolina **flue-cured** tobacco averaged 1,874 pounds per acre in 1995, the lowest yield since 1979 when the average was 1,857 pounds per acre. Total production, at 474 million pounds, dropped 19% from last year as the higher harvested acres were offset by lower yields. The value of the flue-cured crop totaled \$852 million, down 14% from 1994. Farmers received an average price of \$1.797 per pound, up 5% from last year.

Burley tobacco production in the state for 1995, at 10.4 million pounds, was 40% less than a year earlier. Value of the crop is placed at \$19 million compared to \$32 million the previous year.

Cotton Harvested Acres Highest Since 1949

North Carolina's **cotton** crop totaled 798,000 bales in 1995, 4% less than a year earlier. Area harvested totaled 800,000 acres, 65% above 1994 and the highest since 1949. The yield per acre averaged 479 pounds, 341 pounds less than the previous year's average and the lowest since 1983. The value of the crop was \$300 million, 4% more than 1994. The average price was 78.3 cents per pound, compared with 72.7 cents per pound received in 1994. **Cottonseed** production in North Carolina totaled 282,000 tons in 1995, 4% below the previous year. Value of production totaled \$22 million, averaging \$78.00 per ton. This is \$11.00 per ton less than 1994.

Corn Yield A Record High

North Carolina production of **corn** for grain in 1995, totaled 74.9 million bushels, 9% below the 1994 production of 81.9 million bushels. Tar Heel farmers harvested a record low 700,000 acres with a record high average yield of 107 bushels per acre. This compares with 900,000 acres harvested in 1994 and an average yield of 91 bushels per acre. The value of the crop totaled \$251 million, up 24% from the previous year's crop. The average price was \$3.35 per bushel, up 87 cents from 1994.

Soybean Yield Down

North Carolina production of **soybeans** totaled 26.8 million bushels, 36% less than the 1994 production. Harvested area was 1.07 million acres, 21% below the previous year. Yield per acre averaged 25 bushels, 6 bushels below the 1994 average. The value of production is placed at \$177 million, 21% less than the 1994 value of \$224 million. Farmers received an average price of \$6.60 per bushel compared with the 1994 market year average price of \$5.36 per bushel.

Peanut Production Declines

The state's 1995 **peanut** crop totaled 347 million pounds, 29% below the 1994 crop. Growers planted 144,000 acres, 7,000 less acres than a year earlier. Area harvested, at 144,000 acres, was also down 7,000 acres from 1994. Yield per acre averaged 2,410 pounds, 805 pounds less than the previous season. The value of the 1995 crop totaled \$103 million, 23% less than the 1994 crop value. The marketing year average price for 1995 was 29.8 cents per pound.

Wheat Output Declines

Wheat production in North Carolina, at 28.2 million bushels, was down 7% from 1994. The statewide yield of 44 bushels per acre is 5 bushels below the 1994 yield. Total acres harvested, at 640,000, are up 3% from the previous year. The value of the crop totaled \$92.9 million, 2% above a year earlier. Price per bushel averaged \$3.30.

Sweetpotato Value Up

North Carolina **sweetpotato** production in 1995 totaled 480 million pounds, down 9% from last year. The average yield per acre was 150 cwt., down 5 cwt. from a year ago. The crop is valued at \$55.7 million, up 1% from 1994. The average price was 11.6 cents per pound.

Potato Production Steady

The 1995 production of **potatoes** in the state totaled 318 million pounds, virtually unchanged from 1994. Value of production, at \$20.9 million, was 11% below the 1994 crop.

Apple Value Up, Blueberry and Peaches Down

Commercial **apples** utilized in the Tar Heel State in 1995, at 270 million pounds, was up 8% from the previous year's production of 250 million pounds. The crop brought an average price of 8.4 cents per pound, for a total value of \$23 million, 3% above a year ago.

Production of **blueberries** in North Carolina in 1995 was estimated at 13 million pounds. The total value of production for the 1995 crop totaled \$12.1 million, 13% below last year.

In 1995, North Carolina utilized **peach** production totaled 32 million pounds. The crop was valued at \$7.03 million, 2% lower than 1994.

