Wetlands are Wonderful

One of African-American musician Louis Armstrong's famous songs was "What a Wonderful World." Generations have appreciated his "trees of green", "skies of blue", "colors of the rainbow" and even watching babies cry and grow. What makes this world that we should respect and protect possible? Wonderful wetlands sustain all life on Earth. Wetlands are found where water covers the soil for majority of the year without drying out (evaporating). Wetlands can be found in all sorts of forms from rivers and lakes to ponds. Marshes and swamps are also wetlands. Wetlands perform multiple jobs that benefit the Earth and the hydrosphere.

One of the most important functions of a wetland is cleaning the environment. Wetlands improve water quality by filtering out pollutants. Pollutants such as fertilizer, pesticides, and sewer waste are found in most wetlands. Three of the most effective methods for removing pollutants are nutrient removal, sediment trapping, and chemical detoxification. These methods improve the cleanliness of the water to benefit of plants, animals, and people.

Wonderful wetlands are home to many species of plants and animals that would not be able to survive in any other ecosystem. Wetlands allow animals as diverse as birds, fish, and pollinators to have an easy water source and provide the correct conditions for trees and plants to thrive and produce oxygen required for human life. Ingredients used in certain medicines are derived from wetlands' soil and plants. Aspirin used to treat headaches, heart disease, and high blood pressure is possible because of wetland vegetation. Wetlands even help the economy by providing natural resources such as fish, berries, and drinking water for sale.

Another beneficial use of the wonderful wetlands is natural protection against flooding. Whenever large amounts of rainwater or runoff enter the wetlands, they are able to act as a natural sponge that absorbs the water and slowly redistributes it into rivers and streams. This process reduces the amount of water entering the bodies of water and land which prevents problems like flash floods. By lessening the volume of water entering at once, this also means less erosion. Erosion weathers away at rocks, which increases pollution and sedimentation in a body of water. Wetlands limit erosion's negative effects. In these ways, wetlands protect the planet and its people. In a time when many in the United States and world are worried about devastation from natural disasters, respecting and protecting wetlands is necessary.

Wetlands help to create life as we know it by providing an environment for organisms we could not have any other way. Wetlands keep the Earth clean, improve water quality, and serve as a home to many plant and animal species that are important for our over all ecosystem. While Louis Armstrong did not sing about wetlands, they really are a wonderful part of our world.


