Got to Be NC Festival to be held May 15-17

The Got to Be NC Festival returns to the N.C. State Fairgrounds with a full lineup of food, entertainment and family fun May 15-17.

"The Got to Be NC Festival continues to get better and better each year," said Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler. "Last year more than 70,000 people attended, and I hope to see even more join us this May as we celebrate the best of North Carolina agriculture."

Lowe's Foods is joining the festival as a title sponsor this year. The North Carolina-based grocery chain will have an expanded presence in the "Homegrown Fare," the festival's popular showcase of local food, wine and beer. Lowe's Foods also will host its "Food Bizarre" tent outside the Expo Building. The tent will have free entertainment and a multi-station food challenge featuring gastronomic mashups

of North Carolina products and carnival favorites.

In addition to food attractions, visitors can learn more about the farmers who grow their food in the expanded Agri-Plaza. Visitors can watch baby chickens hatch, learn techniques for milk-

ing a goat, try their hands at milking a cow and view farm animals on display.

The festival is also a stop on the 2015 Tour D'Coop, Raleigh's tour of backyard chicken coops. Poultry specialists from the N.C. Department of Agriculture and

Consumer Services will offer workshops on starting and managing urban chicken houses.

Traditional favorites such as the Carolina Masonic Pig Jig, the Trans Jam BMX Contest Series and FFA Gator Wars will return to the 2015 festival lineup. There also will be plenty of live music, daily tractor parades, fireworks and a full carnival for the whole family.

The 2015 Got to Be NC Festival presented by Lowe's Foods is a production of the N.C. Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services. Festival hours are Friday from noon to 10 p.m., Saturday from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m., and Sunday from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. Gate admission and parking are free, but certain attractions have fees.

Wayne County comes under quarantine for EAB

Wayne County is the latest to come under quarantine rules restricting the movement of hardwood firewood, ash nursery stock and other ash materials after emerald ash borers were confirmed in a stand of trees on the Cherry Research Farm. Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler signed an emergency quarantine order allowing the expansion.

An employee with the research farm noticed unusual markings on ash trees and contacted an entomologist with the N.C. Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services' Plant Industry Division for confirmation of EAB. Ash trees were planted on about 13 acres in 2000 as part of a research project.

Granville, Person, Vance and Warren counties remain under quarantine from the first detection of emerald ash borer in the state in June 2013. North Carolina was the

20th state in the country to confirm the presence of the destructive pest.

"This discovery comes as our Plant Industry Division prepares to begin placing traps, readying for beetle emergence in April. Staff will be setting out traps statewide looking for signs of this pest in other locations," Troxler said. "If you see the purple, triangle-shaped traps, please do not disturb them. We ask for the public's cooperation with these quarantine rules to restrict the movement any further."

The beetle was first detected in the United States in Michigan in 2002. It is responsible for the death or decline of tens of millions of ash trees across the country.

Under the state quarantine, all hardwood firewood and plants and plant parts of the ash tree—including living, dead, cut or fallen, green lumber, stumps, roots, branches and composted and uncomposted

chips -- cannot be moved outside the county.

The Plant Industry and Research Stations divisions and N.C. Forest Service are working in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service.


Symptoms of emerald ash borer in ash trees include a general decline in the appearance of the tree, such as thinning from the top down and loss of leaves. Clumps of shoots, also known as epicormic sprouts, emerging from the trunk of the tree and increased woodpecker activity are other symptoms. The emerald ash borer is not the only pest that can cause these.

Emerald ash borers overwinter as larvae. The adult beetle is one-fourth to a half-inch long and is slender and metallic green. When the adults emerge from a tree, they leave behind a D-shaped exit hole. The larvae

From the tractor

I recently wrapped up a week long trade mission to China, where we met with business executives and potential buyers.

This mission included four teams, representing North Carolina forestry products, pork, soybeans and tobacco.

I was pleased to be joined by N.C. Commerce Secretary John Skvarla, whose office works to promote North Carolina business abroad. He joined me for several high-level meetings with China Tobacco and WH Group, the world's largest pork producer.

China Tobacco buys a tremendous amount of North Carolina tobacco, for which I am very grateful. In fact, China is the

single largest export market for tobacco. With North Carolina being the top U.S. producer of flue-cured tobacco, this market is significant to our state's agricultural economy.