Most Vegetable Production Off

North Carolina production of **processed cucumbers** totaled 144 million pounds, 28% less than the 1994 production. The value of the crop was placed at \$16.6 million. **Fresh market cucumber** production totaled 23 million pounds, up 1% from a year earlier. The value of production totaled \$2.9 million. **All cabbage** production totaled 96.9 million pounds, 3% less than 1994. The value of the crop was placed at \$8.2 million. **Strawberry** farmers produced 19.2 million pounds, up 23% from the previous year. The value of the crop was estimated at \$12.3 million. **Snap beans** harvested for all purposes was estimated at 21.8 million pounds, 12% below last year. Value of production totaled \$6.3 million. **Watermelon** producers harvested 149 million pounds with a value of \$9.1 million. **Tomato** growers produced 21 million pounds, 21% less than 1994. The value of the crop was estimated at \$4.2 million. **Sweet corn** production, at 31.4 million pounds, was 8% less than last year's crop and is valued at \$4.6 million. **Bell pepper** production totaled 16.3 million pounds, down 29% from a year ago. The value of production totaled \$3.7 million.

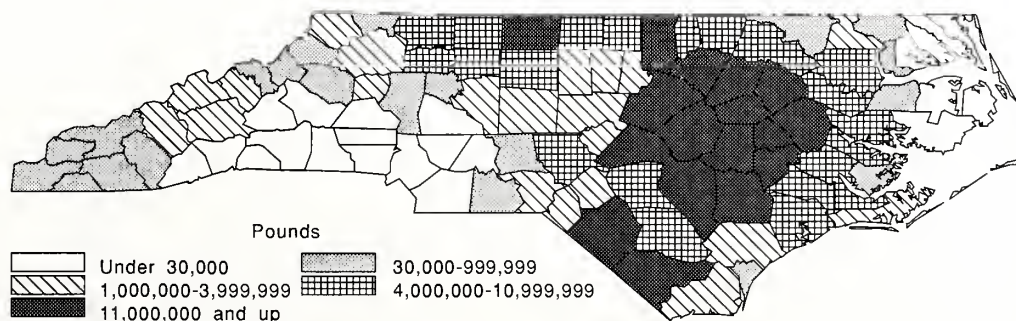

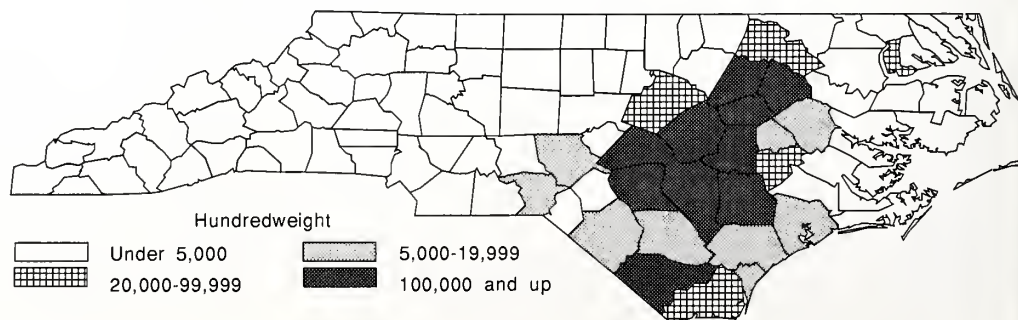

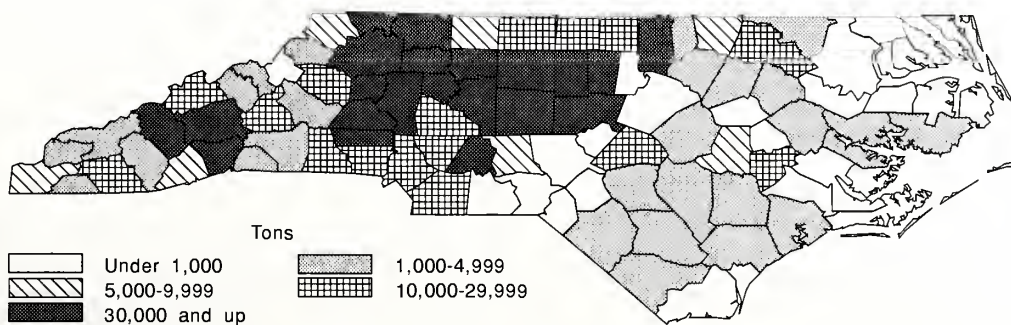

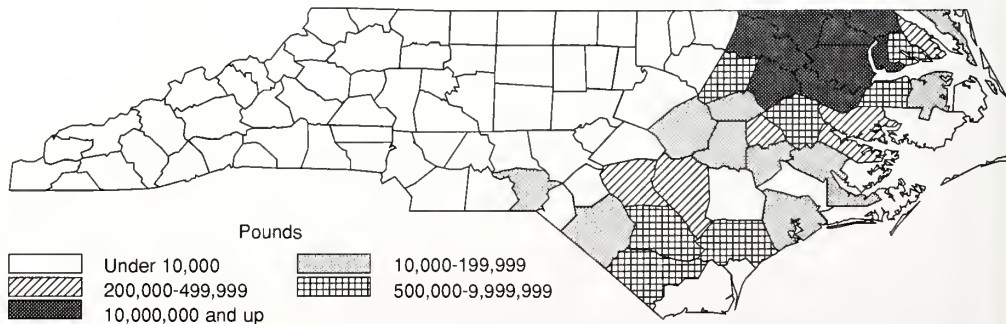

1995 NORTH CAROLINA FLORICULTURE HIGHLIGHTS

North Carolina Potted poinsettias had a wholesale value of \$10.9 million and ranks 7th in the nation in 1995. Potted chrysanthemums is 3rd place in national sales and had a wholesale value of \$5.3 million. Potted hardy/garden mums wholesale sales totaled \$3.3 million and ranks 7th in value. Among all states, North Carolina vegetable type bedding/garden plants ranks 8th in value and had wholesale sales of \$2 million. Easter lilies accounted for \$1.7 million in wholesale sales and ranked 8th in the United States. Geranium flats ranked 8th in national sales and had an equivalent wholesale value of \$1.3 million.

1995 North Carolina Livestock Summary

Cash Receipts Rise

