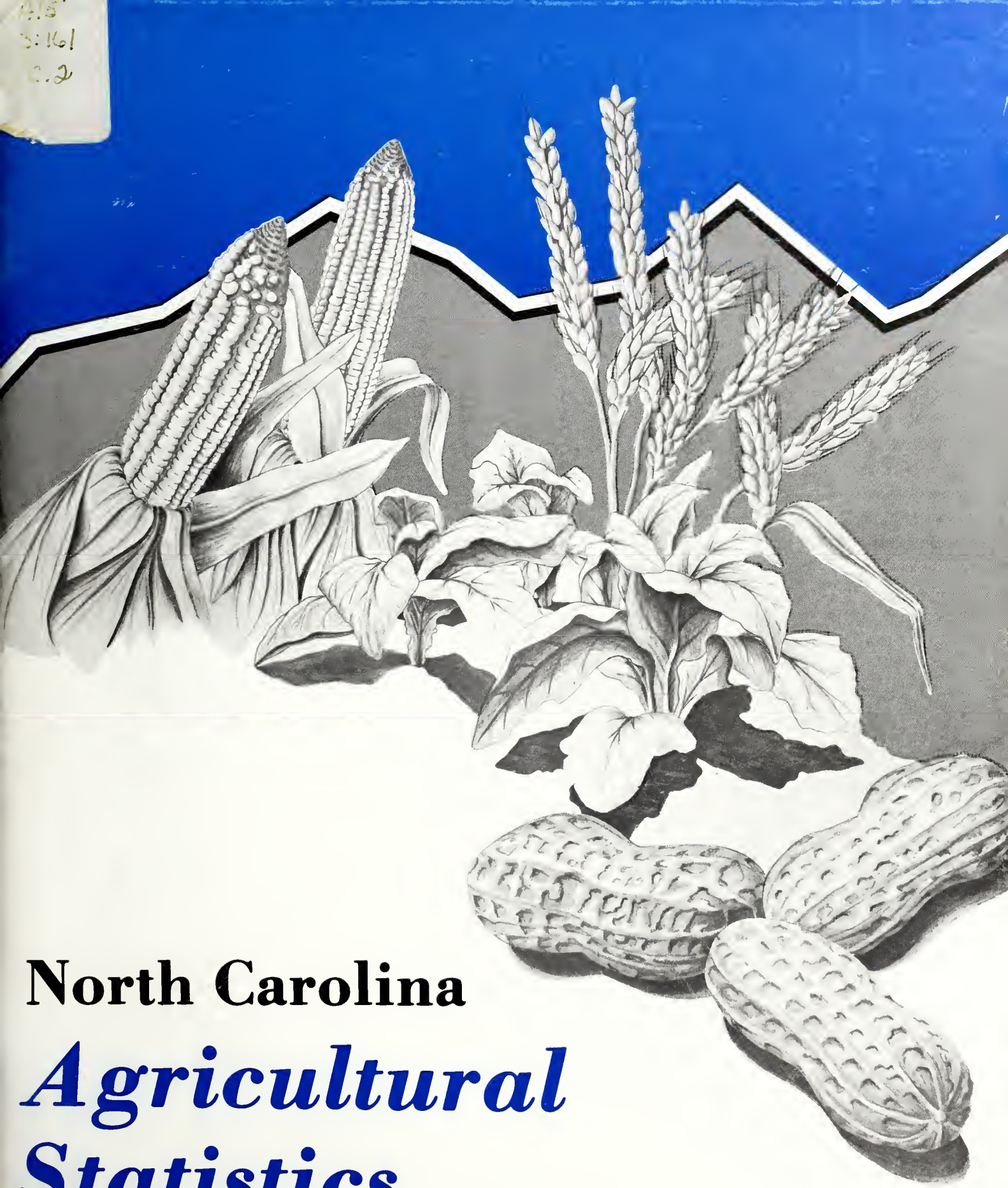

North Carolina is usually blessed with weather that produces an abundance of good crops. There has been a shift in weather pattern in the last couple of years however, and the resulting dry spots have made it tough on many of our farmers.