Last year, the government-owned cigarette company opened an office in Cary – its first in the United States. It previously had opened offices in Brazil and Zimbabwe, countries that compete with the U.S. for tobacco sales.

Having an office here in North Carolina allows the buyer and sellers to have more dialogue

with one another, hopefully ensuring China Tobacco is getting the product it wants and shoring up the business relationship for the grower.

Tobacco production in North Carolina was strong in 2014, which is both good news and bad. Production numbers were up, but that meant more product came to the market, too. Consequently, a number of growers did not have their contracts renewed for 2015. So developing and expanding new (See Trade mission, pg. 2)

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Troxler names new NCDA&CS marketing director

In 1988, he came to work for the department as an ag marketing specialist and was promoted in 1991 to domestic marketing manager. In 1994, he was promoted to assistant director for domestic and international marketing development, a position he has held since.

Sanderson serves on the L.L. Polk Foundation Board, is a past president and member of the Needmore Ruritan Club of Fuquay-Varina and is a member of iLove Baptist Church.

export opportunities for tobacco is important to the long-term health of the industry.

In our meeting with China Tobacco officials, I thanked them for their business and thanked them for opening an office here. I also encouraged them to consider increasing bilateral trade by 10 percent a year, emphasizing that the supply of top-quality tobacco was dependent on there being a reliable demand for it.

Another highlight of our trip was a visit to the China Inspection and Quarantine headquarters in Guangzhou. This inspection site is the largest point of entry for North Carolina agricultural products, and we sought a meeting with directors there to familiarize team members with protocols and procedures for imports.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture operates similar sites in the U.S. to watch for potential harmful pests hitchhiking into the country via shipping containers and other products.

It was interesting to learn more about their entry requirements for agricultural products.

During the trip, we also held a ribbon-cutting ceremony in Shanghai to officially open a joint office that will house trade representatives from both the Commerce Department and our department. A few years ago, we opened an office in Beijing, but decided to move it to Shanghai to share resources with the N.C. Commerce Department. This office will be the main contact for Chinese buyers looking to make business connections in North Carolina, including for agricultural products.

This is my third visit to China, and I have found the people there to be genuinely welcoming and gracious. I would like to say I am starting to pick up the language a little, but I have to admit I am not. I am grateful to have interpreters with us who can speak the language, and it reinforces to me the value in having representatives in China to help our agribusinesses and farms navigate the nuances of international trade.

Dig It! soil exhibit runs May 16-Aug. 16

Be sure to check out the N.C. Museum of Natural Sciences' "Dig It! The Secrets of Soil" exhibit running May 16 through Aug. 16 in Raleigh.

This special 5,000-square-foot traveling exhibit transports visitors to the world beneath their feet through displays, videos and interactive exhibits, and helps celebrate 2015 as the International Year of Soils.

One exciting feature of the exhibit is a display of soils from all 50 states, each with different colors and textures. Each state selected a soil to represent it and provided a sample to be displayed. For North Carolina, Cecil soil was selected. This type, characterized as old, red, forest soils, encompasses 1.6 million acres across the central Piedmont and

is the state soil.

This soil type supports agricultural crops and forestland, and is the basis of North Carolina's rich pottery tradition, where it can be turned into pots, bowls and vessels.

Other features of the exhibit include scale models showing the soil makeup below a house and yard, videos and displays about how soils support life and a display about soils from around the world.

The exhibit is a collaboration of the National Museum of Natural History (Smithsonian), Soil Science Society of America and the Agronomic Science Foundation. For more information, go to <http://forces.si.edu/soils/>.

Agricultural plastics recycling on the rise

Many N.C. growers reuse their old agricultural plastics such as pots and overwintering films, but for some, reuse is not an option or there comes a point when the plastics cannot be used any more.

Taking old ag plastics to the landfill costs money, but now some growers are recycling their used agricultural plastics, saving on tipping fees as well as benefiting the environment.

Since May 2012, 1,800 tons of discarded agricultural plastics including pots, flats, hoop-house film, drip tape, black mulch film and growing media bags have been diverted from landfills and sent to recycling facilities.

N.C. growers have saved over \$75,000 in tipping fees. In addition, some recyclers offer payments to growers for their recyclables.