Cash receipts from all livestock, dairy, and poultry products continued the upward trend and totaled \$3.7 billion, up 12% from 1994. Hogs led the charge again this year with a \$292 million or 30% increase, followed by broilers at \$100 million or 9% rise, and turkeys with \$37 million or 7% increase from 1994 receipts. Receipts from eggs was up \$6 million or 3% while trout and catfish sales rose over 40% each for a \$2.6 million increase. Decreased sales were recorded for cattle and calves, dairy products, sheep and lambs, and honey, dropping 9%, 9%, 13%, and 40%, respectively.

Hogs took over as the number one commodity in the state with 18% of total sales, followed closely by broilers at 17%. Both commodities surpassed tobacco for the second time. Tobacco had a 15% share of the sales.

Hogs Exceed \$1 Billion

Hog and pig inventory in North Carolina reached a record high 8.2 million head in December 1995, up 17% from the previous record high 7 million in 1994. Pork production climbed to a new record high, 3.2 billion pounds, exceeding last year's record by 21%. Cash receipts rose above a billion dollars for the first time to \$1.27 billion, up 30% from 1994. Hogs are now the number 1 commodity in the state, followed by broilers and tobacco. A crop of 14.0 million pigs was produced in the state during the year, another record high, and 18% above the 11.8 million in 1994. The average litter size was 8.6 pigs, unchanged from 1994.

Hog marketings for the year increased 25% to 12.3 million head. The average price for hogs increased \$1.20 to \$41.80 per cwt. The value of home consumption was up 3% to \$2.6 million. Of the estimated 6,600 hog operations in the state during 1995, there were approximately 4,200 farrow to finish operations, 1,000 farrow only, and 1,400 finish only.

Moving into 1996, more records are being broken as hog and pig inventory climbed to 8.9 million head by June 1, 1996, 17% above the previous June.

Broilers Reach New Highs

Broiler income reached a record \$1.2 billion in 1995, 9% above last year's record. A 6% increase in production along with a one cent increase in price per pound was responsible for the increase. Production rose to 3.4 billion pounds, and the price received per pound totaled 34 cents. North Carolina held on to its number four national ranking in broiler production with a total of 670 million birds. Broiler income contributes 31% of the livestock, dairy and poultry category and represents 17% of total farm cash receipts for the state.