Feed for livestock in the Piedmont area for 1986 was extremely short as pastures dried up and hay supplies were used early in the season. We, along with our neighbors in the north and west, mounted an extensive hay-lift effort that provided some much-needed feed for our livestock. Even though times were tough, some good came out of the experience as farmers helped other farmers in need. Growth in hogs and poultry (turkeys, broilers, ducks) continued throughout major producing areas in the State.

In 1987, we again experienced problems from weather in some areas. Corn and truck crops were hurt by lack of moisture in eastern areas, and crops in the Piedmont and western sections also lacked rainfall at critical times. On the other hand, we had bumper crops in the southeastern section of the State. The picture shows me examining a corn field in that area with Jim Olson, State Statistician.

When weather conditions are favorable, our farmers can efficiently and effectively produce the best crops in the world. That's why it's heartbreaking to see a farmer or group of farmers who don't get any rain. When they stand in a drought-ridden field, they are looking at their year's work and investment dry up.

The numbers in this publication reflect the drop in production for a number of crops in 1986. Even though we don't like to see declines because of poor weather, we do need to know what the supply situation is so sound marketing and policy decisions can be made. Use the data in this book — they accurately reflect North Carolina agriculture to the fullest.

My travels have taken me to Washington, D.C. on numerous occasions representing North Carolina agricultural interests. By working with Congress, commodity organizations, USDA and the National Association of State Departments of Agriculture, we strive to improve the economic pressures on agriculture. It's a slow process, but I believe that we are making progress.

Best wishes and thanks to you for continuing to provide the numbers that make this publication possible.

Dear Data Users:

North Carolina Agriculture is very diversified and has changed over time. Today, we produce everything from ducks and mountain trout to ramps and grapes for wine. That's what makes agriculture so interesting and challenging. In 1937, fifty years ago, North Carolina harvested 2.3 million acres of corn for grain compared to a million acres less today. In 1887, one hundred years ago, we harvested 1.1 million acres of cotton, over 10 times the amount we have today. Tobacco acreage 100 years ago totaled 90,000 acres but 50 years later, in 1937, it jumped to almost 700 thousand acres and reached its peak of over 800 thousand acres in 1946, just over forty years ago. Today, we're looking at a fourth of that level. On the other hand, soybeans at less than 150 thousand acres harvested for beans 50 years ago compares to 1.4 million today. Commercial broiler production has surpassed over 450 million birds compared to 2.6 million birds 50 years ago. Hog numbers today at 2.3 million are double the 1.1 million in 1937. Demand for our products change and our farmers respond to this change.

All of these data come from a vast data bank compiled by NCDA in cooperation with USDA. Agricultural output for the State is estimated on a timely basis to provide current information for data users. We depend on the voluntary cooperation of reporters and thank you for your assistance. Without this information from knowledgeable people, it would not be possible to provide these unbiased estimates. Measures of change are gauges to our changing agricultural economy and in order to have an orderly marketing process, data are needed by producers, agribusiness and government policy makers. Again, our thanks for your cooperation. Please call on us if we can be of service.

STATISTICAL REPORTS PROGRAM

NORTH CAROLINA AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS brings together the current and historic statistics concerning agriculture in the State. Where possible, types of information most often requested by farmers, the general public, and workers in government agencies are included.

Reporting of crop and livestock statistics is a service rendered to farmers and others in the State by the National Agricultural Statistics Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the North Carolina Department of Agriculture.

The collection and dissemination of agricultural statistics had its start in 1863. This is one of the oldest activities of the United States Department of Agriculture. It was recognized that there were many advantages of a joint relationship between the State and Federal Governments in the development of agricultural statistics. Thus, in 1919 the N. C. Department of Agriculture entered into a cooperative agreement with the U. S. Department of Agriculture to provide detailed agricultural statistics. The agreement resulted in the creation of the Agricultural Statistics Division of the North Carolina Department of Agriculture.