For growers with truck-load quantities of agricultural plastics, recycling is a realistic, cost-effective option. For

growers with less than a truck-load, recycling is more of a challenge.

Waste Reduction Partners has joined with the N.C. Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, the N.C. Nursery and Landscape Association and the Division of Environmental Assistance and Customer Service to find more opportunities to recycle agricultural plastics in the state. These efforts led to recognition by the N.C. Tobacco Trust Fund Commission of the importance of agricultural plastics recycling to both N.C. growers and the N.C. recycling industries.

WRP is a team of volunteer retired engineers, and scientists who provide N.C. businesses with waste- and energy-reduction assessments and non-regulatory technical assistance. WRP volunteers work closely with DEACS to find recyclers in North Carolina, and also work with NCDA&CS and NCNLA to understand the growers' needs and help find so-

lutions for recycling their agricultural plastics. The N.C. agricultural plastics recycling group is working hard to identify and expand consolidation sites linked to a N.C. recycler with a domestic market.

From this work a new website ncagplastics.org has been developed as a resource for growers and recyclers to find solutions for agricultural plastics. As the project evolves, more information will be placed on this website, including:

- An interactive map of N.C. recyclers
- Information on how to collect different agricultural plastics for recycling
- Where to find a consolidation site
- How to collect different plastic wastes for recyclers
- Useful resources
- Frequently Asked Questions

can also create serpentine tunneling marks, known as feeding galleries, which are found under the bark of the infested trees.

Home and landowners are encouraged to report any symptomatic activity in ash trees to the NCDA&CS Plant Industry Division hotline at 1-800-206-9333 or

by email at newpest@ncagr.gov. The pest can affect any of the four types of ash trees grown in the state.

Fourth-generation farm transitions into tilapia production

When Valee Taylor walks into the office of the fish farm he owns with his sister, Renee Stewart, he sees a future for his family.

With fresh fish now in Whole Foods, some Publix stores, a number of Asian markets and in restaurants and other retail outlets in North Carolina, Canada and New York, Taylor Fish Farm seems well on its way to laying a solid foundation for the future.

When a career-ending accident forced Valee Taylor to leave his job with the state corrections department, he faced a crossroads as he struggled to regain his health. His family was initially told he likely would not survive the accident, but he did.

The experience changed him. "You look at things very differently," Taylor said. "I have an idea of what we want this parcel of land to be. And we want to help keep our community together."

To help with his recovery, Taylor's doctor asked him what he liked to do before the accident. Gardening and fishing were two of his favorite hobbies, but the accident wouldn't allow him to cast a line, so fishing wouldn't work.

The doctor suggested he plant a small garden outside the door of his home, so he could work in it a little every day, slowly building strength as he went along.

Through his efforts he was able to share food from that garden with friends, family and neighbors. And with that, he discovered a new focus in life – feeding others.

Following the tobacco buyout, the fourth-generation tobacco family was looking for something to transition to. The main priorities for the new farm venture were to find something that would protect the land of his ancestors and also provide for the family.

Taylor knew that whatever direction the farm took, it

needed to involve computers or some other technology if it was going to be of interest to the kids in the family.

"I wanted something that would be sustainable for my family. I saw fish farming as a business for the future," Taylor said.

So Taylor set out to learn everything he could about building and operating an aquaculture operation through staff at N.C. State University and the N.C. Cooperative Extension Service.

He sought out Dr. Tom Losordo and Dennis DeLong, two top experts on recirculating systems for aquaculture production.

"I went to them and said, 'I want to work with you for free,'" Taylor said. "I just wanted to learn everything I could about it, and they were the people with the information."

When he felt ready with his new-found knowledge and with

design and engineering support from N.C. Cooperative Extension and NCSU's Department of Biological and Agricultural Engineering, he began the process of building the facility from the ground up, complete with a filtration system that is a copy of a municipal wastewater treatment plant in South Carolina, only on a much smaller scale.

Now, the operation marks nearly seven years in operation, with a growing customer base and an eye on ways to grow the business in the future. The operation is housed in a metal building on the farm just down the road from the Anathoth Community Garden, which sits on land donated by his parents.