Turkeys Record Highs Set

North Carolina retained the number one ranking in turkey production during 1995 with a record high total of 1.4 billion pounds, up 4% from the previous year. The number of turkeys raised was 61 million, up 2% from 1994. Turkey price increased 1 cent from 1994 to 41 cents per pound allowing cash receipts to reach a record high \$582 million, 7% above the previous record high set last year.

Egg Sales Increase

The value of egg production in North Carolina increased 3% in 1995 to \$203 million. The increase was caused by a 5% price increase to 77.3 cents per dozen which more than offset the 2% decline in eggs produced at 3.2 billion. Receipts were the largest since 1990 when \$206 million was recorded. The state ranks ninth nationally in the value of egg production.

Milk Receipts Down

Cash receipts from marketing of milk and cream produced in North Carolina totaled \$192 million in 1995, down 9% from 1994. The value of milk produced was also down 9% at \$196 million. Producer returns averaged \$13.80 per hundredweight, down 5% from 1994. Milk production fell 4% in 1995 to 1.42 billion pounds compared with 1.47 billion pounds in 1994. The average number of milk cows on farms, at 87,000 head, was 3,000 less than the average in 1994. Output per cow at 16,287 pounds, was 80 pounds below 1994.

Cattle Record High

Inventory of cattle and calves in North Carolina as of January 1, 1996 was a record high 1.2 million head, up 6% from January 1, 1995 and 25,000 head above 1985's previous record. Cattle marketings increased 11% to 221,000 head, and calf marketings decreased 2% to 178,000 head. Calf births rose 4% to 510,000 head.

Cash receipts from cattle and calves in the state totaled \$152 million, down 9% from 1994. Cattle and calf marketings rose 7% in 1995 but prices per cwt. at \$50.10 and \$63.90 dropped 11% and 21% respectively to account for the large drop in cash receipts. The value of home consumption dropped 6% in 1995 to \$8.9 million.

Trout Sales Up

North Carolina's 56 commercial trout growers sold a total of 5.1 million pounds of trout (foodsize, stockers, and fingerlings) valued at \$6.5 million during the 12 month period of September 1, 1994 and ending August 31, 1995. Poundage and receipts were both up from the previous year. Foodsize value of sales increased 50% to \$5.7 million and averaged \$1.18 per pound, the average price was 9 cents below the same period the previous year, but 8 cents above the national average. Sales to processors accounted for 80% of foodsize sales with another 11% sold to restaurants and retail outlets, 6% going to live haulers, 2% to consumers, and 1% to fee and recreational fishing. Trout losses totaled 299,000 pounds for the year with 78% lost to disease, 12% to floods, and the balance to drought, predators, and theft.

Catfish Sales Increase

The 43 commercial catfish growers in North Carolina had sales of \$2.0 million in 1995, up 42% from the \$1.4 million the previous year. The water surface area used for the 1995 catfish production totaled 1,200 acres, unchanged from the previous year. Eighty nine percent of foodsize catfish sales went to processors with the remainder going direct to consumers, restaurants and food stores, and other producers. The average price received for foodsize catfish in North Carolina was 79 cents per pound, 3 cents above the previous years average, and exactly the same as the national average. North Carolina producers received slightly more per pound for their fish than the producers in the leading producing states of Mississippi, Alabama, and Arkansas.