The North Carolina Agricultural Statistics Division publishes official statistics on crops, livestock, prices, and various other agricultural items. A list of the most important reports and the approximate dates of release is shown in the table below. Those reports marked with an (*) are issued separately. All others are included in the semi-monthly release entitled "Farm Report". There is a nominal charge for these reports, which are available by writing to:

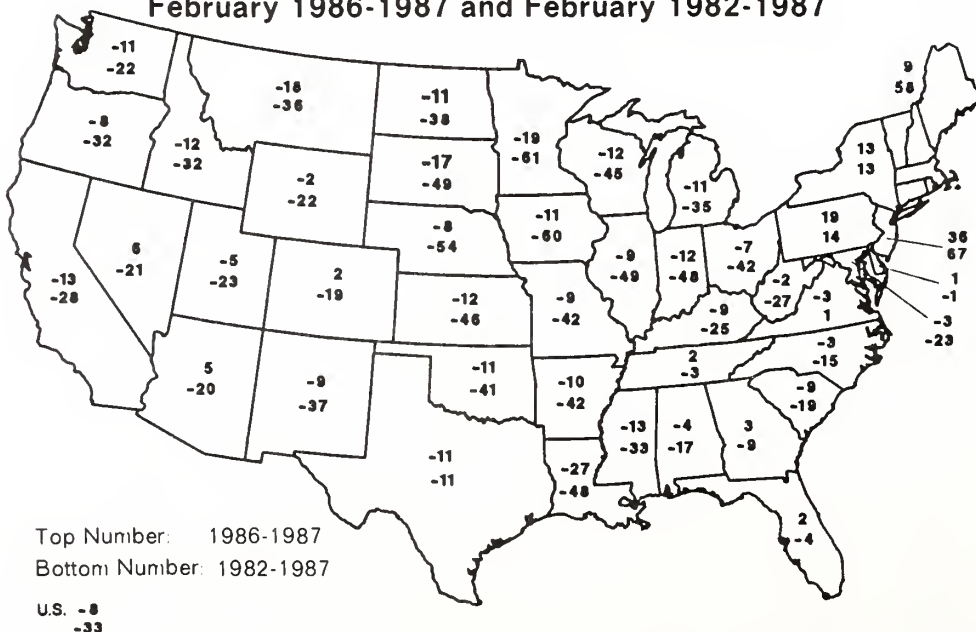

1986 Drought Hits Hard

The biggest news in 1986 can be summed in just one word—DROUGHT. The first seven months of 1986 were the driest in history in North Carolina and the many drought-related losses on the farm attest to its severity.

Water deficits were first noticed during the middle of the winter as several extremely dry months had already been recorded. At the end of March the four month total precipitation (December-March) was already less than half of normal (7.65" vs. 15.62" normally).

This was only the beginning of the bad news. April was the second driest in history for the State as a whole and many locations had less than one half inch of precipitation for the month. Uneven germination, necessitating replanting was a common occurrence on most farms. Compounding the drought problems in the spring were several frosts which did considerable damage to the State's fruit crops. A late frost on May 4 damaged many apple blooms and small apples in Henderson and nearby counties with orchard temperatures as low as 19°. These frosts, combined with hail later in the summer and dry weather throughout the season led to a decline in apple production.

It was during May that the drought became concentrated over the Piedmont and Foothills regions of the state. From December, 1985 to May, 1986 only 50% of the normal amount of precipitation had fallen across the State, and over portions of the Piedmont the percentage dropped below 40%. The drought reached its climax over the Piedmont during the latter part of July and early August.

Weather patterns changed in August allowing tropical moisture to move into the State. Several cold fronts provided enough energy and upward lift to set off thunderstorms, some which were quite strong over the eastern Piedmont. Total August rainfall was above normal in most areas but the driest portions of the Piedmont received the least. The 4 to 7 inches of rain common in most areas did crops little good as it came too late. The exceptions were cotton and soybeans which need rain during this late summer period. Dry weather returned in September and for most of October, allowing most remaining harvest activities to proceed without delay. Temperatures were much above normal as they had been all summer until October 6 when fall weather made a rather dramatic arrival. After that date there were very few extremely warm days.

