



# Streamflow Rehabilitation Assistance Program (StRAP) Funding announcement

November 20, 2025

On December 8<sup>th</sup>, the Division of Soil & Water Conservation will begin accepting applications for the Streamflow Rehabilitation Assistance Program (StRAP) in counties affected by Hurricane Helene. This allocation of funding will make \$38 million available for projects to repair stream damage caused by Hurricane Helene. This follows approval by the Soil & Water Conservation Commission. ## **Projects Funded**

The following types of projects are eligible for StRAP funding on streams and waterways damaged by Hurricane Helene:

- Streambank stabilization
- Stream debris removal
- Stream restoration
- Sediment removal
- PL-566 Small Watershed structure repair
- Other types of stream repair projects may be approved on a case-by-case basis.

### **Eligibility**

The following organizations are eligible to apply for StRAP funding:

- Soil & Water Conservation Districts
- Political subdivisions (city/county government, water/sewer district, municipal service District, sanitary district, drainage district)
- Non-profit organizations

We will accept applications from eligible organizations in the 39 counties (and Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians) identified by the FEMA disaster declaration for Hurricane Helene. Counties are divided based on total impact, with 70% of funds allocated for High-need counties, 20% for medium-need counties, and 10% of funds for low-need counties. The breakdown of counties in each category is available on the map below.

Please note that the list of high-need counties is contingent on enrollment in the <u>Emergency</u> <u>Watershed Protection Program</u> (EWP) through NRCS. Any individual organization is not required to apply for EWP funding, but if no organizations in a High-need county apply for EWP, the county will be reclassified as medium-need. The above map will be updated as needed.

### **Award Amounts**

County caps will determine the total amount that can be awarded within each county:

High-need county: \$1,496,250 Medium-need county: \$526,154 Low-need county: \$310,909 Please note that this is a per-county cap, not a per-grantee cap. If multiple organizations within a county apply and receive funding, the total amount awarded across multiple organizations will not exceed the county cap. Supplemental funding will be awarded to a small number of high-priority projects after initial awards have been made in all eligible counties.

#### **Application Process**

StRAP funds will be awarded in a rolling application process, with counties becoming eligible to apply for StRAP funds once all EWP enrollment in that count is completed (or if no organizations in the county are applying for EWP). StRAP staff will post information announcing when organizations in each county can apply for funding. Once an application window begins, organizations in that county (or counties) will have 8 weeks to submit applications. Please pay attention to updates on the StRAP website for more information.

The first application window will begin on December 8<sup>th</sup>. A list of counties to be included in the first application window will be published shortly.

The applications will be collected using the Disaster Assessment & Reporting Tool (DART). Use DART in the field or the office to record information on each stream segment to be included in your application, including site location, description, photos, and cost estimate. Each different stream segment/project will be a separate entry in DART. Please note that once a stream segment is submitted in DART, you cannot edit the entry. If corrections need to be made, please resubmit the stream segment as a new entry in DART. Access DART and learn more about the tool here.

Once you enter all sites for your application in DART, you will submit a brief FormSite poll to provide contact information and notify the Division that you have finished submitting your application.