Taylor is as proud to offer a tour of the gardens as he is the fish operation that includes six 25,000-gallon tanks housing tilapia in various stages of growth,

from fingerlings to harvestable fish. Pumps keep the water moving, and the filtration system just off the main room with the tanks, filters out waste and uneaten food, keeping the water clean.

The fish generally take six to nine months to reach a harvestable size. Incoming fish remain in quarantine for six weeks, before moving on to the nursery tank for another six weeks.

The overall operation is impressive, from the nearly odor-free operation to its Institute of Marketology certification. Taylor Fish Farm is one of only two tilapia operations in the United States to earn this certification.

Along the way, Taylor also sought the advice of the N.C. Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services' Small Farms Program. Through his first contact with the department, he was guided to other programs and re-

sources that have helped him with his small farm.

Taylor said marketing assistance from the department has helped open doors for him that he likely would not have been able to access on his own. "The thing I like about the N.C. Department of Agriculture is that their people will come out and visit you, and talk to you to see what you have going on or see what you want to do, to see how they may be able to help you," he said. "If you work with NCDA&CS you can take your business to places you would never think you could."

Keeping the farm in the family is something Taylor and his sister have focused on from the start. All of the siblings' children have worked or continue to work at the farm, some between school breaks and others on a more permanent basis.

Taylor's son Jeremy has taken on significant responsibilities on the farm.

He monitors and tests water temperature and quality, checking ammonia, nitrates, pH and oxygen levels at regular intervals to ensure safe operation. Jeremy also is involved in formulating feed to keep the fish growing at a steady rate, harvesting fish and helping load fish for customers.

Valee Taylor has big dreams for his farm. He wants to add a processing facility to be more vertically integrated and to be able to offer jobs in the community.

He acknowledges his business is still in its infancy in terms of the mainstream markets, but he believes he will continue to grow his business as more people try his product.

Taylor's fish draw high marks on taste from customers, something he credits to the filtration system, good feed and good production practices.

"The American consumer is getting more educated about their food. We are giving people a choice in terms of locally raised fish," Valee Taylor said.

Spring fire season is here; be careful when burning debris

The N.C. Forest Service is urging residents across the state to exercise caution when burning debris during spring fire season, which typically lasts from March to May.

Firefighters from the NCFS and the U.S. Forest Service battled a 740-acre wildfire in Buncombe County earlier this year, which damaged or destroyed a number of homes.

The NCFS also assisted the USFS on a 150-acre fire in Mitchell County. The causes of the fires are under investigation.

In spring, people do a lot of yard work that often includes burning leaves and yard debris. There are many factors to consider before burning any

debris. The NCFS encourages residents considering debris burning to contact their local county forest ranger, who can offer technical advice and explain what the best options are to help maximize the safety to people, property and the forest.

"Protect our natural resources by acting safely. Don't burn on dry, windy days, and maintain a careful watch over a fire until it is extinguished," said Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler.

For people who choose to burn debris, the NCFS urges them to adhere to the following tips to protect property and prevent wildfires:

- Consider alternatives to burning. Some yard debris, such as leaves and grass, may

be more valuable if composted.

- Check with your county fire marshal's office for local laws on burning debris. Some communities allow burning only during specified hours; others forbid it entirely.
- Make sure you have an approved burning permit, which can be obtained at any NCFS office, county-approved burning permit agent, or online at <http://ncforestservice.gov>.
- Check the weather. Don't burn in dry or windy conditions.
- Only burn natural vegetation from your property. Burning household trash or other

man-made materials is illegal. Trash should be hauled to a convenience center.

- Plan burning for the late afternoon when conditions are typically less windy and more humid.
- If you must burn, be prepared. Use a shovel or hoe to clear a perimeter around the area where you plan to burn.
- Keep fire tools ready. To control the fire, you will need a hose, bucket, a steel rake and a shovel for tossing dirt on the fire.
- Never use flammable liquids such as kerosene, gasoline or diesel fuel to speed burning.
- Stay with your fire until it is completely out. In North Carolina, human carelessness

leads to more wildfires than any other cause.

- These same tips hold true for campfires and barbecues, too. Douse burning charcoal briquettes or campfire thoroughly with water. When the coals are soaked, stir them and soak them again. Be sure they are out cold and carefully feel to be sure they are extinguished. Never dump hot ashes or coals into a wooded area.