Rainfall finally got established over the State on a regular basis in November, which carried through for the remainder of the '86-'87 winter. The wet weather had only one bad effect—delaying soybean and cotton harvest. As of November 30, only 44% of the State's soybeans had been harvested compared to a normal of 65%. Due to the rains in August, November and December, 1986 was not the driest year in history in North Carolina, but there were selected areas of the State where it was the driest ever, such as the western Piedmont. The drought was exceptional in that it continued unabated for nearly a year. For the grower, no part of the State escaped the drought entirely.

TOTAL FERTILIZER CONSUMPTION IN NORTH CAROLINA DOWN 17%

Fertilizer consumption in North Carolina during the year ended June 30, 1986 totaled 1,382,276 tons, down 17% from the 1984-85 total. Mixed fertilizer and fertilizer materials were down 20% and 13%, respectively, from last year. Mixed fertilizer accounted for 59% of the total fertilizer consumption and direct application materials accounted for the remaining 41%.

The most widely applied mixed fertilizers were 10-10-10 and 5-10-30, respectively. These two fertilizers accounted for 22% of the total fertilizer mixtures. Nitrogen solutions, muriate of potash, ammonium phosphate and ammonium nitrate were the four most popular fertilizer materials. This group of materials accounted for 84% of the total materials. Nitrogen solutions alone accounted for 64% of the total materials.

Fertilizer consumption represents all commercial fertilizer tonnage sold or shipped for farm and non-farm use as fertilizer. Materials used in the manufacture of registered mixes or for use in other fertilizers are excluded.

Flue-Cured Tobacco Down 20%

The 1986 flue-cured tobacco crop in North Carolina totaled 430.4 million pounds, down 20% from the 1985 crop of 537.9 million pounds. The area harvested in 1986 was 207,000 acres, 14% less than a year earlier and the lowest of record. The yield per acre averaged 2,079 pounds, 144 pounds less than the previous crop.

The value of the flue-cured crop declined to \$659 million from \$922 million in 1985. Farmers received an average of \$1.532 per pound for the 1986 crop, down from \$1.714 in 1985.

Corn Crop Reduced by Drought

The production of corn for grain in North Carolina totaled 93.8 million bushels in 1986. This is 27% less than the 1985 crop primarily because of drought. Both acreage for grain harvest and yield per acre were down sharply from the previous year. Area harvested for grain totaled 1,360,000 acres, down 16% from the 1,625,000 acres harvested in 1985. The yield per acre averaged 69 bushels compared with 79 bushels a year earlier.

The value of the crop totaled \$164 million, down 49% from the \$325 million crop in 1985. The marketing year average price was \$1.75 per bushel compared with \$2.53 per bushel in 1985.

Soybean Production Down Slightly

The State's soybean crop in 1986 totaled 38.4 million bushels, 2% less than the 1985 crop of 39.1 million bushels. The area harvested was 1.60 million acres, 6% less than the previous year. The yield per acre averaged 24 bushels, 1 bushel above the 1985 crop.

The value of production was placed at \$186 million, down 5% from the previous crop. The marketing year average price was \$4.85 per bushel, down 18 cents per bushel from the 1985 average price.

Burley Tobacco Down 23%

The 1986 burley tobacco crop in North Carolina totaled 14.4 million pounds, 23% less than the 1985 crop. The area harvested was 7,600 acres compared with 8,700 harvested in 1985. The yield per acre averaged 1,900 pounds compared with the previous year's average of 2,145 pounds.

The 1986 crop was valued at \$22,555,000, down 23% from the previous crop. The marketing year average price per pound was \$1.562 compared with \$1.568 in 1985.

Peanuts Down 3%

Peanut production in the Tar Heel State totaled 440 million pounds in 1986. This is 3% less than the previous year's crop of 452 million pounds. Area har-

ested was 143,000 acres, 7% less than a year earlier. The yield per acre averaged 3,080 pounds, 145 pounds above the 1985 yield.

The value of the 1986 crop was \$131 million, 7% more than the 1985 crop value. The marketing year price per pound averaged 29.8 cents compared with 27.2 cents in 1985.

Sweet Potato Production Down 15%

The 1986 sweet potato production in North Carolina totaled 5.1 million cwt.. This is 15% less than the 1985 record high production of 6.0 million cwt.. The area harvested at 34,000 acres was down 15% from the 40,000 acres harvested a year earlier. The yield averaged 150 cwt. per acre, same as the previous year.