Sheep Income - Inventory Drops

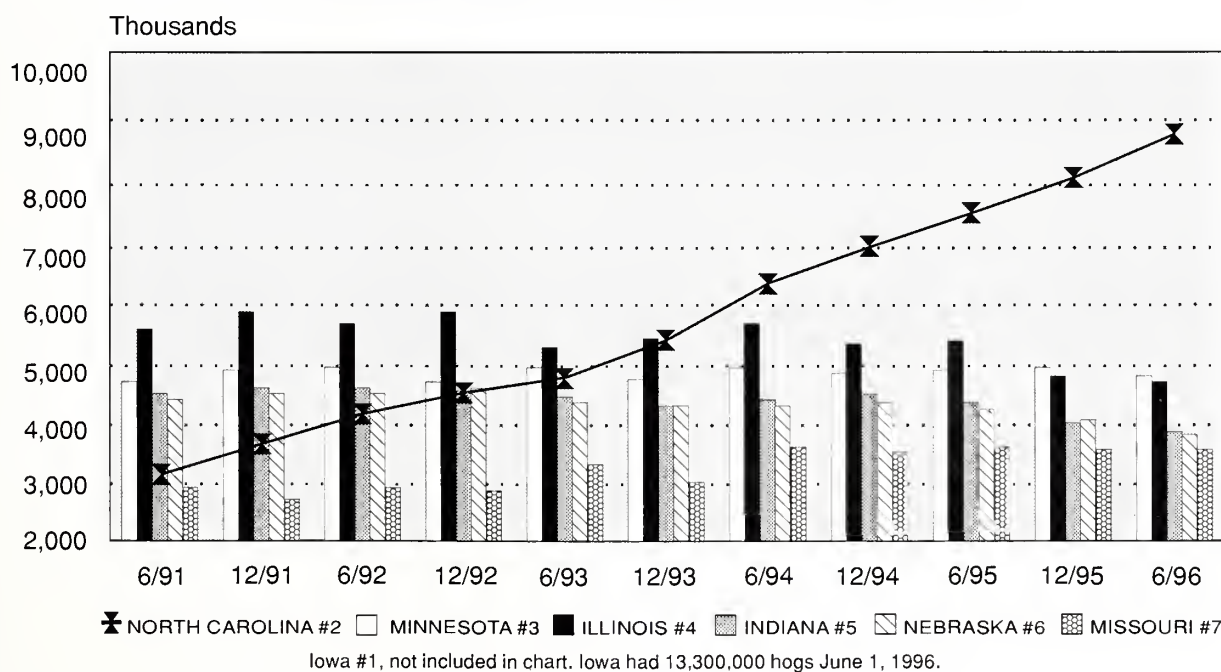
North Carolina sheep and lamb cash receipts dropped 13% in 1995, dipping to \$466,000. The large decrease from 1994 was due to fewer sheep and more lambs marketed, resulting in a 4% decrease in pounds marketed at 868,000 pounds. Sheep and lamb per cwt prices, at \$28.40 and \$68.30 per cwt., were up 5% and 12% respectively.

Sheep and lamb inventory dropped to 13,000 head as of January 1, 1996, a 19% decrease from a year ago. The 1995 lamb crop fell to 10,500 head, down 23%.