The value of production at \$58 million is 29% above the previous year. The marketing year average price of \$11.40 per cwt. compares with \$7.50 in 1985 and \$15.00 in 1984.

Apples Reduced By Freeze

The 1986 commercial apple crop in North Carolina, estimated at 120 million pounds, was down sharply from 275 million pounds produced the previous year. The sharp reduction was attributed to a late spring freeze and dry weather during the development period.

Value of the 1986 crop was placed at \$10.2 million, about half the value of the 1985 crop. The average price per pound to growers was 8.5 cents compared with 7.4 cents in 1985.

Peaches Reduced By Freeze

In 1986, North Carolina peach producers harvested 25 million pounds of peaches, up considerably from the previous season's freeze reduced crop of 2 million pounds. The 1986 crop was also cut in about half by a late spring freeze.

Value of production rose to \$3.3 million from \$0.5 million in 1985. The average price per pound to growers was 15.7 cents compared with 25 cents for the small quantity harvested in 1985.

Cotton Production Down 7%

North Carolina cotton growers produced 109,000 bales in 1986, 7% less than the 1985 crop. Area harvested in 1986 totaled 81,000 acres, down 7% from the previous year. The yield of lint per acre averaged 646 pounds, same as a year earlier.

Value of production at \$27.3 million was down 12% from the 1985 crop value. The marketing year average price per pound was 52.1 cents compared with 55.1 cents in 1985.

LIVESTOCK & POULTRY



Livestock and Poultry Receipts Rise

Cash receipts from livestock, dairy, and poultry products totaled \$2.18 billion in 1986 up 11% from 1985. Gains were recorded for all major commodities except milk. All poultry products combined rose 15% and accounted for \$1,298 million while broilers alone amounted to \$669 million or 31% of the total livestock and poultry cash receipts. Receipts from hogs accounted for 20% of the total and, at \$438 million, were up 13% from the previous year. Wholesale milk cash receipts dropped 7% from 1985 to \$231 million. Cash receipts from turkeys sold totaled \$342 million, 15% more than 1985. Eggs produced during 1986 brought in \$220 million, 4% above the previous year. Receipts from cattle and calves rose to \$169 million, up 9% from 1985.

Broiler Production Record High

A 1% increase in the number of broilers produced accounted for a record high 2.03 billion pounds of broilers in 1986. North Carolina held on to its number four ranking in broiler production with a total of 451 million birds produced.

The average price of 33.0 cents per pound for broilers increased 5 cents and yielded a record high gross income of \$669 million for the State, 21% above last year. Income from broilers is the largest contributor to cash receipts for livestock and poultry commodity group making up about 31% of the income for this group.

Hogs Remain #7

North Carolina continues its number seven national ranking in hog production with a December 1, 1986, inventory of 2.36 million head, up slightly from last years inventory. Farrowings were down 2% to 475,000 head in 1986 for an average of 8.09 pigs per litter, continuing the gradual increase in pigs saved per farrowing. A crop of 3,842,000 pigs was produced in the State during the year, 28,000 or 1% less than the preceding year.

Hog marketings at 3,789,000 head increased 1% during 1986. The average price for hogs rose 11% to \$49.80 per cwt. This increase resulted in a 13% increase in cash receipts to \$438 million for the State. The value of home consumption at \$6.0 million was down 5% from a year earlier.

Turkeys #1

North Carolina retained the number one ranking in turkey production during 1986. A record high

39.1 million turkeys were produced in North Carolina during the year, up 23% from the previous year's record high number. The 22% increase in meat production to 727 million pounds, despite a 3 cents drop in price per pound, caused cash receipts to farmers to rise to a record high \$342 million, 15% above 1985.

Milk Production Drops

Milk production in North Carolina during 1986 dropped to 1.7 billion pounds, down 3% from 1985. The average number of milk cows at 121,000 head was down 5% from the previous year while milk output per cow at 14,008 pounds, was up 352 pounds.

Cash receipts from sales of milk and cream dropped 7% from last year and totaled \$231 million. The total value of milk produced was down 6% to \$237. Fluid milk prices dropped 3% from 1985 to \$14.00 cwt.

Egg Receipts Rise

The value of egg production during 1986 at \$220 million was up 4% from 1985. The average price rose to 77.6 cents per dozen. The State ranks sixth nationally in the value of egg production.

Cattle Marketings Advance

Cash receipts from cattle and calves in the State totaled \$169 million, up 9% from 1985. A 13% rise in the number of cattle and calves marketed caused the increase. The value of home consumption of cattle and calves dropped 2% in 1986 to \$12.4 million.

The Tar Heel inventory of cattle and calves as of January 1, 1987 was 950,000 head, down 14% from January 1, 1986. Calf marketings increased 12% to 202,000 head while the number of cattle marketed increased 14% to 334,000 head. Calf births at 450,000 head dropped 10,000 head from 1985.

Sheep Inventory Up

The number of sheep and lambs in North Carolina at 13,000 head as of January 1, 1987 was up 30% from a year earlier. The lamb crop was 9,000 head, 22% above the previous year.

Marketings of sheep and lambs totaled 4,500 head resulting in a 21% increase in cash receipts to \$199,000.

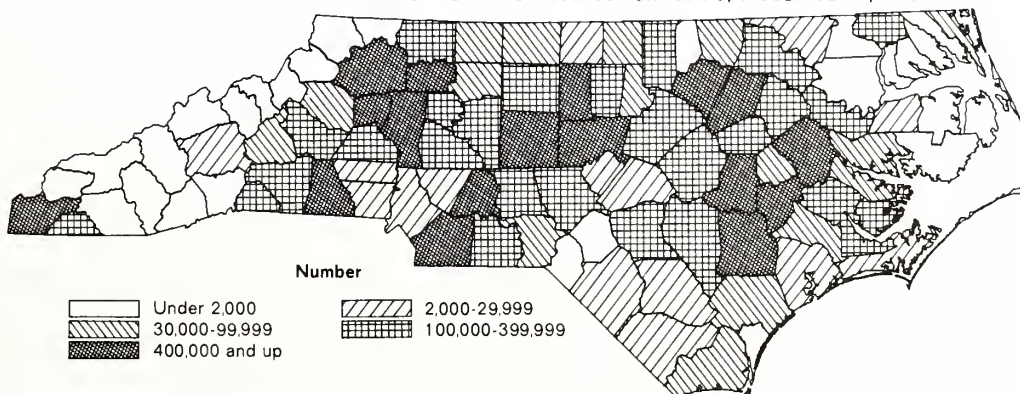

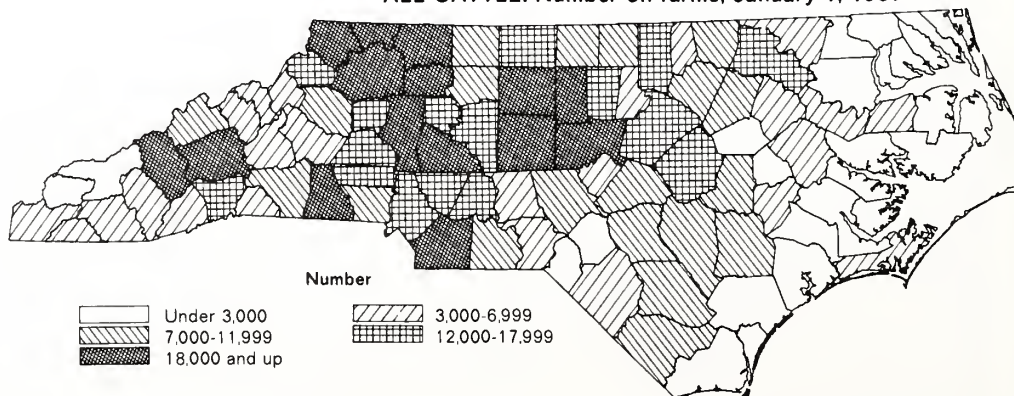

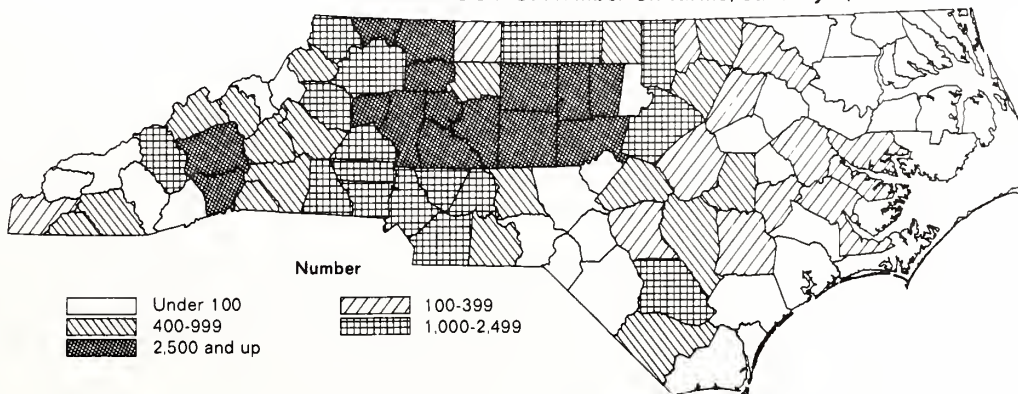

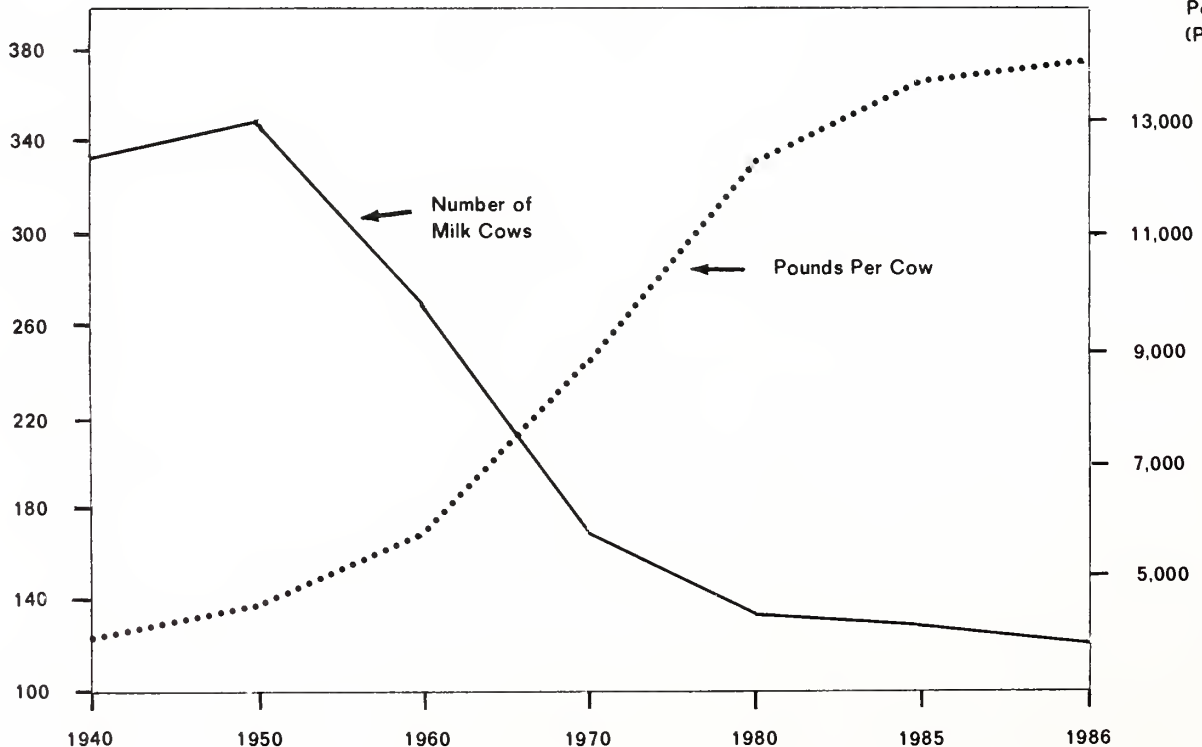