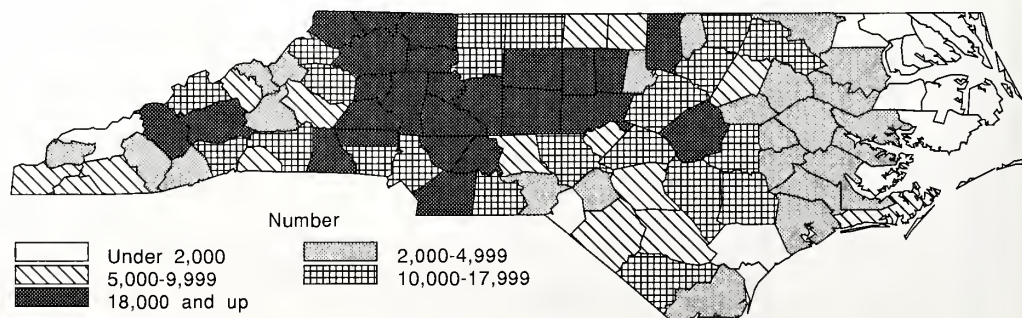

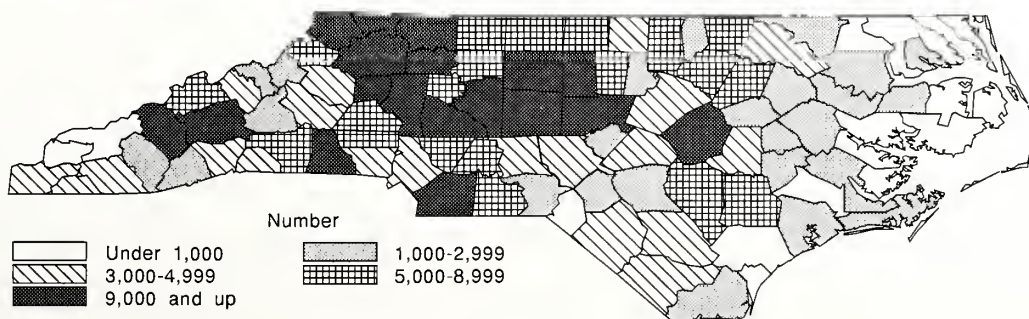

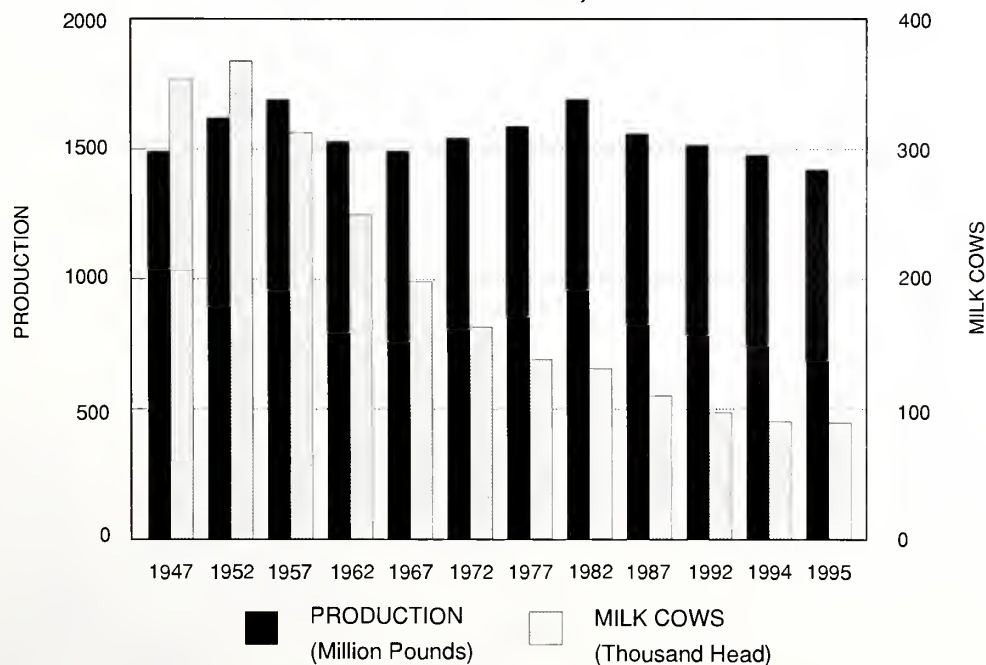

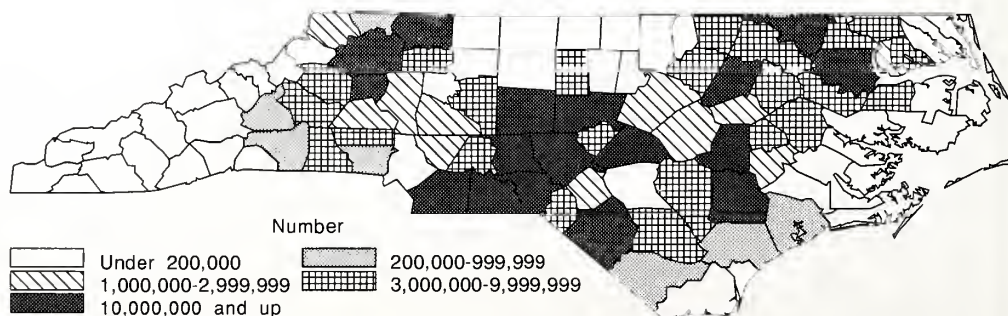

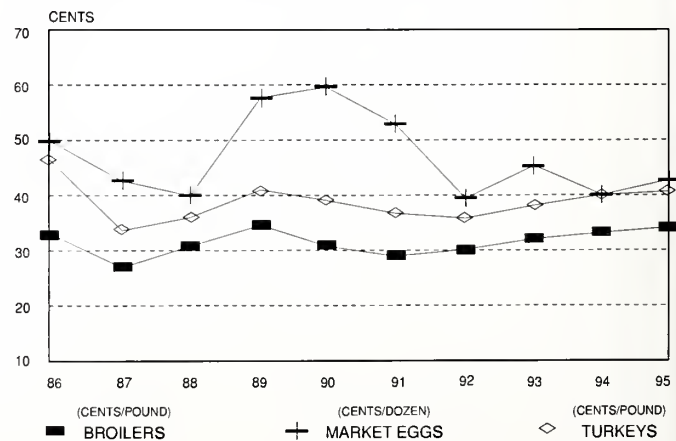
